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Flying Senior Class Takes off Thursday

HICKSVILLE—About 100 members of the high school senior class will make a flying trip to Washington, D. C., on Thursday, May 20, it was disclosed today by Miss Mabel R. Farley, principal. The class will assemble at the high school at about six o'clock in the morning, taking off from LaGuardia Field on a chartered Eastern Airlines plane at 7:50 A.M.

The flight to Washington will take an hour. At the airport they will be met by two buses and make a visit of points of interest in the capital. They are scheduled to land at LaGuardia at 7 in the evening and will be brought back to the high school by buses. The date of the flying trip, the first for the community high school seniors, is the anniversary of the Lindbergh Atlantic Ocean flight made the same day in 1927.

Fire Chiefs Urging Clean Up

HICKSVILLE—The cooperation of all residents and business concerns with the Clean-Up campaign was today urged by Chief Arnold Jeanson of the Fire Dept. Chiefs of neighboring communities joined in the appeal.

Oyster Bay Town Board has proclaimed the week of May 17 as "Clean Up Week", requesting all residents to "clean up their premises during the week".

State-wide there has been a 40 per cent increase in grass and brush fires resulting in millions of dollars in fire losses. Most such fires are said to be the result of carelessness.

Chief Jeanson said that cooperating with the clean-up campaign means health is safeguarded, thrift promoted, fire prevention furthered, civic pride stimulated and home and community beautified. Burning of rubbish and debris is not permitted in Hicksville and Plainview unless a permit has been issued by the fire dept.

AS SUMMER APPROACHES:

Civic Groups See Hope For Play Areas Fading

HICKSVILLE—Community civic groups here today expressed their concern regarding the lack of progress on several playground and recreational fields in their neighborhoods after four months of "fruitless" negotiations with township officials. With only a few weeks until the warm summertime weather arrives, they fear the so-called playgrounds will remain "junkyards" another year.

Representatives of ten civic associations met with Supervisor Lewis N. Waters in January and again in March in an effort to get action. At a meeting this week they agreed that promises of improvements have not been kept.

Loosely affiliated as the little publicized Civic Information Exchange, the individual civic associations have written repeatedly to the township officials. Letters written at the suggestion of Supervisor Waters have gone unanswered, the Herald learned last night.

Under regulations of the County Planning Commission, at least ten areas in Hicksville have been set aside by developers for neighborhood playgrounds or recreation areas on a percentage of the development area formula. There are 78 such areas now set aside in the Township.

A meeting with Waters in January resulted in the plotting of the areas on a township map, the civic groups learned in March. But plans publicly announced by Waters to arrange for the fencing and equipping of the areas has apparently come to a standstill, civic leaders said.

The only notable exception has been in Hillside Terrace where a tract of about three acres has been fenced and grass seeded by the developer.

Residents of Glenbrook Homes, off Newbridge Rd., however, thus far have been unsuccessful in their efforts to get a one-acre tract fenced, graded and seeded.

Property owners in the Millwood Gate section off South Broadway have been unable to learn if the township has taken title to a small parcel in their section fronting on Woodbine Dr. This week the neighborhood found the area posted with signs "no ball playing".

Woodbury Manor has a small park area which is fenced but unimproved.

Other proposed playground or park areas are adjacent to Harnet Homes on Jerusalem Ave. in the Allied Homes section off Division Ave., at the end of Libby Ave. next to Zelda Park and Zelmour homes, off Peachtree Lane in the Trade Secrets section, and in the Levitt

GAS STATION MENACE:

Parc Civics Press Year Old Fight As Dove St. Plans to Object Tuesday

HICKSVILLE—The "gas station menace" was under attack this week in two sections of the community. While residents of Dove St. and vicinity organized opposition to a gasoline station which will be the subject of a public hearing next Tuesday morning, May 18, before Oyster Bay Town Board, the residents of Parc Community off Jerusalem Ave. were preparing for a last ditch battle to prevent a station in their neighborhood.

Petition brigades will be out this Saturday and Sunday in Parc Community, off Jerusalem Ave. at South Dean St., as another stage in a fight which has been going on for more than a year. The Township Board of Appeals decision last year refusing a gas station there has been reversed in Supreme Court. An appeal on this verdict is expected to be argued in higher court early in June.

WANT RULES CHANGED Residents in all parts of the community are joining in the latest plea which protests "the continued

erection of gas stations," far in excess of the number required for the convenience of the community and detrimental to local property values." The plea also asks the "immediate revision of zoning and building restrictions (of the township) to curtail additional gas stations." Copies of the petition are available at the Herald office, 98 North B'way.

The hearing before the Town Board next Tuesday morning, May 18, starting at 10 o'clock is expected to produce a delegation of residents objecting to the proposed

new station at the southeast corner of Old Country and South Oyster Bay Rds. The site is an odd-shaped area bounded on the south by Dove St. A diner is now being established on the same tract. The application is being made by Harold Roth, builder of the homes on Dove and adjacent streets.

Also before the Town Board next Tuesday, according to notices tacked to trees in the vicinity, is an application of Alvin Schmid for a new gas station at the north east corner of North Broadway and James St.

Urachel, said: "Our efforts to clothe the Koreans call for time, energy and a little sacrifice. The Koreans are presently at work trying to rebuild their war-torn co-

untry. But it's hard for people to work when they are cold and miserable. They do not need money. Just clothes. My committee members join me in asking you to give all the clothing you can spare, on Korean collection day, which will be from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. on June 12. The ARK Committee will do all they can so please help us to fill our goal on that day."

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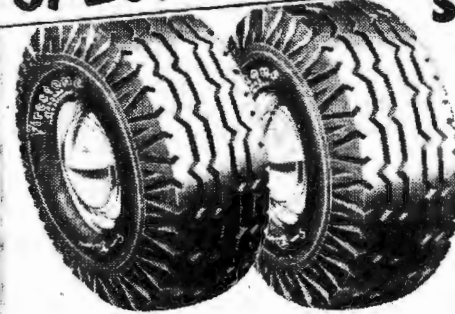
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CURRENT COMMENT:

Recreation Coming Up

By Fred J. Noeth

YOU ARE GOING to hear and read a great deal about "recreation" and our school system in the next few months. The drum beating for various kinds of recreational programs, financed by the taxpayers of Hicksville School District, has been going on for some months. There was some general discussion of the subject at the annual meeting.

It must be remembered that the term recreation does not mean the same thing to all people. Some think of it strictly in regard to teenagers with their dances, socials, etc. Others go much further and talk of activity for school children after regular hours of classes and on Saturdays. There are some who would go the whole hog and provide activity for the pre-school age youngsters and young adults also.

The adult education program which has grown and grown, at remarkably slight cost to local property owners because of state financial assistance and tuitions collected, is a form of "recreation".

We have already set our feet on the tax-supported recreation path with the summer playground program. The new school budget provides \$18,000 to finance this activity during the eight weeks of summer recess.

At this moment the Board of Education is in the process of hiring someone experienced in this field to make a survey or study. This expert, it is expected, will look over all phases of our present facilities for recreation—including such things as organized sports competition under the Police Boys Club and Little League, the various teenage groups, Boy and Girl Scouting, etc. These are not tax supported, although they frequently make use of school buildings, grounds and gymnasiums.

When the survey has been concluded, the facts should be given the widest possible circulation and discussion.

If the survey proves the need of a program there will probably be a special referendum of the voters of the school district (around September, we hear) on the appropriation of funds. This vote will actually be a referendum on the question of a broader tax-supported recreation program because in approving the starter expenditure the voters will be giving their consent to the overall idea. If they withhold approval, refuse to okay the use of tax money, they will be registering opposition.

A survey by an expert in the field is a good idea. The community has become so big that it is no longer practical for a layman, untrained in the subject of recreation in its broadest sense, to evaluate what we have, what we may need, and what we are willing to finance.

We do believe that pressures for the formation of a recreation program—including employment of a director and staff—should be withheld at least until the survey has been made and released to the public.

section between Arrow and Abbot Lanes.

Allen Goldstein, civic information chairman of the Glenbrook Civic Assoc., reported that Councilman Frank Chlumsky now tells him it is "too late" to plant grass seed in that area now. Although the town board has announced the awarding of a contract for fencing the Glenbrook tract, work has not begun.

Repeated letters of inquiry regarding the property in their section by the Millwood Gate Property Owners Assoc. have gone unanswered, it is charged.

The civic association called attention to a January GOP publicity release which said "the Town of Oyster Bay has definite plans for playgrounds all over the town and as soon as weather permits, will take steps to expedite the plans."

"Supervisor Waters said," the January release continued, "that since new developments have started in Town of Oyster Bay, the town has induced builders to allocate three percent of the land they build on as space for playgrounds. In most cases, the builders have already graded and fenced the areas."

"While playgrounds were seldom necessary in Town of Oyster Bay as little as five years ago, the rapid growth and disappearance of open land has made it necessary to provide play areas."

"It is believed that the first playgrounds will be completed and equipped in the heavily populated areas such as Hicksville, Bethpage and Massapequa where sufficient facilities do not exist at present."

Civic leaders noted today, four months later, that most areas set aside for play areas have become neighborhood dumps.

STEAD, COUNTY OF NASSAU, PURSUANT TO THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY AND AMENDMENTS THERETO.

WHEREAS, the County of Nassau has established and is maintaining and operating a public general hospital (Meadowbrook Hospital) on county-owned property at East Meadow, Town of Hempstead, County of Nassau, pursuant to the provisions of the General Municipal Law, the County Government Law, and other applicable laws, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Managers of said hospital-charged by law with the general superintendence, management and control of said hospital and of the grounds and buildings thereof has requested the County Board of Supervisors to adopt an ordinance making rules and regulations covering the use of parking on, and traffic and through said hospital grounds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definitions.

As used in this ordinance, unless otherwise expressly stated or unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires, the following terms shall respectively have the following meaning and include the following:

- "Meadowbrook Hospital" means the Nassau County Public General Hospital.
- "Hospital grounds" means that part of a county-owned property which comprises the land and buildings, and all the property, grounds and driveways thereon connected with and a part of Meadowbrook Hospital.
- "Driveway" means any drive, approach, highway, road, roadway, street, avenue or alley, paved or unpaved, maintained for vehicular use on the hospital grounds.
- "Vehicle" means any device (except a baby carriage or wheel chair) upon, in or by which any person or property may be transported or drawn.
- "Person" means any natural person, corporation, company, association, joint stock association, firm or co-partnership.
- "One way drive" means any driveway whereon traffic is restricted in one direction.
- "Parking space" means that part of any driveway, parking field, area or space designated by sign or signs or other markings as a place for the parking of vehicles.
- "Traffic signs and signals" means all signs, markings, devices and signals for the purpose of guiding, directing, warning, or regulating traffic or parking which are located upon the hos-
