P-TA REPRESENTATION:

Nicholai President Clarifies While Szendy Enlarges Charge

HICKSVILLE—While the Board of Education was making up its collective minds about the membership of the much-discussed Citizens' Advisory Committee this week, the subject of nomination of members by Parent-Teacher Associations in particular was aired at the Nicholai School P-TA meeting on Oct. 21.

A press release from Nicholai P-TA pointed out "the body of the P-TA voted to accept the recommendation of the Executive Committee to present Vernon Gridley's name to the Board of Education for membership on the Citizens' Advisory Committee. Several other names were considered by the Executive Committee but those individuals declined because they are otherwise too busy."

The P-TA report continues: "In a statement published in the Mid-Island Herald Thursday, Oct. 14, Emil Szendy states that the officers of Nicholai St. P-TA are 'almost exclusively from the Dutch Lane area', and that 'election of officers of Nicholai P-TA included three or four who only have children in the school this term and did not have children in the school at the time the elections took place last May'. In order to clear up a misunderstanding for members of Nicholai P-TA, Mrs. Michael Karlan made a

statement enumerating the facts of the case. Of the seven officers of the P-TA, four had children in the school last year, two are teachers, and only one, Mrs. Karlan herself, is new to the school this year.

"In a detailed outline of the method of appointment of committee chairman, it was pointed out that during the summer all parents for the four areas represented at Nicholai, who had indicated an interest in active P-TA work, were called and invited to serve as chairman on the various committees.

"Mrs. Randolph Tingdale of the Fork Lane area accepted the chairmanship of the Class Mothers, and Mrs. Margaret Valley accepted the chairmanship of the publicity committee. Women from all areas, although unable to accept jobs as chairmen, have been working hard on various committees. The very large membership of the P-TA is due to the hard work done by women in all the areas represented", the press statement concluded.

Board Member Szendy, who was present at the Oct. 21 meeting of Nicholai P-TA, had his own comments regarding the situation: "The possibility forecast some weeks ago that geographic

Karkula at 11 Miller Circle, Hicksville. The mobile speakers platform of the Democratic Caravan will continue to tour the area this Saturday. The mid-Island area has been the scene of more intense political activity by both major parties than has been observed locally in a decade.

Polls Close Early This Election Day

Election activity entered the home stretch in the mid-Island area today with the final verdict up to the voters at the polls next Tuesday, Nov. 2. Polls are open from 6 A.M. to 7 P.M. and leaders of both major parties urged an early vote. More than 22,000 persons are eligible to vote in Hicksville, an all time high.

The contest between John J. Burns of Sea Cliff, Republican candidate for re-election to the State Assembly, and William McCaffrey of Plainview, Democratic candidate for the same office, has held the center of attention in the mid-Island area.

The mid-Island region which has had tremendous growth and the fact that Hicksville in the last election ran up high scores for Democrats in several districts which have been traditionally in the Republican column has found the area the focal point for political activity.

Assemblyman Burns speaking at a GOP rally in Plainview last week ripped into the Democratic platform on education, describing it as "a nebulous, filmy thing that is incomprehensible to Oyster Bay Township homeowners". He assured Plainview residents that he would introduce legislation at the next session of the Assembly that would provide Oyster Bay township residents with "sufficient financial aid should they decide against centralized high school districts."

ELECTION EDITORIAL:

Local GOP 'Record' Makes Choice Easy

THE REPUBLICAN campaign to re-elect candidates to the state legislature next Tuesday has made it easy for us to decide in favor of the Democrats.

As for the state-wide officials—Governor, Attorney-General, Comptroller—we are frank to admit that we are stumped. We are Republican and have admired the service rendered the people of the State of New York by Thomas E. Dewey as Governor and Irving M. Ives as a member of the United States Senate.

However, the recent appearances of Mr. Ives on television we fear have cost him the loss of public regard. The business the other evening of trying to tie Averell Harriman to the "Nazi warlords in Germany" was just a trifle too much for easy consumption. As of this morning, Mr. Harriman's name on the ballot was under challenge—an 11th hour development which smacked so very much of desperation.

Many voters, except the strictest partisans, have found it difficult to decide between Ives and Harriman as individuals. We need not be reminded that the individual is elected to the high office of Governor of the state—not the political party or its emblem.

We have already recorded our position regarding the office of Congressman. We sincerely urge the election of

Sullivan Explains Lamb Contract As DeLorme Continues His Quiz

HICKSVILLE—Dr. Wallace E. Lamb has a contract with the school district to take over as superintendent of schools on July 1 of next year. It was asserted at the Board of Education meeting Tuesday night by Michael J. Sullivan who was attorney for the district at the time it was drawn and signed. Efforts by Gerard F. DeLorme to continue the discussion of events which led to the drafting of the contract and the decision to oust Dr. E. H. LeBaron, the present superintendent, were firmly curtailed at the meeting by Board President Edna Kuhne Sutton.

DeLorme attempted to continue his questioning recitation before the Board, Tuesday, which had started the previous Friday night. As he started to speak, Mrs. Sutton pointed out the Board wanted to "move along with our business". He was finally given the floor on the promises he needed only 10 minutes.

After stating he meant nothing

Mrs. Michael Karlan, president, announced that two other candidates had been considered—Elery Bean, Director of Adult Education, and Sam Pace, Director of the Chamber of Commerce, Vice President of the Kiwanis Club, and active in fund raising campaigns of the American Legion and the Salvation Army. Only Mr. Gridley could give the time required.

While the Nicholas St. School serves, besides the Dutch Lane area, the school areas of Fork Lane, Old Country Road, and Nicholas itself, and also has a special district, the score now stands, in parent officers, chairmen, and representatives of the Nicholas PTA, as 14 from the Dutch Lane area and 2 from other areas.

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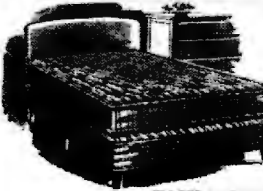

The correspondence indicated that Dr. Lamb had been offered the position of administrative assistant while he wanted to be assistant superintendent with a promise of the future and "that the man selected would be groomed to succeed your present Superintendent who was to retire in a year or two (Apr. 15, 1933)."

Dr. LeBaron who had insisted at the meeting the previous Friday he had been subjected "to pressure" to retire, said Tuesday night that in answer to a question the previous week by Board Member Joseph Cawley he was willing to continue as superintendent next year. Cawley insisted that he was misquoted on the question.

LeBaron added that he had been with the district 18 years and has been urged by many residents to continue in that position.

DeLorme declined to reveal the source of the correspondence he quoted but stated that such information was available to taxpayers as public records.

Ernest Greenwood of Bay Shore to represent us in Congress. It was a matter of general public regret that he was not immediately returned two years ago after a term of outstanding service to all the people. The past two years of Stuyvesant Wainwright has increased the general agreement that Mr. Greenwood is the kind of man we want in Washington. His is a difficult campaign. Because he declines to prostrate himself to blind party allegiance, he gets only mild assistance from professional politicians. However, he has carried on an intense campaign with innumerable public appearances throughout the vast area of the First Congressional District which stretches from here to Montauk Point.

As for the State Legislature:

On this score the Republicans literally have cooked the goose of their candidates either thru stupidity or in the brain belief that people are ignorant and short of memory.

We all have received in the mail this week a leaflet entitled "This Is Worth Reading" and a truer statement was never uttered. It is distributed by the Oyster Bay Town Republican Committee and has the affrontery to brag, under the "Republican Record - Town" about the development of parking fields, playgrounds, home rule, and town meetings. Our regular readers know the score on these touchy subjects.

We are asked to re-elect John J. Burns as Assemblyman and William Hulst as Senator "if we want railroad elimination in Hicksville" and are reminded that "thousands of children cross the rail road tracks every day on foot and in buses."

Two years ago when Burns and Hulst were re-elected we supported both of them. However, we noted with regret that Mr. Hulst had not done anything about our grade crossing problems up to that time (1952) and had done nothing about the situation in the years before, even though he has been in Albany for a dozen years and our crossings had been pigeon-holed on the no. 2 "non appropriation" priority list for all that time. And two years ago we expressed disappointment in Mr. Burns for shoving thru the Hicksville Park and Parking District split law, over strong local opposition. And yet, Mr. Burns and Mr. Hulst were just about back in Albany for a new term when they fathered the infamous Pool Hall District bill.

We well remember the answers received from both gentlemen when they were questioned about this legislation. We got "horre rule" tossed back in our teeth and were informed, in effect, that if the "Town Board" (ie, the administration in control) wanted a certain kind of legislation, they as members of the State Legislature would introduce and do their darndest to get it passed—regardless of what opinions were held by entire communities of individuals.

Well, if they feel they owe first allegiance to the party in power, rather than their constituents, then let the town and county officials vote for them. Our votes go to William McCaffrey of Plainview for State Assemblyman and Eastman Birkett of Great Neck for State Senator from this area.

We greatly admire the vigor and sincerity of McCaffrey and Birkett in their efforts to become our law makers in Albany and we hope they get your vote next Tuesday.

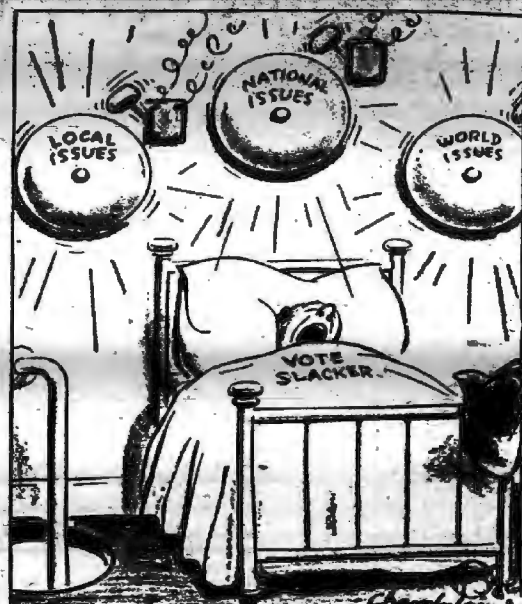
ORDINANCE NO. 168, 1954
BOND ORDINANCE, DATED OCTOBER 25, 1954, AUTHORIZING \$237,000 SERIAL BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT OF A BUILDING FOR THE USE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW AND THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY

(Passed by the Board of Supervisors on October 25, 1954, votes for, 30; votes against, none. Became an ordinance October 25, 1954, with the approval of the County Executive.)

Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Serial Bonds of the aggregate principal amount of \$237,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in or-

der to finance the specific purpose hereinafter described.

Section 2. The specific purpose (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") to be financed by the issuance of said Serial Bonds is the erection of a Class "A" (fireproof) building, as defined in Subdivision 11 of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law, for the use of Division of Buildings of the Department of Public Works of Nassau County in connection with the maintenance of public buildings and public grounds at the Nassau County Civic Center or Fair Grounds, on a plot of land now owned by the County located adjacent to the New County Court House, and the acquisition and installation of the original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for such new building.

Section 3. The Board of Supervisors has determined and hereby states that the estimated maximum cost of such purpose is \$250,000 and that the Board of Supervisors plans to finance such cost by the use of (1) \$15,000 representing current funds heretofore provided for such purpose by a budgetary appropriation which has not lapsed, and (2) \$235,000 to be raised by the issuance of the Serial Bonds hereby authorized. Except as hereinbefore stated no moneys have been authorized to be applied to the payment of the cost of such purpose.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors hereby determines that the purpose for which said bonds are to be issued is described in Subdivision 11 (a) of Paragraph a of section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is thirty years.

Section 5. The power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said Serial Bonds, subject to the provisions of this ordinance and of any other ordinance or resolution hereafter adopted, and all powers and duties pertaining or incidental to the sale and issuance

of said Serial Bonds, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer. The County Executive and the County Treasurer are hereby directed to sign any Serial Bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance and the County Clerk is hereby directed to affix to such bonds the corporate seal of the County of Nassau and to attest such seal. Each interest coupon representing interest payable on such Serial Bonds shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer.

Section 6. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in full together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. The validity of said Serial Bonds or of any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said Serial Bonds may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or if said obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

Section 7. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to cause such bonds to be printed and to do such things as may be necessary to advertise the sale of the bonds and to employ Messrs. Reed, Hoyt, Taylor & Washburn, Attorneys of New York City, to furnish to the purchaser or purchasers of such bonds an opinion as to their legality.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

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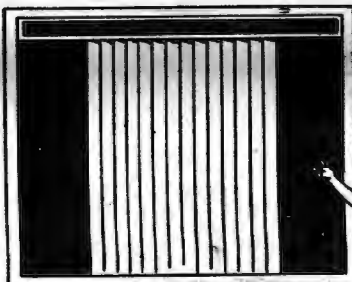

BOND ANTICIPATION NOTE ORDINANCE, DATED OCTOBER 25, 1954, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$237,000 BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU IN ANTICIPATION OF THE SALE OF SERIAL BONDS AUTHORIZED TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT OF A BUILDING FOR THE USE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW AND THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY.
(Passed by the Board of Supervisors on October 25, 1954, votes for, 30; votes against, 0. The ordinance, as amended October 25, 1954, with the approval of the County Executive.)
Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. The County of Nassau shall issue its Bond Anticipation Notes of the aggregate principal amount of \$237,000, pursuant to the Local Finance Law of New York, in anticipation of the sale of \$237,000 Serial Bonds authorized by the bond ordinance entitled "BOND ANTICIPATION NOTE ORDINANCE, DATED OCTOBER 25, 1954, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$237,000 SERIAL BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF NASSAU TO FINANCE THE CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT OF A BUILDING FOR THE USE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, PURSUANT TO THE LOCAL FINANCE LAW AND THE COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW OF NASSAU COUNTY", adopted by the Board of Supervisors on October 25, 1954.

Section 2. The specific purpose to be financed by the issuance of such Bond Anticipation Notes is the erection of a Class "A" (fire-proof) building, as defined in Subdivision 11 of Paragraph a of Section 11.00 of said Local Finance Law, for the use of the Division of Buildings of the Department of Public Works of Nassau County in connection with the maintenance of public buildings and public grounds at the Nassau County Civic Center or Fair Grounds, on a plot of land now owned by the County located adjacent to the New County Court House, and the acquisition and installation of the original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus required for such new building.

Section 3. As required by said Local Finance Law, it is hereby stated that (a) there are no outstanding Bond Anticipation Notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said Serial Bonds, and (b) the notes authorized by this ordinance

are not renewal notes and (c) the notes authorized by this ordinance shall mature within one year from the date of their issue and (d) such notes are not issued in anticipation of bonds for an improvement.

Section 4. The power to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said Bond Anticipation Notes, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, and all powers and duties pertaining or incidental to the sale and issuance of said Bond Anticipation Notes, are hereby delegated to the County Treasurer. The County Executive and the County Treasurer are hereby directed to sign any Bond Anticipation Notes issued pursuant to this ordinance and the County Clerk is hereby directed to affix to such notes the corporate seal of the County of Nassau and to attest such seal.

Section 5. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in full together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law. The validity of said Bond Anticipation Notes may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of the publication of this ordinance, are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication; or if said obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of New York.

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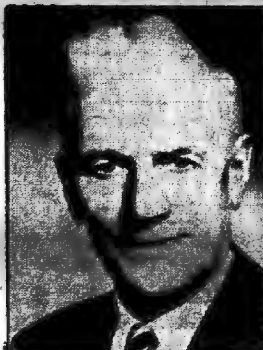
