'Complications' Delay Vote On More Schools

HICKSVILLE—Accumulated project costs of nearly four million dollars have been set for three of the questions which will be submitted to a public vote at a referendum early in 1955, it was learned this week. Plans for a vote on six or seven questions, tentatively set for Jan. 15, have been abruptly cancelled "due to complications" on one or more of the proposals.

Elect Commissioners Next Tuesday Night

Election of fire commissioners will take place in Hicksville, Bethpage and Jericho and a water commissioner in Plainview next Tuesday. In Hicksville, Vincent W. Braun, ex-chief, is unopposed for re-election for a five year term as fire commissioner. Voting is at the firehouse from 7 to 10 P.M.

There are contests for commissioner and district treasurer in Bethpage. Incumbents Commissioner Edmund W. Thorne and Treasurer James M. Sturtevant have the backing of the fire dept. (See story on page 13). They are opposed by James Hynes and Charles Lang.

Jericho also votes from 7 to 10 P.M. at its firehouse to elect a commissioner and treasurer. The terms of Harold Smith and George Casey expire.

Plainview has a contest for water commissioner between Ralph P. Atchue, incumbent and chairman of the board, opposed by William Bennett. Position is for a three-year term. Voting takes place in the water district office at Old Country and Manetto Hill Roads, Tuesday night.

Prohibit Overnight Parking

OYSTER BAY—Two new township prohibitions on overnight parking were enacted by the Town Board, Tuesday, following a public hearing. Councilman Frank Chlumsky presided at the hearing in the vacation absence of Supervisor Lewis N. Waters.

One rule prohibits parking commercial vehicles on public streets overnight, year round. The other gives county police and the township highway dept. permission to remove all vehicles parked on public streets overnight during periods of snow storms. No objections to either rule were voiced at the hearing.

Francke to Seat GOP Officers

HICKSVILLE—Ernest Francke, local Republican leader, is expected to conduct the installation of officers of the Central Island Women's Republican Club next Monday night, Dec. 6 at the Legion Hall on E. Nicholas St. Howard T. Hogan, township GOP chairman, is also expected to be present. Dorothy Drake will be installed as president of the club.

Members and their guests are invited to attend and bring small gifts for a Christmas party. Entertainment will follow the ceremonies of installation and a brief business session starting at 8:30. Paul Drake will sing as part of the entertainment program.

'Missing Backstops' Were Not Ordered, Ernenwein Asserts

HICKSVILLE—The School District got "what it paid for" in the way of playground equipment, former business manager Harry Ernenwein told the Board of Education, Tuesday night. He insisted that only five baseball stops (at \$305 each, erected) were received because "only five were ordered." At a previous meeting it had been shown that apparently eight backstops had been ordered, with other equipment in a \$10,000 expenditure and that only five could be located.

When Board Member Emil J. Sensity pointed out that Ernenwein's explanation does not conform with the explanation given by Singleton & Yutzler, the firm which had the contract for the sports equipment, Edna Kuhse Sutton, board president, retorted:

"I believe what Mr. Ernenwein told us and I believe Mr. Purick (Herbert Purick, auditor of the district). I don't give two hoots for what Yutzler told us."

Sensity presented a letter from Singleton &

Yutzler recalling that eight backstops were ordered and eight were delivered. Purick agreed that purchase orders and invoices in the files indicated that eight backstops had been ordered.

Ernenwein claimed that the original planned order called for \$12,833.90. However, with only \$10,000 in the budget, he had shaved the order down by omitting six swings and rubber mats, etc.

Originally on the proposed purchase of \$12,946 a discount of \$492.49 was offered, amounting to a 5 per cent discount.

Ernenwein admitted that no competitive figures were available because "no one would offer figures with erection." He added that "we saved on all freight charges."

Sensity said he was unable to reconcile the records and files and suggested that the committee of himself and Arthur L. Ehrich, which has been authorized to employ an "outside auditor" to check records since 1952, would weigh the various statements and records and report to the Board.

The school Board on Tuesday night approved the application to Albany for the following projects: alterations and addition to the high school, converting it to junior high school use, \$2,400,000; 10 additional rooms for Lee Ave. School, \$564,000; and 16-room school on the Wettersau (Glenbrook) site \$914,000. This makes a total of \$3,884,000.

The Citizens Advisory Committee on Education, meeting Monday night in Old Country Rd. School, made plans to cover 30 organization speaking dates during December and early January. It was anticipated that the School Board on the following night (Tuesday) would probably adopt the form of the referendum questions.

The dates for December appearances have been cancelled at the suggestion of Richard School, liaison member for the school board, pending the formal adoption of the questions to be submitted to vote.

The Advisory Committee has set Tuesday, Jan. 4, for its next meeting at Old Country Rd. School.

The School Board, Tuesday night, went into executive session for more than an hour before the open (Continued on Page 7)

Refuse Piles Up In Streets

HICKSVILLE — Township officials were attempting today to work out a solution to the "labor trouble" which has halted garbage collection in the community. Councilman Frank Chlumsky said conferences were being held between town officials, James Allen, who has the contract since March, and bonding company representatives.

It is understood 18 men are employed by Allen, operating seven trucks. The difficulty has not affected service in extension areas which are covered by separate contracts with other collectors.

No garbage was picked up in the original district today (Thursday), although an emergency collection was arranged in the business section by Chlumsky with Sam Allen, brother of James Allen, who has his own business.

"We are working on it and the garbage will definitely be picked up very soon", Chlumsky told the Herald optimistically late today.

The Question Box

The following are representative of the questions asked at the Public Library. If you need help in obtaining answers to your questions, or desire to do research in certain fields, call Mr. Eisner at the Library, 311 E. 141st. However, the privilege of borrowing books is extended only to residents of School District 17; non-residents must pay a \$5 annual fee to borrow books, although the library will extend its reference services to non-residents without charge.

Q. What Indian tribes lived on Long Island?

A. There were the Rockaways, who had their principal settlement at what is now Rockville Centre, but who were also scattered throughout the northern part of the Town of Hempstead. The Merricks had settlements on the southern part of the Island, from Rockville Centre to the western part of Oyster Bay. They were forced to cede their territory to the Massapeques, who had a settlement at Fort Neck and who controlled the land on the south shore between Seaford and Idip. On the north shore, the Matinecock territory extended from Flushing Bay to Smithtown. The Nissequogues' territory adjoined the Matinecocks on the west, and extended eastward from the Nissequogues River to Stony Brook. The Setaukets occupied the territory from Stony Brook to Wading River, while the Corchaugs controlled the land east of the Setaukets. The Corchaugs, Seantogues and Unkechaugs occupied villages around Peconic and Great South Bay. The Shinnecocks had land extending from Westhampton to Easthampton. The Montauks, the most powerful, controlled the land from East Hampton to the eastern tip of the island, and also lived on Gardiner's Island. The Manhassetts occupied Shelter, Hog and Ram Islands.

Q. To what other tribes were the Long Island Indians related?

A. It is generally thought that most of the Long Island Indians were Delawareans of the Algonquin branch, although some of the eastern tribes may have been related to the Indians in Connecticut.

It seems to me that the Herald's very prolific writer of letters to the editor, Mr. Chas. DeShaw, had better acquaint himself with some basic facts before sounding off in print.

It seems to me that Mr. DeShaw might spend some more time reading the Columbia survey, attending school board meetings, and reading the Mid-Island Herald more carefully. He would then learn the following:

1. That there are four elementary schools north and four elementary schools south of Old Country Road.

2. That the only High School and the only Jr. High School have been very intelligently placed near the geographic center of Hicksville.

3. That the school board has been, for over a year, searching diligently for school sites in the north central area of the district and hopes to include the purchase of the Wilkes Ave. site in the forthcoming referendum. If Mr. DeShaw knows of any suitable sites in the north he can make the school board eternally grateful by letting them know of such sites.

4. If Mr. DeShaw is worried more about "empty classrooms and even empty schools" in the distant future than he is in the proper education of our children now, he can rest assured that at no time in the foreseeable future will there be any such danger. Rather the opposite can be inferred from the following conservative forecast in the Columbia Survey:

(a) The building program is aimed at providing classrooms for an estimated enrollment of 8500 after 1970.

b) The peak enrollment will reach 13,400 in 1963.

c) In 1965 our enrollment will be 12,700.

d) Double session classes will be with us until about 1968.

It seems to me, therefore, that rather than vote down the new school, we redouble our efforts and build even more schools than recommended by the survey, and assure this generation, — our children now — a fair educational

shake under a full day session. I would rather see the next generation in Hicksville regard any empty classrooms as a monument to outrageous community planning as opposed to empty heads as a heritage of penny wise and uninformed prophets, who value that extra quart of beer on the table above the welfare of our children.

DeShaw Protests Asst to Asst

IT SEEMS TO ME, that the Majority on our School Board have a passion for creating new jobs and new titles, the favorite being "Administrative Assistant". At present our School System is loaded with Administrative Assistants, enough for a 30 School Building District; and we only have eight School Buildings in our District. Despite the number of Administrative Assistants already in our School District, the majority of the School Board continues to create more. These "Administrative Assistants" are always hired at the sum of \$5,000. annually and higher, with periodic raises as long as they continue serving as such. How many of us Taxpayers are earning \$5,000. annually? How many of us Taxpayers can secure a job paying \$5,000. from the beginning with periodic raises?

The latest in the long line of "Administrative Assistant" jobs created is that voted Monday evening, Sept. 13, of Administrative Assistant to the SCHOOL BOARD! This despite the strenuous objections of Members Elrich and Sam-

dy. The majority of the Board admitted that half the duties of this new job are the normal duties of the School Superintendent.

I am sure you recall that it was not too long ago that the job of Administrative Assistant in charge of Transportation was created to relieve Stanton Miller of this duty, so he could also relieve the Superintendent of some arduous duties. Here we have services overlapping services, but there is yet another position, that of Business Manager. This job was originally created to relieve the Superintendent of considerable work to allow him to concentrate on running our school system efficiently. Despite all these Administrative Assistants, the Superintendent is still loaded down with work.

So what's the answer? It's soon going to reach a point where this District has a lot of created jobs, whose holders will be doing possibly five minutes work a day for good pay. This kind of job plenty of Taxpayers would like to have. It would be nice to sit at a desk, draw a fine salary, and do no work. All these newly created jobs mean increased Taxes for us, but the School Board never mentions this. Instead they say that the increased Taxes are caused by the erection of new School Buildings in the District. This sounds reasonable on the surface, and fool a lot of people into thinking that the Board has the welfare of the Children at heart. Everyone is interested in better educational facilities for our children, and feel so price is too high to pay. This is what these exponents of Higher Taxes count on.

However, let's take a look at our neighboring District of Plainville. They are constantly building Schools to house the increasing number of children in their District, but what have they done in the way of Taxes? For two years in a row they have reduced the Tax Rate! This was done by eliminating waste in every respect, and the refusal to create a lot of unnecessary jobs.

At a recent Board of Education Meeting, there was a delegation from Hillside Terrace section of Hicksville were present to present a petition to reduce the Transportation distance for Kindergarten and First Grade to one quarter of a mile. The spokesman for the Board majority proudly commented that it was impossible to do so since the District did not have any money to provide for extra buses. They have no money for the welfare of the children, but they have money to waste on the creation of a new job. This was another way of saying, "We aren't interested in your welfare, and don't intend ever to be. All we intend to do is create unnecessary jobs in the School System. So put that in your pipe and smoke it."

IT SEEMS TO ME, in conclusion therefore, that the majority on our School Board intends to bleed us Taxpayers constantly with ever increasing Taxes, under the guise that it is necessary for the District. You can be sure that they will make absolutely no effort to reduce expenses. I have asked before, and I ask again how long are we Taxpayers going to allow this misuse of authority? How long are we going to sit back and wait for "John to do something about it"? There are ways of stopping this if all the Taxpayers join together to do so.

THE NEW TAX LAW - INSTALLMENT 8

(This article is based on material supplied by the American Institute of Accountants, national professional society of certified public accountants.)

SAID - IN ACCOUNTING - **DEFERRING FOR DEFERRING** Retention of earnings for future expansion or modernization is made easier by the granting of a \$50,000 accumulation-credit (total for all years). Also, if any part of a greater accumulation is deemed not for "reasonable needs" of the business, the penalty tax is applied only to the particular part, not to the entire accumulation for the year, as formerly.

Most important of all, burden of proof is now laid upon the Internal Revenue Service, not on you. In most cases, a business with legitimate savings for bonafide purposes of expansion or modernization need no longer fear the penalty tax.

6. SOME CORPORATE TAX PAYMENTS ACCELERATED: All is not sheer velvet, however, for the corporations. Those with an anticipated tax liability of \$100,000 or more must make their tax payments earlier in the year. The process is to be stepped up gradually over a five-year period. A firm which uses the calendar year (fiscal year corporations will use corresponding dates) will pay 5 per cent of its 1955 tax in September, 1955, 5 per cent in December 1955, and 45 per cent in March and again in June of 1956. Each year the September and December payments will increase and the March and June payments will decrease until there will be equal installments of 25 per cent in September and December 1959 and March and June of 1960.

7. GREATER OFF-SETS TO LOSSES: Under the old tax law, if you suffered a net loss one year,

the impact might have been stemmed somewhat by a carry-back to the preceding tax year. This carry-back generally meant you received a refund of some or all of the taxes you had paid this year before. Any losses not absorbed in this way would be carried forward for as many as five years following your loss year. These carry-forwards would reduce your taxes in later year, but they were no help in bringing in immediate cash. Now the new law provides for a carry-back for two years instead of one, in addition to the five-year carry forward. In many instances, this will mean that greater refunds of prior taxes will be available to add to your working capital.

There are only the high lights. Over 3,000 technical changes have been made in this colossal overhaul of the federal tax code. You may have to lose some sleep before you understand all the provisions that are important to your particular business. But once you do, chances are you'll be happier with the new law than you were with the old.

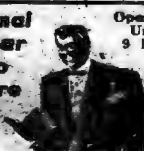

FARMINGDALE—It was again my privilege to attend a concert by students selected to represent their schools from all over Long Island at the new high school, here, on Saturday, Nov. 20. It was the annual performance in the sectional All State Music Festival sponsored by the NY State School Music Assoc.

These young people, selected by competitive audition and prepared by their own music directors were finally assembled for intensive rehearsing together under guest conductors the day before the program. Before that time, these 300 students were strangers to each

other. Twenty four hours later they had made new friendships and shared in one of the most inspiring enterprises offered by our schools.

I wish it were possible for more parents to attend not only the final performance of these affairs, but also some of the rehearsals and share the thrill of all of us as we hear the finished product emerge.

It is also my wish that our church choir directors could hear the quality of music and performance achieved by these young folks in so short a time. Too often, I believe, both junior and senior choir directors underestimate the capabilities of our children. It is a great help to the schools when members of our school choirs continue their training with musical standards which challenge their interest and ability. I am sure the reverse is also true when our work in the schools is well done. One of our primary aims is to prepare our young people for service in their church and temple choirs.

At the festival this year, about 250 Junior High School children from 7th to 9th grades gave a performance of five numbers in 4-part harmony that was almost unbelievable. The Senior Choir of nearly 300 sang numbers ranging from 4 to 8 parts, with a beauty of tone

and balance that many an adult group could well envy. They also sang four unaccompanied numbers with excellent intonation and real artistry, and closed with Mendelssohn's exciting "Festival Hymn of Praise" accompanied by the All State Sectional Orchestra.

For this number, the choir not only sang from platforms below the stage which was filled by the orchestra, but extended in a double row down the aisles two thirds of the way toward the back of the auditorium on both sides. The effect was electrifying with the music coming from all directions.

Hicksville was honored to have nine of its High School students admitted by competitive audition this year. They were: Leona Ackerman, Jacquella Dempsey, Eugene Nye, Barbara Cedrin, Judy Palovich, Pierre Gosh, Martha Wagner and Eric Wells.
