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**Handful Vote To Okay  
Woodland Ave School**

**HICKSVILLE**—In sharp contrast to recent contested elections of school trustees, only 77 persons cast their votes from among more than 2,000 registered and eligible, Tuesday, as the question of a million-dollar bond issue for a 20-room elementary school barely squeaked by, 59 to 18. A two-thirds affirmative vote was required to carry the Woodland Ave. School project in the northeast corner of the district and officials noted that if eight votes of the affirmative had been negative, the issue would have been lost.

With 77 votes cast, 78 percent voted yes and 22 percent no. Required for approval was not a majority but two-thirds of 66 2/3 percent which was just about achieved.

The reorganization meeting of the School Board takes place next Tuesday when Emil J. Szendy assumes his place or the Board in the place of Lawrence C. McCaffrey. Allen S. Carpenter who was named in a special election, took the place of Robert Corcoran immediately upon election.

**Plainview Sells School Bonds**

**PLAINVIEW**—The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville was the successful bidder, among four, and was sold \$320,581.00 in bonds by the Board of Education, Tuesday, covering the construction cost for the Manetta Hill School building there. The interest rate was 2.50 per cent. The Board also announced receipt of a check for \$1,010 from the Federal government to be applied toward the cost of a new school now planned for a 16-acre site recently acquired by the district.

A check list will be made out so that rider and parents may note and correct bicycle defects.

less, was requested by correspondence numerous times to meet with the civics, but to date all correspondence has been "unanswered."

**PENNER IN FIGHT**

Isaac Penner was also present to continue his fight against Press Wireless after several outbursts at the board and the attorney, Sullivan warned him that if he attempted continuing his attack "he would ask a policeman to remove him from the room." Floyd Griffin, Zoning Appeals Board Chairman, had all to do from saying the same to Mr. Penner on his tone and usage of language to the board throughout the discussion.

The NWCA agreed to a meeting with Press Wireless at the earliest possible date to discuss a settlement of the problems concerning "proper protection of children in

area" with installation of a fence, together with the health hazard that has arisen "due to the influx of bugs" from the property behind Kuhl Ave. belonging to PW and the stagnant water which lays on their property, together with TV, radio and electrical interference claimed as due to Press Wireless.

The hearing was adjourned until July 17, at the request of PW and agreed to by the Zoning Board with the hearing for the case scheduled for around 9:30 P.M. due the large number of cases already on the docket.

Penner in a general statement said, "I wash my hands of the entire case, after a long fight over a period of years with these people." He wished the Civics good luck in their venture, but felt that this was not the answer to the elimination of the continuous requests by PW for additional poles.

**RESULTS OF CONFERENCE**

At the invitation of Press Wireless, Inc. a representative group of the North West Civic Assoc. attended a conference on Tuesday night at Rothmann's East Norwich Inn. Representing the Civic Association in the discussion of their objections as voiced at the recent hearing, were: George McCarthy, Pres.; Guy B. Smith, Vice-Pres.; George Schultz, Treasurer; John Larkin, Sgt.-at-Arms; John Finnegan and Arthur Woods, and your reporter.

Press Wireless Inc. representatives were: W. J. McCambridge, Pres.; P.B.E. Wolbarst, Vice-Pres.; A. G. Greenway, Sec'y. & General Counsel; Richard Hilferty, Chief engineer; Michael J. Sullivan, attorney.

W. L. Kiser, Field Engineer in Charge of Industrial operations for the Federal Communications Commission, was invited by Press Wireless to hear the discussion on TV and radio reception and the problems arising from alleged interference.

After a lengthy thrashing of each individual question which arose, Pres. McCarthy stated the following at the close of the meeting, "It is the opinion of the committee that Press Wireless will do their utmost to eliminate the objectionable features of their operations as they affect the residents of North West Hicksville."

The Civics will hold a special meeting at Hicksville High School Wednesday July 9th at 8:30 P.M. for the ratification by the membership of the Committee's Report on their meeting with Press Wireless.

On behalf of Press Wireless, Inc. McCambridge in a statement to the Herald said, "Under existing operating and engineering methods it is believed that it will be impossible to erect any additional rhombic antenna, other than the two now applied for on existing land. If these conditions continue and Press Wireless Inc. has to expand its operations it is conceivable that Press Wireless will have to move its site of operations. However, future engineering developments might make possible erection of additional antennas on existing property due to changes in antenna design."

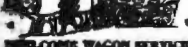

district 17, were it guilty of all the accusations leveled at it by Mr. Szendy, would only be guilty of employing common political methods of enlarging upon remote possibilities until they appear to be obvious truths. ## As Szendy Sees It:

Opinion on Levitt-House Matters  
By a Levitt-Home Owner

Accidental death last week, in a manner not yet acceptably explained, of an eight-year old boy in a Levitt-built Levittown pool, has again brought into wide discussion the operation of Levitt-built pools in Hicksville. Levitt home owners are much concerned about safety at the pools.

Two of the pools in the area were "closed for repairs" during the first two weeks of the season and the entire population of some 3000 homes, including those in Meadow, were directed to use the Levittown Parkway pool. This was done by the same NHLQA, now "administrating" the pools, who at the Town Board hearing on the "split" pleaded that use of a pool by more than 1000 homes would be unhealthy, with danger of pollution.

On the hot Sunday of June 15th the Levittown Parkway pool was crowded with children. Boys of ages from 8 to 14 popped off the high diving board with the frequency of figures diving in a speeded-up old-time movie. Those in the water below the board had little time to get away from the area before another small body hurtled down beside them.

It was only by the grace of God that a serious accident did not occur. The near miss, as diving bodies struck the water alongside of those who had just come to the surface, were much too frequent.

Control and supervision, by the one lifeguard in evidence of naturally boisterous children having a whale of a good time was a physical impossibility.

Attempts to ascertain from the Levitt organization when the closed pools would be open referred only in having the matter referred to Dr. Charles Miller, president of NHLQA, who has repeatedly denied that he was a spokesman for the Levitt organization or acting in its behalf.

The pool at the West Village Green has since opened, but the Carman ave. pool, East Meadow, remains closed. The floods have been blamed for the non-operation of the West Village Green pool, supposedly the wells feeding the pool have been discharging water unfit for swimming. If the artesian wells serving the pools are drilled to such shallow depths that they are polluted by surface water the obvious question is—ARE THEY SAFE AT ANY TIME? A second obvious question is—HOW COME THAT WITH THE FLOOD

## SITUATION MORE ACUTE FURTHER SOUTH, THE LEVITTOWN WELLS WERE NOT AFFECTED?

A more creditable explanation is that the sump into which the pool discharges became overfilled and opening of the pool drain valves did not drain the pool; instead the sump drained back into the pool. Whichever explanation applies, a health hazardous condition in one instance, and a structural defect in the other, exists. In either case the public should be thankful that, with two newly-built pools out of operation for appreciable lengths of time, they are not publicly owned and charges against the taxpayer's budget.

There has been, in addition, a third explanation rumored about, associated with the month's delay in issuing pool tags. It has been said that, with the pools accessible to all comers and with only one overcrowded pool available, it was expected that some incident would occur which would justify the claim that "overcrowding and property damage can only be avoided by a system limiting these pools to Levitt Home Owners."

While it is contended that the tagging procedure is necessary to prevent overcrowding, no attempt was made to prevent unsafe overcrowding on the 15th.

The public is aroused at the need for safe operation of the pools. It is far less concerned about who uses the pools than about how they are used.

The NHLQA is preoccupied with "tags" and "limited use". Though accepting "administrating" from Levitt, it has no true authority. It has already been remiss in assuring safe operating conditions. It is doubtful whether it can or should accept responsibility for "administrating". The pools are Levitt operated and the responsibility should be Levitt's.

Issuance of tags should also be Levitt's responsibility. Their issuance as a "civic" activity and their acceptance when issued under such auspices places the home owner in an equivocal position. He becomes party to the whole operation. He enters the pool premises by authority of a tag issued by a civic organization and not by authority from Levitt. WHO CAN BE THEN HOLD RESPONSIBLE FOR HIS SAFETY AND THE SAFETY OF HIS CHILDREN?

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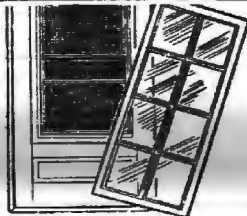

PLAINVIEW—in an interview with Water Commissioner Ralph Acheue, the following facts were made known:

The Plainview Water Commission is going ahead rapidly with its plans to make Plainview self-sufficient as to its own water

supply. Land is being acquired for wells and an engineer and a lawyer have been hired to handle the details.

It is hoped that by early Spring of 1953 part of the water used in this District will be from our own wells and as progress is made in

the drilling of these wells, we will gradually switch over 100 percent to our own supplies. This was all made necessary by the fact that Jericho District, from whom we have been buying water in the past, can no longer supply us due to the heavy drilling in their own community and the rapidly expanding use in Plainview.

There will be no immediate reduction in water rates, but it is the belief and hope of our Water Commission that in the future they will be able to lower our rates to a reasonable degree.

Only with your help and support will Plainview take its rightful place among the leading communities of Nassau County.

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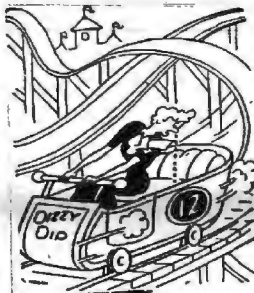
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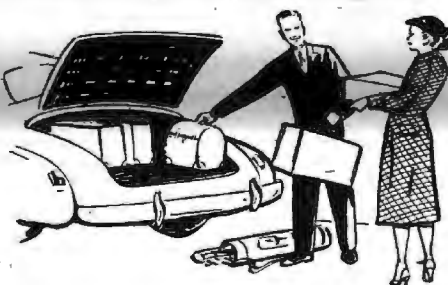

## Commissioners Tell Need For Hook And Ladder Truck

BETHPAGE — Edmund Thorne and Robert Gillespie, of the Bethpage Fire Commissioners, were guests at a meeting of the North Bethpage Civic Assn. meeting Wednesday night, June 18.  
Commissioner Gillespie explained the problem of the signal alarm system over the wide spread Beth-

page Fire District. He said that three new signal alarms have been ordered for the district and will be installed on Evergreen Ave. and two other outlying areas.

He said that most of the fire fighting equipment is in good condition with the alarming exception of the hook and ladder which is over 25 years old and has a maximum speed of 35mph.

"The Fire Commissioners are planning to present a proposal to the Bethpage residents early in September for the purchase of a \$32,000 hook and ladder truck," he announced.

"The cost to the taxpayer will not be high; in fact, it will probably be less than an increase in the rate of fire insurance should the Board of Fire Underwriters inspectors deem this necessary. The cost of a new truck would be paid in one year."

Commissioner Thorne spoke of the advantage of modern fire fighting equipment. He said that

a new hook and ladder would have a 50-foot aerial ladder with nozzle connections.

Members of the North Bethpage Civic Assn. were told that manpower available during working hours on week days is critical. Although the department has 110 men, only about 15 are able to respond to weekday fires.

The present hook and ladder requires 8 men for operation while a modern aerial hook and ladder needs only two men to operate the vehicle which also carries a wide assortment of rescue equipment.

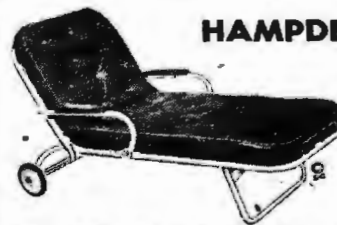
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# the Sportlight
