- 3—Do you favor continuing transportation under the present regulations with no further extension?
- 4—Do you favor reduction of present transportation?

Mrs. William Gianelli of 133 Bay Ave., chairman of the temporary local P-TA Council, said that each of the seven P-TAs and the Mothers Auxiliary of St. Ignatius School are being asked to cooperate and provide watchers for the "straw vote" which takes place at the same time and place as the budget decision.

A spokesman for the School Board made it plain that the results of the 4-question bus vote will be strictly "advisory" and cannot be binding upon the board.

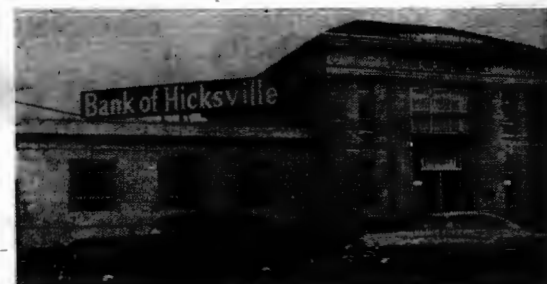
A break-down of the \$143,475.16 supplemental budget was also made public today. The funds will be utilized from present surplus funds and will not require an additional tax.

Pressure Group Fails To Impress Town Board

Oyster Bay town officials declined to yield to the pressure from a vocal minority of pro-Levittown forces this week as plans went forward for the referendum vote of resident property owners of Levitt-built houses in Hicksville on Friday, Jan. 30 at Dutch Lane School. An informal poll of opinion this week disclosed indifference and little support for proposal no. 1 (Levittown Hall) while there is general backing and approval for proposal no. 2 (Pool District).

Efforts to stampede Oyster Bay Town Board into adding a third "one district" question fell flat at

the Town Hall, Tuesday morning. Charles C. Miller, well-remembered for his previous antics and strong anti-Hicksville sentiments, was the spokesman for the delegation consisting largely of women and children. David Sigerson was reported ill.

"Motorecade" participants had been advised by circular before Tuesday not to request baby sitters but rather to be sure and bring along their children to the hearing.

LEADERS OF SPLIT

Most of the participants in the "march upon the Town Board" were recalled as active ring-leaders of the "split Hicksville" movement of last winter and spring which resulted in a public hearing on May 8 and a rejection of the plan by the Town Board in August, after careful deliberation.

Supervisor Charles E. Ransom was firm with the visitors who packed the Board hearing room. Any proposal for a third question, he had been advised by the town attorneys would be illegal. The referendum of Jan. 30 is being held to determine just what the people of the area want he said, and are willing to take upon themselves as tax burdens: the hall or the pool or both or nothing.

Ransom was obviously angry as Continued on Page 21

Hint Boost In Local State Aid

A bright note in Plainview's educational picture developed this past week when it was hinted that the district might be on the receiving end of more than \$45,000 in state aid. This amount represents a considerable increase over any previous grants made us by the state.



The source of this information pointed out, however, that actual receipt of the money will depend on legislative action. It is expected that the state legislature will take this action before the end of this current session which winds up in March. If true, and informed sources feel confident that the Albany lawmakers will pass school aid legislation, the district should get the aid in June.

On the dark side of the picture is the current story that Oyster Bay school officials are considering placing limitations on the number of Plainview students attending

their Junior High school. school will have to be constructed in the Morton Village area of Plainview and negotiations to acquire land in that area are in process.

With respect to the Oyster Bay. Again, if true, this will pose a tremendous problem for the already hard-pressed Plainview School district as present facilities are not equipped to handle Junior High students. Of course, with the final completion of the new 18-room school in north west Plainview, some provision might possibly be worked out. It is anticipated problem, the Plainview school board that the kindergartens in the new building will be ready for occupancy in the fall of '53 and the remainder sometime around January of '54. At the present time, this writer feels that another new will appeal to the North Shore authorities to delay their action as long as possible.

INTERESTING IF TRUE DEPARTMENT: Look for a move on the part of Bethpage to increase the present size of their school district northerly to include the

area directly north of Old Country Rd. This section is now in Plainview district. . . . Although several meetings have been held regarding the consolidation of the five districts, namely, Plainview, Plainedge, Island Trees, Bethpage and old Bethpage for the purpose of setting up high school districts, three of the districts still remain unconvinced of the feasibility of the plan. This is due primarily to the lack of financial information specifically the effect on the tax rates. In connection with this, it is heard about that the vote will be held in one central place with the majority deciding. This will come as a surprise to some of the districts involved who thought that each district would hold a vote in their own area.

At the present time, the general feeling is that Plainedge and Island Trees are pressing for the consolidation plan while the other three districts desire more financial data before making any commitments. If this is true, therein lies the reason for the heretofore unknown consolidation voting plan.

Town Gave Morton Bros Okay On 2x3 Studs, Civics Learn

PLAINVIEW—Construction on the 2000-home Morton Village project was halted here when the town building dept. discovered that 2x3 studs were being used for wall partitions, it was disclosed this week. However, the town board upon application from the developer has granted permission to use 2x3s in sections 1 and 2 of the project. The revelation was made at the Civic and Community Assoc. meeting in Manetto Hills School, Tuesday night.

Norman Riley, president, reported that on Jan. 12 the Assoc. wrote Building Inspector William S. Tilford questioning the use of 2x3s as a possible violation of subsect. 1(b) sect. 12, art. 5 of the Town Building Code which calls for the use of 2x4s.

Tilford replied that after his office had halted "all operations"

the builder's engineer "contended that this use of 2x3 studs was within the code on the theory that a 2x3 stud would give a 2x4 partition." Morton Bros. also pleaded that steel door frames for all units in section 1 and 2 were already on the premises and "that such frames would be useable only with such 2x3 studding."

Tilford added: "Morton Bros. subsequently made application to the town board asking for permission to continue to use 2x3s in non-bearing partitions, providing cutting and bracing be used to give required strength and rigidity. The application of Morton Bros. was granted and limited to sections 1 and 2."

The first section is believed to number about 300 homes. Original-

ly occupancy had been anticipated by early December.

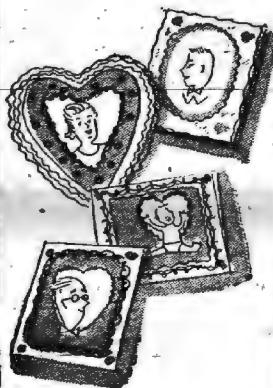

My last column brought much comment because of the Lebanese dishes I described. In response to this I offer a recipe for Kibbee. To a pound of extra lean shoulder

lamb that has been ground at least four times to make it very fine, add one cup of cracked wheat that has been soaked in cold water for three minutes. Add one teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper and one small onion grated. Mix thoroughly. Grease baking pan 8x3 with butter, separate mixture in half. Cover bottom of pan with one half of mixture. Sprinkle ¼ cup pine nuts. Make another layer from second-half. While mixture is in pan score into one inch squares to facilitate separation after baking.

Put three tablespoons butter on top. Bake 350 degrees for half hour. Serve with vegetables and salad. Carlton Fredericks and other food authorities recommend this for both nutrition and economy, due largely to the cracked wheat. In Syria and Lebanon and environs the lamb is usually ground by pounding with a heavy wooden mallet against a marble crock a foot square. No Arabian household is without this. As a matter of fact we still use this method at home. The mallet is called the imdehah, and the crock is (Continued on Page 19)

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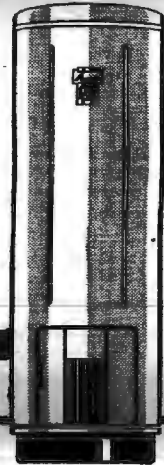
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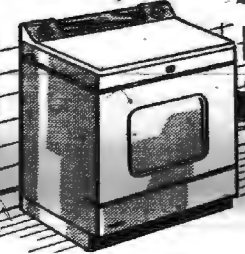

ANOTHER COMMUNITY HOUSE:

Locust Valley Plan Workable

What is the pattern of operation of community houses and what do they offer to the people? Is Levittown Hall a full fledged community hall? Does it offer the facilities offered by other community houses? Should it be tax-supported? Or should it be operated on a voluntary basis? These are the questions to be answered before we determine the conditions under which we should accept Levittown Hall as a tax burden or otherwise.

In last week's South Hicksville Herald, the Glen Cove Neighborhood House, its facilities, and the method of paying for it through membership dues, the Community Chest, and voluntary donations were discussed. This week a com-

munity house of a much different character is described. It is the Locust Valley Library and Community House on Buckram Road in Locust Valley.

The Locust Valley Library and Community House is primarily a public library operated by the school district, but there are facilities for many other types of activity. There is an auditorium which seats approximately 200 people and is used for meetings of large groups as well as for amateur theatricals and similar activities. There are also two moderate sized meeting rooms, one of which is currently turned over to the Civil Defense organization. In addition, there are two bowling alleys and four outdoor tennis courts for athletic recreation. The building is administered by head

librarian Miss Helen Land, an assistant librarian, and a custodian.

The Locust Valley Library and Community House is operated by the school board and supported by tax funds, but there is an important factor that it is an all-around community project which offers much to all types of people. There is the library which in most communities is publicly operated and in conjunction with this are the auditorium, meeting rooms, bowling alleys, and tennis courts.

When compared with community houses in nearby communities, Levittown Hall has quite a way to go before it approaches them in the scope of its operations. It appeals to a much smaller group of people, only those who are interested in having a meeting place. Those who want other things must look elsewhere.—The Editors.

Why a Referendum?

Placing the pools and Hall under municipal operation means adding more taxes. The pools were promised by Levitt and Sons for the "free use" of the house purchasers. The Hall was built by Levitt of his own free choice; he promoted its use by offering it free for use by Levitt-house owners, paying the cost of operation and maintenance for the past eighteen months.

Levitt and Sons now wish to divest themselves from cost of operation and maintenance and make them a tax charge. Charles E. Ransom, Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay, has said, "I will not take part in putting additional burdens on these persons, unless they themselves, by the majority of the votes, express their desire for it." Hence the referendum.

Agreement Reached—And Disowned

The SENTINEL has it on excellent authority that each of the nine members of the so-called Steering Committee, the majority of whom were appointed by Levitt, were individually polled by Supervisor Harold Herman of the Town of Hempstead on Saturday morning, Jan. 11, on acceptability of the proposal subsequently publicized by the Town Boards as a referendum in this area on a "Swimming Pool District" and a "Joint Levittown Hall District", and that all indicated their acceptance. On the next night, Sunday, reports were current that the Steering Committee was meeting with Levitt. On Monday, coincident with the Town Boards' announcement that "There is unanimous agreement" and listing the names of the Steering Committee as parties to the agreement, the Committee blasted the Town Boards' proposal as unacceptable, and attacked the officials in the process. The officials were "amazed" and "disgusted", and rightly so. So was every right-thinking citizen.

Swimming Pool District

The "swimming Pool District" proposed by the two Town Boards follows pretty much along the lines suggested by the SENTINEL as an acceptable form of municipal operation if Levitt "is permitted to get away with it," is, renege on his promise of "free use". It would be a special district set up by the Town Board of Oyster Bay for operation of the pools in this area, with the Levitt-house owners in this area taxed for the costs of operation and maintenance. "It is understood that in no way will the creation of these two districts affect the Hicksville Park and Parking District. Recreational facilities in the area would remain in the Hicksville District," said the Town Boards in their announcement.

Joint Levittown Hall District

The Joint "Levittown Hall District" would be established jointly by the two Town Boards to operate the Hall, and the Levitt-house owners in both the Town of Oyster Bay and the Town of Hempstead would be taxed for the costs of operation and maintenance. The Hall operation will be posed as a separate question in the referendum, the announcement indicated. Many want the pools, but want no part of the Hall.

"We have requested Mr. Levitt to open the hall immediately, since our proposed plan meets all the requirements he listed for the resumption of its operation," the Town Boards said. Yet, Levitt refused to reopen the hall. Which seems to bear out the assumption some make that Levitt and the Steering Committee are acting in harmony, and the Steering Committee is not acting in the public interest.

The "Split" Again

The following alternate question has been suggested by the Steering Committee: "Do you want the Pools, parks, playgrounds, ballfields, and community hall to be municipally operated under a park district to include all of the Levitt homes in the towns of Oyster Bay and Hempstead with taxes equally distributed throughout such established park district?"

Obviously, this was only a variant on the original proposal that the facilities in this area be absorbed by a super Levittown Park District.

By Friday night, to make that less obvious, the proposal had been changed to a "Joint District" instead of a "Park District". The same facilities were to be affected in the same manner. Only the name of the district was changed. The same objections still applied.—the facilities would be split from the Hicksville Park and Parking District, our first firm bond with Levittown would be forged, and others might follow. And the pools and Hall were to be offered as a package,—take all, or none.

Reciprocal Use of the Pools

The Steering Committee had the affronters, after reneging on its acceptance of the Town officials' proposal, to question the good faith of the officials with whom it had broken faith, claiming that there was doubt that "there would be reciprocal agreement for the use of the facilities of both towns worked out by the respective boards", as stated by the Boards.

The Steering Committee positively "bleeds" at the prospect that the pools in this area would not be available to the residents of Levittown. Yet, for the last two seasons, the pools in the Levittown area have not been available to the residents in this area, and there is little prospect that they will be available during the coming season. "1000 families per pool is the maximum for health" NLHOA spokesmen emphasized and reemphasized at the East Street School hearing, "and, therefore, other Hicksville residents must be excluded". Yet, NLHOA is now plugging for admitting Levittowners to bring the number of pool users up to 2000 per pool. Which is also worried about possible lack of reciprocal use.

"Hicksville pools were crowded last summer when Levittown pools were relatively uncrowded", pointed out by a speaker at the NLHOA meeting last Friday. Levittowners were being admitted to (Continued on Page 14)

NLHOA Backs Levitt-Picked Steerers Flip-Flop on Town Vote

The North Levittown Home Owners Assoc. meeting in the Dutch Lane School in Hicksville within a stone's throw of padlocked Levittown Hall where they had met in the past, reaffirmed its backing of the Levitt-appointed Steering Committee in its efforts to transfer the pools and Hall and other Levitt-built facilities in this area to municipal ownership and the home-owner's tax bill.

It also endorsed the Steering Committee's program for bringing pressure on the Oyster Bay Town

Board to change the questions planned for the coming referendum, intended to determine separately disposition of the pools and the Hall, to one question, affirmative acceptance of which would place all facilities in both Hempstead and Oyster Bay in a Joint District which would join the Hicksville-area recreational facilities to those in the Levittown Park District.

DENOUNCES REFERENDUM

In explaining the Committee's program, David Sigerson, Levittown Civic Council president and

member of the Steering Committee, denounced the Town Boards' referendum as a "proposal in the nature of a trap" and said that while the Town Boards had mentioned reciprocal use there was "no guarantee that reciprocal rights would be set up"—that by changing the questions "there was a chance to make it a real referendum instead of a phony one", and that "by joining the facilities under one Joint-District the cost in the Oyster Bay area would be less."

It was pointed out from the floor that the objections now made against a separate Swimming Pool District had been waived aside by NLHOA spokesmen when they advocated establishment of a "North Levittown District" at the East St. School hearing May 9, and that the proposal now made was basically no different in cost from the one made by NLHOA last year and acceptable to them at that time.

NEW FIGURES CITED

When questioned about the cost of operation of the pools Sigerson said that, according to Levitt's figures, the total cost, including guards paid out of the \$1.00 tag fee, was \$9,970 per pool, or about \$10 per family, and that this cost exceeded by several dollars taxes paid in Levittown for the Levittown Park District. This was termed as a "small potatoes attitude" in one comment from the floor, especially as NLHOA members speaking at the East St. School hearing had professed their willingness to pay up to \$40 and \$60 per year for operation of the pools by the North Levittown Park District. "The amount involved certainly does not justify quarreling with the Town Boards", the speaker contended.

The Town Boards' proposal generally parallels recommendation (Continued on Page 14)

made by SHALHO in informal discussions with the members of the NLHOA executive committee, Marvin Suttan, NLHOA president; said SHALHO member, George Kunz, asked the present opinion of the NLHOA executive committee regarding the SHALHO recommendations and was told the NLHOA had endorsed and was endorsing the Steering Committee. It had been implied at the SHALHO meeting on Jan. 6 that SHALHO recommendations were receiving acceptance by NLHOA.

Sigerson said that he had both written and telegraphed the Oyster Bay Town Board requesting it to change the questions on the referendum to one authorizing a joint

district with Levittown, and that there was now "only one method left, to go to see the Town Board." Both he and Suttan asked those present to join in a mass descent upon the Town Board on Tuesday, Jan. 20.

Harold Schwartz, NLHOA Civic Affairs Committee reported that the Bowery was reviewing accounts and he had received reports of refunds and reductions in amount of mortgage payment.

Takes, believe it or not, in this area, are down", he said with some amusement. the Hicksville pools but Hicksville-area residents were being excluded from the Levittown pools. Nobody "bled" for the poor people in this area. Levitt and the NLHOA were operating their pools.

Taxes

The Steering Committee, made up largely of Levittown residents, is also worried that our pool costs per capita will be higher than theirs, and wishes to share our taxes.

"A natural condition of any reciprocal-use agreement would be that there be "quid-pro-quo," an equal exchange. Reciprocity on costs of pool operation in the two townships could be arranged as part of the reciprocal use deal. With reciprocity on pools only, it would not be necessary for us to support the numerous remote play areas in Levittown, practically inaccessible to our children, as would be the case under the package deal sponsored by the Steering Committee.

Abraham Levitt Field

There is only one recreational field in the South Hicksville area, Abraham Levitt Field. Under the Town Boards' proposal, this field, and the various weed-grown parks, and the badly-maintained children's playgrounds, would be taken over by the Hicksville Park and Parking District. The Steering Committee is aghast at the prospect. Levittowners would be denied the use of the ballfield, and the entire Little League Program would be destroyed.

Perhaps some of the people can be fooled all of the time, and all of the people some of this time, but it would take an extremely low I.Q. to swallow that one at any time. Are visiting teams ever barred from the use of home grounds? Is there any likelihood that all Hicksville will forsake its local playfields and use only Abraham Levitt Field?

On the site is still posted the NOTICE previously reported by the SENTINEL. It reads: THIS PARK AREA MAY NOT BE USED FOR ANY SPORTS OR HOBBY ACTIVITIES. ANYONE SO USING THE AREA WILL BE SUBJECT TO TRESPASSING CHARGES. That should keep those terrible Hicksville boys out. It is surprising it did not keep the Northwest Little Leaguers out: they too must have been trespassing.

Clean Break From Levitt Interference Needed

If "free use" cannot be secured, the "Swimming Pool District will provide us with municipal operation by our own Town Board. We don't need the Hall, and would be better off without it; the Joint Levittown Hall District should be voted down.

What playgrounds and parks exist should be operated by the Hicksville Park and Parking District.

All our problems in connection with the Levitt-constructed recreational facilities would then be solved and permit a clean break from Levitt interference.

We would not become North-Levittown, or part of the Super-City of Levittown, which the we-give-our-name-to-communities developer has always desired—and subject to Levittown's higher taxes. We could start living peacefully in Hicksville.

Hall Not Indispensable

While the Hall remained closed and the organizations which had used it found other quarters, Levitt's hand-picked Steering Committee redoubled efforts to complete its assignment from Wm. Levitt to steer the cost of operation and maintenance of the various facilities constructed by Levitt, especially the Hall, into the laps of the taxpayers.

What this so-called Steering Committee was and is, trying to do is to increase your taxes and mine and obligate us to pay those additional taxes year after year so that Levitt and Sons would be relieved of the promise of "free use" of the pools, and so that a small minority of the population would have a meeting place tax-supported by you and me to the tune of \$100 per day.

That the Hall is indispensable to this community is that much bunk, —that is being demonstrated each day the Hall remains closed. On the contrary it might prove an asset to this community not to have a Levittown Hall, operated, as it has been, by a Levitt employee as a propaganda centre for Levitt, Levittown, and such organizations as the Committee for Justice for the Rosenbergs.

We in this area of Hicksville might be able to achieve a normal, peaceful existence if we were not persistently prodded by old and new forms of aggression emanating from the Hall. We certainly could concentrate more on solving our own problems if Levittowners tended to their own knitting and

stopped sticking their fingers into our affairs.

Of the nine-member Steering Committee now trying to bring pressure in Levitt's interests on the Town Board of Oyster Bay, only two reside in this area; neither is authorized to speak for any group, or can be considered a representative voice, from this area.

NLHOA and SHALO, even the Education Assoc., now have regularly scheduled meeting dates at the Dutch Lane School. All of the schools are being used by Scout groups meeting before 6 P.M. The Dutch Lane School has been designated by the School Board as available for local evening civic activities which cannot conveniently be scheduled for the High School.

To express it in the vernacular, we, in this area, need the Hall, as it has been operated, as much as we need a hole in the head. Other facilities are available to us. And it is tough enough to make ends meet without adding another obligation, a tax obligation, the expense of an unneeded facility, to our budget.

The Hall should not be accepted as another tax obligation.

For those who hate to see the structure go to waste, —let it become "Levitt House", a neighborhood house which would really serve the community and receive willing voluntary support because of the service it renders to all, without distinction because of race, creed, color, or HOUSE. As such it would promote friendliness and good relations, not serve only to foster isolationism and separatism based upon house ownership, —that should not exist and is repugnant to most.

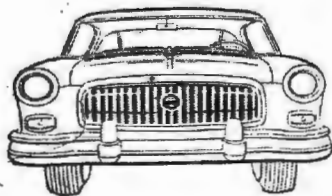
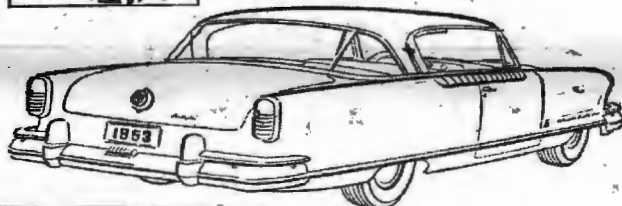

Using Ballots To Get Views

WE HOPE there will be a lot of spirited voting next week. There are several major questions to be settled and curiously our public officials in each case are going to the public for advice via the ballot box.

Next Thursday, Jan. 29, between 4 and 10 PM at Hicksville High School auditorium, all qualified voters of the school district (there are over 2,200 registered and thus qualified) will vote upon four questions involving student transportation (text on front page) to advise the board and upon the question of supplemental budget appropriation. There has been considerable back and forth talk on the bus problem recently.

Next Friday, Jan. 30, between 5 and 10 PM at the new Dutch Lane School, Hicksville, all resident property owners of houses in Hicksville (Oyster Bay Township) built by Levitt and Sons since 1950 will vote on two questions regarding municipal operation of the much-discussed two swimming pools and Levitt's White Elephant Hall.

Text of these two questions appears elsewhere on this page as a legal notice. Depending upon how the ownership of each home is listed (husband and wife, in most cases) there could be 4,600 eligible voters.

Much depends upon the outcome of both these elections. We sincerely hope they will be decisive, with majority and minority clearly defined in final tally.

Voting is a fundamental American democracy process. It is refreshing to see our public officials utilize this device to determine the will of the people.

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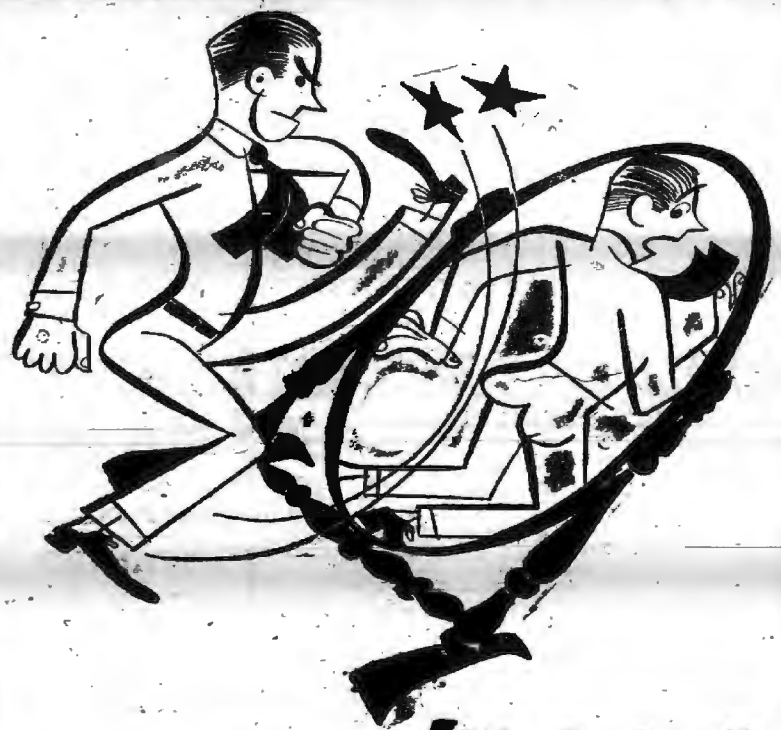

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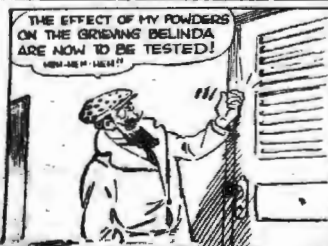
