In accordance with the rules adopted by the National Association of Amateur Baseball Players' 1861 convention, the players' underhand pitches will cross the metal home plate to be judged by an umpire who was selected by a consensus of the teams' members because of his "correct and gentlemanly demeanor".

Newspaper reports of the actual 1861 game indicated that the contest, won by the Eureka,

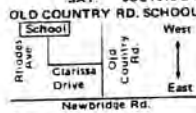

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Traffic Accidents,, Injuries Decline Slightly: Nassau Police

A report from the Nassau County Police Traffic Safety Unit indicates a slight drop in both the number of traffic accidents and traffic accident injuries in the first six months of 1980 in the portion of the county patrolled by the County Police according to Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi.

"I am aware that the decrease is slight but it still represents the smallest number of accidents recorded in the county since 1975," stated Rozzi. "There are a number of factors affecting the decline including the aggressive enforcement by police officers in

Highway Patrol especially in our TEAM unit."

Figures indicate that there was a reduction of accidents from 14,627 in 1979 to 13,573 in 1980. Accidents with injuries dropped from 4,760 to 4,611 and the total number of people injured dropped from 6,634 to 6,470. The only increase was in the number of people killed, increasing by five from 53 to 58. While the decreases are slight, they compare favorably with increases experienced in the past in the county and present increases in other jurisdictions.

The TEAM Unit (Traffic Enforcement Additional Manpower) is a federally funded program of 23 police officers and supervisors who have been charged with enforcing the 55 m.p.h. speed limit, drunk driving and enforcement at high accident frequency locations in the county. Working on a base of 1977, the unit reduced accidents at these selected intersections by over 30% by the end of 1979 and since January, 1980 they have reduced accidents by 50% at these locations.

For example, Hempstead

Turnpike and Hicksville Road, Bethpage was the scene of 46 accidents in 1977. In 1979 there were only 26 and so far this year 8. In 1979 TEAM Grant personnel issued 1,610 traffic citations at this location and well over 1,000 this year.

Another intersection, Sunrise Highway and Rockaway Avenue in Valley Stream experienced 28 traffic accidents in 1977 which dropped to 21 in 1979 and so far this year to one. 327 traffic citations were issued at this location in 1979 and 127 so far in 1980.

"There are certainly other factors

affecting the decrease such as better weather conditions in the winter of 1980 and the possible decrease in automobile travel caused by higher fuel costs," stated Rozzi. "Even taking these into account, the TEAM personnel are having an impact on the problem. Certainly additional manpower directed at traffic enforcement could have even better results."

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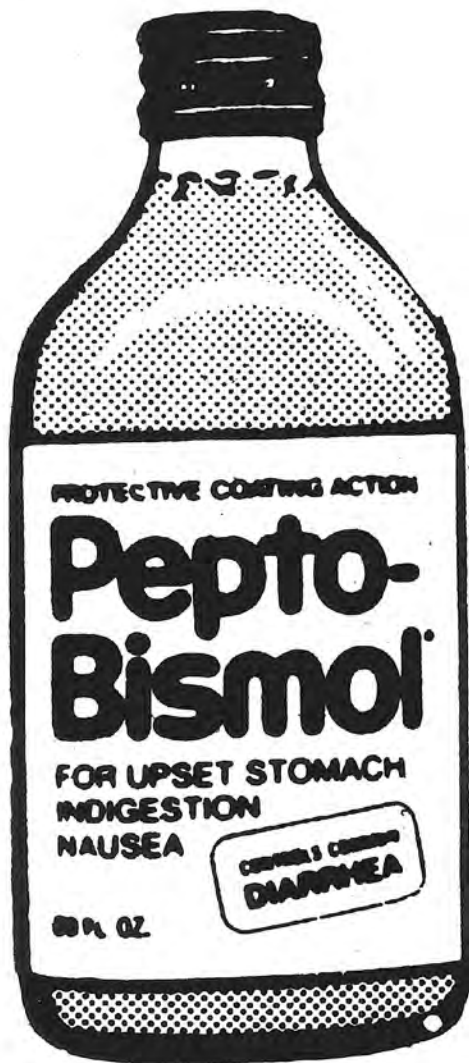

When Winning Means Losing
For the Christian life is idyllic. As you embrace Christ your problems become opportunities, heartaches turn into joys, bad times fade into the past. Your career succeeds as it never has. Your relationship with those around you is enhanced. Unkind words once directed towards you no longer make their way to your ears. Temptation runs against you then retreats in dismay. Money is no longer a problem, for you'll have more than enough. Lovely flowers moving in the fresh breeze send their elegant fragrance your way, as the warming rays of the sun fill your body with the feeling of health and beautiful harmony with God and nature. As God's special person, He spares you from pain, problems, and paucity.

Hogwash, unmitigated

hogwash—more like heresy. If Christianity is as I have just described it, then all of us must be wondering whether we really are Christians. Although our walk with Jesus brings us many blessings that will enhance our lives, the Evil One does not roll over and play dead when we follow Christ but continues to dog us as we make our way through life. Following Jesus Christ also brings with it a degree of suffering as our selfishness is lost to service and discipleship.

And as we struggle to be what we are, children of God through Baptism, it is often hard and painful. Christ suffered, his followers suffered, we too will have the privilege of suffering. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Christian martyr in 1945, writes, "When Christ calls a man, He bids him come and die." Perhaps more than any of us, our Christian brothers and sisters in Communist countries understand this. Many are imprisoned for their faith. Some die. All are ostracized. We, in this country, don't have it hard, but those who are actively serving the Lord often experience exhaustion over long hours of toil. When we do not have the success we'd like with some of our best efforts at ministry, suffering results.

We who try to live a moral life in a society that is so permissive

know the suffering that sometimes accompanies our uniqueness. Often others look at us in disbelief when we stand for something because it's right rather than because it's expedient. But for us to do less is to march to a different drum beat than the one Jesus sounds. Jesus puts it to us today, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

Our march through life does not end at the grave but moves beyond. Our vision is both present and future, in this world and the next. Courageously we meet the world proclaiming the glory of the Lord in word and

deed finding strength through Him to overcome the present, whatever conflicts our faith might encounter. Leaning on Him we seek His Spirit's power to help us deny ourselves, to bear His cross and to even suffer for the Gospel's sake. We desire with Him that all men whom He loves might become His children through faith and might join Him and us at the Father's house in eternity.

And when we arrive God will look over—not for medals, or awards, or degrees, but for scars. Finding them, He will declare, "Ah, a wise person who understood that winning meant losing."
