Hearing Set On Special Use Permit in Hicksville

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Douglas J. Hynes announced that the town board has scheduled a November 17 public hearing on a request for a special use permit in Hicksville. Hynes said, "The applicant, Wee Care Holding Corp., is requesting a special use permit in a 'G-1' district to allow the operation of a children's day care center."

The property is located on the south side of West Nicholas Street, west of the southwest corner formed by the intersection of Broadway and West Nicholas Street, also known as 21 West Nicholas Street in Hicksville.

The hearing is scheduled to begin at 10 am in the Town Hall East hearing room, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

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Nagle: Asbestos is Not a Problem in Our Schools

Hicksville schools do not have an asbestos problem Thomas Nagle, school board president, announced at last week's board of education meeting. He said that the matter is being researched as the school district would like a certified inspection of all buildings. Currently, there is no certified agency to inspect schools and give this certification, he said. The board will continue to look into finding such a person or agency.

In other school matters, a Nassau County Music Association award, in support of music education that has brought the music program above and beyond expectation, will be presented to superintendent of schools, Dr. Catherine Fenton, and Dr. G. Robert Couillard, assistant superintendent. This is the first time this organization has given a joint award to a district.

Rezoning of Burns Avenue

A question was raised by a resident in regard to the rezoning of Burns Avenue School, which is now zoned commercial, and when it was going to be changed to make it the same as the other seven elementary schools, which are residential. She was concerned as Mid Island Plaza is slated to begin renovation in the back of the mall. Mr. Nagle informed the resident that the board has not discussed this problem yet.

Resident's Comments

A resident commented on the success of the individual tours of the school buildings, and the excellent condition of the school's facilities.

A question was asked as to where Mr. McBride (a school board member) was and whether or not he was returning. Mr. Nagle said that this is still being discussed by the board, and that Mr. McBride has requested a change in the November board meeting so that he may attend. This will be discussed by the board. In answer as to how the seat is filled if Mr. McBride does not return, Mr. Nagle said that the board will interview people to fill the vacant seat until May, and the new election.

Superintendent's Message

Dr. Fenton commented on the fact that the board, residents and students had been disturbed about the damage to driver education cars, which had been vandalized last year. The board had directed administration to proceed with the evidence they had. They went to court, pressed charges, and were awarded \$573.83 for damaged property.

In regard to the public tours of the building which were offered during the past two weeks, 25 people toured the school buildings; some new parents and some just interested community members. Dr. Fenton announced. The district may consider doing this each year in September.

New York State Legislators have decided to change the criteria for the New York State Scholarships. Dr. Fenton said. The reason given is that most of the awards were received by males - 72%. SAT scores are now the only criteria. Legislators have decided that this year they will give students an ID number, take all test results of students, average grade scores in major subjects, and then they will

Recycling Plant's Fumes is Residents' Major Concern

The Town of Oyster Bay does not seem to be enforcing any control over Twin County Recycling in Hicksville which is emitting noxious fumes throughout the area. Kathy Del Rosso said at Duffy Park Civic Association's meeting held last week.

The highly publicized concerns over Twin County, 449 W. John St., deals with local residents' complaints of hazardous fumes emitted from the plant and the civic association's efforts to have the plant shut down.

"We are concerned with the deterioration of our Hicksville," Mrs. Del Rosso, Duffy Civic's president, said. "Since the Town of Oyster Bay doesn't seem to enforce special use permits on odors and emissions controls—especially on Twin County—we went to the Environmental Protection Agency." Mrs. Del Rosso explained that EPA representatives tested the "foul, smelling plume" and found that hazardous hydrocarbons are being emitted and that violations will be issued.

Town attorney Robert Schmidt said that Twin County would not be approved today but it was in 1970. "When Twin County got its special use permit in 1982, air regulations did not exist then," he said. When Mrs. Del Rosso asked why the town was "powerless and ineffective after four years of residents' complaints about the smell," Mr. Schmidt said that the town did not have the necessary scientists to do air studies for expert testimony in court. Mrs. Del Rosso then asked why the town did not appoint an expert for Duffy Park. Mr. Schmidt said that the expert they did appoint, Mr. Close, would testify that there was no smell when he visited the plant. "You may have a real good shot at shutting down the facility or getting it changed to a facility that wouldn't produce those hydrocarbons if in fact these hydrocarbons cause a real danger," he added. Mr. Schmidt urged Duffy Park residents to get violations

to prove so that the town can get Twin County shut down. "Violations must be reported and documented as court evidence," he said.

The failure of the town to enforce the air quality standards on Twin County was addressed by Assemblyman Fred Parola. Also discussing the issue was town councilman Louis Yevoli. Although Mr. Schmidt did not agree with some of the statistics Mr. Yevoli presented at the meeting, he did agree with both Parola and Yevoli that Twin County is a "massive problem." He also said that the state sees it as a local problem, and the federal government provides no guidance and little funding. He cited the state's complicated regulatory system as "complicated and untested." Mr. Schmidt said, "There are no set guidelines in hearings like these...where the rules tend to change midstream."

In discussing possible solutions, Mr. Schmidt said, "We have to come up with a solution where the state of New York handles the garbage of the state of New York." He added, "That has translated into a policy by the state of New York that says local government handle it."

Mr. Schmidt maintains that the state should work to help local governments, but Mr. Yevoli looks to the federal government and local residents to help; Duffy Park clearly sees it as the town's job. Mrs. Del Rosso said, "Since the town issues the permits, they should enforce them."

Mr. Yevoli said, "The governor has no real desire to take the garbage problem head-on; he thinks it is a local problem to be handled locally." Mr. Yevoli denounced Governor Cuomo's philosophy, saying that the state should provide the expertise and financing so that problems like Twin County could be avoided. On the local level, Mr. Yevoli stressed the importance of recycling. "The more you recycle, the less you have to burn. This

is more economically and environmentally sound for taxpayers." He also resolved that much smaller plants should be built far from residential areas, and that "good, solid federal laws should be enacted to cut down on the amount of packaging plastics and paper in order to reduce the waste stream." Referring to a pilot recycling program in his own neighborhood, Mr. Yevoli said that it "seems to be working very well."

By instituting mandatory recycling, Mr. Yevoli said, "In order to incinerate as little as possible, you have to remove as much as possible. If you can reduce the waste stream by 50 percent, then the town only has to burn 500 tons of garbage per day as opposed to the 1,000 tons it currently burns." Mr. Parola added that the state wants to set recycling at 50 percent by the year 1997, and that NYPIRG

wants 90 percent recycling in five years. But since there are no resource recovery plants in New York State, the state's garbage must be shipped elsewhere or fill landfills, according to Mr. Yevoli. Mr. Schmidt said, "It is grossly unfair and unjust to say the Town of Oyster Bay set recycling at 90 percent." In listing many difficulties, Mr. Schmidt said that more problems arise when interstate commerce comes into play, which is "out of the town's control."

Mrs. Del Rosso said, "Our main objective is to maintain and improve the quality of our lives at Duffy Park." Leonard Austin, a town supervisor also speaking at the meeting, agreed. "If we can't take care of our own problems and form a unified front, then we can't ask the state and federal government for help," he said. "Let's stay local and not pass the buck."

decide on the allocation of awards. Since the awards will be based on gender, race and ethnicity, Dr. Fenton maintains that there will be less awards for Hicksville. The district won 26 in 1985-86 and 29 in 1986-87.

Use of Middle School—The present and future use of the extra space at the Middle School will be discussed at the next meeting of the Reorganization Committee.

Some options are:
1. Closing the Middle School and moving seventh and eighth grades to the high school.
2. Moving the sixth grade to the Middle School.
3. Placing four grades in elementary, four grades in Middle School and four grades in high school.

Renting Cafeteria

The possibility of renting the Cafeteria A and Choral Room area to a tenant was discussed. This renovation would require a wall between the tenant's area and the school, a heating system that could be controlled when school was not in session, and bathroom facilities. It would cost approximately \$86,000.

Mr. Klein, principal of the Middle School had a proposal for the use of this space. He

would like a Music Suite designed, similar to the high school, with a music area, choral room, instrument storage area, and a drama suite. This would cost approximately \$40,000.

He also spoke about providing an area on the black top parking location, outside of Cafeteria A, where the students could utilize part of their lunch period to go outside to tables, benches, and some recreational activities.

Reorganization Committee

Mrs. Carole Wolf, school board member, asked for an approval of \$725 for the mailing of a survey in regard to the Reorganization Committee. This survey would go to approximately 13,000 residents. It is subject to approval of the Committee at their meeting on Wednesday, November 4 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Now, help for long Island residents who are blind or who are visually impaired is available through this new regional resource, the miracle of sight can be restored to those who can't see. According to Peter Kenney, representative of the club, it has been estimated that 30,000 Americans could have improved or fully restored vision each year through corneal transplantations if there were enough donor eye tissue for the pro-

cedure. The only substitute for one human cornea is another.

Approximately 10 percent of all totally blind persons, and many with limited vision, could have their sight restored, Mr. Kenney said. Most eyes can be used for corneal transplants, others for cosmetic surgery. Also eye tissue can be used to construct ear canals. Thus one eye can give the gift of sight and hearing to those who need them. While making the decision to donate one's eyes in the future, many questions may arise. What the Politicians are Saying...

STATE SENATOR MICHAEL J. TULLY, JR., (R-Roslyn Heights) highlights the Consumer Protection Legislation recently signed into law:

• **CARBONLESS CREDIT CARD TRANSACTION FORMS**—This law requires the issuance and use of credit card forms which are carbonless or do not readily identify the credit card holder by name or number after completion of the credit card transaction.

• **MOTOR VEHICLE REPAIR SHOP DISCLOSURE**—Motor vehicle repair shop invoices and estimates must now also clearly state whether any body parts supplied were manufactured as original equipment parts for the vehicle, were manufactured as nonoriginal replacement parts, or are used parts.

• **MOTOR VEHICLE REDEMPTION RIGHTS**—A holder of a motor vehicle installment contract who repossesses or accepts a voluntary surrender of the motor vehicle now has 72 hours to notify the vehicle buyer of information regarding the redemption of the vehicle.

• **BONDING REQUIREMENTS FOR HEALTH CLUBS**—Every health club, before it enters into a contract for services with any buyer of a health club membership, is required to file a bond with the Secretary of State for the purpose of guaranteeing refunds if the health club goes out of business.

• **TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR BOTTLED WATER SOLD IN THE STATE**—This measure requires the bacteriological and chemical testing of bottled water sold in New York State.

ASSEMBLYMAN DANIEL FRISA (R-Westbury) has announced his legislative agenda to deal with the state's current child care crisis:

"The state can involve the business community in sponsoring work-based, on-site day care centers for their employees' children by approving my legislation to provide a 10 percent tax credit for each day care position created. Without tax incentives the vast majority of businesses would never get involved. Without this involvement, universal day care services will never be accomplished because the cost of these services is too massive for the state to take on alone."

GOVERNOR MARIO M. CUOMO has announced the publication of a pamphlet explaining New York's laws concerning age discrimination and advising people how to use the law to protect their rights. The booklet, "Too Young, Too Old?" is available by sending a stamped self-addressed envelope (legal size) to: Public Information Office, NY State Division of Human Rights, 55 West 125 Street, NY, NY 10027.

REPRESENTATIVE ROBERT J. MRAZEK (D-Centerport) and Dr. Edward Martin, president of the Human Resources Center in Albertson have announced the award of a two year grant from the Social Security Administration to the Human Resources Center. The grant will be used to undertake a research and demonstration project—an innovative project which will attempt to coordinate public (Social Security) and private (insurance carriers) to meet the problem of helping to return injured workers back to productive careers and to reduce insurance costs.

Nassau Veterans Deserve a Nassau Health Care Center

On Veterans Day, our nation will pause to say thank you to our veterans and their families. As Americans, we are privileged to live in the greatest country in the world. We share cherished liberties and freedoms made possible through the sacrifices of our veterans and their families. Those sacrifices must not be forgotten.

I wish to bring to your attention a matter of urgent concern. Along with many of our veterans, I have viewed with increasing concern the necessity for our Nassau veterans to travel to Suffolk County (Northport) in order to receive the required medical care to which they are entitled, pursuant to their veterans' benefits. This trip has become increasingly difficult, particularly for our older and disabled veterans. I firmly believe that the veteran population in Nassau County justifies the existence of a health-related facility within our County to care for the needs of our veterans. I have, therefore, proposed the use of one of the "shell" floors of the Nassau County Medical Center as a veterans' medical facility. This veterans' care facility would be an adjunct to, and not a replacement for, the Northport veterans facility and would be reimbursed by the Federal government.

That proposal has been endorsed by our federal legislators, Congressmen Raymond McGrath and Norman Lent, and United States Senator Al D'Amato who brought the matter to the attention of the Veterans Administration. Unfortunately, in response, the Veterans Administration ruled:

"Recent needs assessment studies conducted by the District, which provides services to Nassau County veterans largely through the VA Medical Center in Northport, have not resulted in proposals to expand services beyond provided at the latter facility. Therefore, at the present time, the VA cannot justify the utilization of space at the Nassau County Medical Center."

I cannot accept this premise and have asked our area veterans to send in petitions supporting the plan. I am pleased to report that we have already received thousands of letters in support of the plan to place a veterans' medical facility in Nassau.

I urge you to write to me, Tom Gulotta, County Executive, 1 West Street, Mineola, New York 11501.

Together we will not rest until we have been successful in placing much needed medical care facilities in Nassau to serve our County's 200,000 deserving veterans and their dependents.

A Letter from Lulubelle...

... Here we go again with our "do you remember's"—are you old enough to remember "truant officers"? ... In the old days, in order to keep all the kids in school—and at a time when some families weren't at all convinced that education was really important—schools employed people to serve as truant officers to chase after kids who were not in school and who were referred to as truants. ... It was very different from today when the school nurse or attendance person calls the house to see why Johnny isn't in school. ... Oh, no—first of all, most families didn't have telephones. ... and if they didn't really care if their kids were in school, they wouldn't tell the truth. ... Now my grandmother was one of these truant officers. ... In the beginning of her employment, she walked, but soon she bought a Model T Ford, "Tin Lizzie" ... and she went scooting all over the little Long Island town trying to get all the kids to school. ... I remember when I was too young for school myself riding with her to houses where the lady of the house would come to the door to say her child was ill while we could see him helping his father in the back lot. ... And then there was a day when my Grandmother heard that several boys had cut school to go to a local theater. ... Since she was also a deputy sheriff, she went to the theater manager, showed her badge, and requested that he stop the movie and turn on the lights. ... And, there in the front row, were her several truants, saying, disgustedly, "There's no use to hide from her—she can find you any place!" ... She chased them winter and summer for all of the months school was in session, and had one of the best records in all of New York State. ... and, for this, she received the princely sum of four hundred dollars a year. ... Sometimes, even today, I'd like to see "truant officers" to lower the absenteeism we hear of so often by actually chasing those kids who, smart alecks (does that phrase still communicate??), are cutting classes and sabotaging their futures.

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Monument To Gold Star Parents

There have been monuments built before—monuments to the World War I and World War II veterans, to the Korean soldiers, to leaders, to generals and most recently to the Vietnam Veterans—all of those who have long been considered the victims of our never-ending battles for democracy.

Yet, one very special group of Americans who have suffered what psychologists deem the most ultimate pain of all—the loss of a child—has been unrecognized by those groups who are in the business of erecting monuments. Gold Star Parents, parents who have lost children in wars, will now, for the first time, in our history stand up and be represented and memorialized as Americans whose patriotic recognition is long overdue.

One year ago, a New York philanthropist, Vincent Polimeni, joined forces with the Vietnam Veterans of America, with the clear intention of honoring the Gold Star Parents via a memorial project. A site was selected on Veterans Memorial Highway in Holbrook,

Long Island and the memorial journey was on its way.

A group of Gold Star Parents (the organization was originally conceived in 1920 as the Gold Star Mothers) met and agreed that the fathers of our wars' victims should also be honored in the memorial. Hence, the tribute to both parents.

The bronze memorial currently being readied at the Modern Art Foundry in Long Island City where owner, Robert Spring is overseeing the final casting and patina work. From there, it's to their permanent home in front of MacArthur Plaza at 4250 Veterans Memorial Highway in Holbrook.

The Dedication Ceremony for the Monument will be on Sunday, Nov 22 at 2:00 p.m.

Reflecting on the Gold Star Parents monument, Vincent Polimeni, the person who gave impetus to the project, stated, "We want this monument to serve as a dedication to the memory and the hope that there will be a future of peace ... without war."

Direct Line By ROBERT R. McMILLAN

The strength of our educational system is one of the elements which has contributed to making Long Island such a great place to live. At the same time, expenses for that system have gotten out of hand. From bloated central bureaucracies to poor purchasing procedures, our schools have succeeded primarily because of dedicated teachers—not because of efficiency. This is not to argue against our decentralized school system on Long Island. Decentralization does keep the educational process close at hand. School board meetings represent one of our only remaining forms of "town meeting". The problem is that not enough of us are involved, and only the "squeaky wheel" gets immediate attention.

There is not a sufficient focus on how our schools are being run. It takes a proposed sex education course in elementary school to draw crowds at a school board meeting. On the other hand, the public pays very little attention to the business or labor aspects of running multi-million dollar school districts. Personnel costs represent the bulk of expenditures. However, a high proportion of a district's budget goes for transportation, supplies, heating and maintenance. Why shouldn't there be more creativity in coordinating multi-district purchasing. One way to start is by taking a look at the central staffs of school districts. Many Long Island districts have actually increased the numbers in administration even in the face of declining classroom enrollment. Why shouldn't smaller districts even share business managers and some maintenance people?

More savings could also come in the purchasing of supplies. While some efforts have been made to provide for centralized purchasing at the State and local levels, not enough has been done. Pencils, scissors, books and crayons do not change from district to district. There is no reason why the already existing purchasing departments in Nassau and Suffolk could not be utilized to some extent by school districts. The result would be much greater buying power and further savings through the elimination of overlapping layers of purchasing agents.

Contracts for the maintenance of school buildings could also be negotiated across district lines. Lawn care, plumbing, heating oil and painting all lend themselves to lower prices if a contractor or supplier can count on greater volume.

As for labor contracts, most of us leave it to the school board and never get involved. In fact, we probably know very little about how our teachers are paid. All we know is that salaries and taxes escalate each year—whether justified or not.

If school administrators are not constantly reminded of a responsibility for high quality education and fiscal responsibility, education will be the only focus. Centralizing some school district functions makes sense. But, it won't happen on Long Island unless some squeaky wheels start appearing at school board meetings.

Neck Pain May Result From Arthritis

A common medical problem referred to a rheumatologist is chronic neck pain. Neck pain may affect many Americans some time in their life.

Frequently, neck pain results from arthritis of the spine, spasm of the neck muscles, inflammation of the joints in the neck, or pressure on the spinal nerves. This pain can occur at rest, or with movement, such as turning the head. In fact, anything that puts pressure on the spine may result in neck pain.

The discomfort of neck pain may be only an occasional dull ache, or a severe, sharp, debilitating pain. Most acute neck pain resolves by itself. However, if the pain is very severe, persists, or is associated with pain or numbness in the arms, you should consult your physician.

Proper treatment can only begin once the cause of the neck pain is known. A comprehensive examination, including a complete medical history, and a physical examination are usually required. X-rays, as well as blood tests,

may be needed to aid in the exact diagnosis.

Fortunately, most neck pain can be successfully treated without the use of surgery. Depending on the diagnosis, and if your symptoms do not improve, you may be referred to a rheumatologist (a specialist in arthritis and muscle disorders).

Your rheumatologist can establish an individualized medical program. This may initially involve rest, analgesic medication, and local heat. Special anti-inflammatory medications, specific exercises, and physical therapy may also be required if the pain is persistent. You should keep in mind that most neck pain will improve with proper medical management, and needless pain could be avoided with prompt medical attention.

Gulotta Proposes Three Year Cut in County Budget

Nassau County Executive Thomas S. Gulotta today released a tentative 1988 budget plan which calls for a tax cut in each of the next three years in the general County property tax. Gulotta's three year tax cut/stabilization plan also includes new initiatives, begun this year, as well as funding of programs mandated both by the state and federal governments. At the same time, Gulotta indicated he is moving to revise County Charter Article III to permit a more extended period of review for future County Budget submissions.

"Through prudent fiscal management and the implementation of various cost-cutting efficiency procedures, we have been able to produce a three year plan which will result in a tax cut each year for homeowners in Nassau County through 1990, and stabilize taxes while funding many important new programs and initiatives to deal with the critical issues confronting our County," Gulotta said. "This budget should enable our County to face the next several years with a solid financial plan in place which will protect our residents and will be looked upon favorably by the financial community. It demonstrates the strength and integrity of our County as we face the important years ahead."

Under the Gulotta proposal, property taxes for most residential homeowners will decrease by approximately \$16.1 million during the next three years. The tax reduction program will translate into a \$38.00 reduction per household for the majority of County residents, plus an additional \$4.00 decrease in the Police Headquarters budget for a total savings of \$42.00

"This is the first time in the County's history that a multi-year budget has been proposed. The proposal represents the future planning that is needed," Gulotta said.

"Fiscal stability is essential to the continued health and vitality of the business and residential communities. While general County and special property taxes account for only 20 percent of our tax burden (the balance being school, town, village and special district taxes) it is our responsibility to control or reduce that 20 percent. Recent dramatic stock market fluctuations, a drop in sales tax projections and the federal deficit, while not singularly

critical, are collectively signs for caution. We must protect our residents and the flow of quality services which they receive from economic fluctuations. The best way to achieve that objective is the implementation of the tax cut stabilization plan. With its implementation Nassau County residents will be on a firm footing to deal with the critical issues in a responsible fashion."

According to Gulotta, the changes in the County Charter are required to extend the period of time permitted for review of the budget. "Under the current Charter, a full nine months of expenses and revenue figures are required before the budget can be reviewed. This effectively precludes release of the budget before the latter part of October, at the earliest, since those figures are not available until that time. By lifting this "nine month" requirement, we will be able to release the budget at an earlier time and extend the period of review."

The County Executive noted that, under the tentative budget proposal, overall budget spending in 1988 is expected to be \$1.425 billion, an increase of 7.5 percent from 1987.

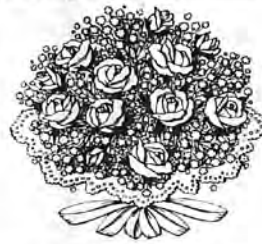
It is anticipated that the general fund will have a year-end cash surplus of \$80.1 million, which will be applied over three years to provide for tax stabilization and the tax reduction. County Executive Gulotta's administrative cost reduction programs generated a \$10.6 million dollar savings County wide; higher than expected sales tax proceeds over the latter part of 1986 and 1987 account for most of the balance.

\$31.0 million is also being provided in the new budget to the three Towns and two Cities to help them formulate solid waste management programs and control local taxes. That is \$3.6 million higher than the 1987 allocation.

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WINTHROP-UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL UPDATE: Women Helping Women

“We’re convinced osteoporosis can be prevented, but we can’t go much further without your help.”

Unless enough women join us in this new clinical study, our work could be slowed and many women will suffer needlessly.

Perhaps one of them will be your sister. Or a close friend. Or you yourself. Because the hard fact is that one out of four Caucasian women who have passed menopause are stricken by this debilitating bone deterioration. *That's millions of women a year.* Think about it.

It explains why this new osteoporosis prevention project is so important. And so urgent.

Winthrop-University Hospital has been designated to conduct this study by the National Institute of Health. Preliminary work is already underway. But an essential element in the program is recruiting the support of a large group of women with no sign yet of osteoporosis, and then tracking their reactions to several different preventative therapies. Without a sufficient number of participants, the study probably cannot proceed to a satisfactory conclusion. The

consequences could be crucial for the next generation of osteoporosis victims who might otherwise have avoided the disease.

Exactly what is involved for those who become part of this study?

It's quite simple. Once a volunteer passes a preliminary screening (see box), she is invited to Winthrop-University Hospital, located near the LIRR station in Mineola, for a complete physical checkup. She will also have her "bone density"

Who is eligible to join the panel?

To be considered for this important work, a woman must be in good health and have no history of arthritis, high blood pressure, alcoholism and certain other illnesses. She must also be past the onset of natural menopause (not hysterectomy-induced) by not fewer than six months nor more than three years. There are other criteria, of course, and each will be carefully and confidentially discussed by a medical professional when you call. She will be able to answer all your questions.

measured by state-of-the-art equipment. (Don't worry: Nothing gets stuck or poked into you. It doesn't hurt at all.)

Then you go home and follow the directions you'll be given. Different women will get different directions. (That's the whole idea of the study.) You'll be asked to return to the hospital only every few months so that we can keep track of the way things are going. It's very easy.

We need you. So do all your fellow-women throughout the country. Since women are the principal victims of osteoporosis, it falls to women to take the lead in discovering what can be done to help prevent it.

Soaring With the WASPs: A Veteran Remembers

As we observe Veterans Day next Wednesday, the emphasis will probably be on men, and anyone who thinks of World War II pilots will most likely picture a man. However, Ann Belliveau, of Great Neck, proves that this image is incomplete. Mrs. Belliveau, and approximately 1000 other women flew planes around the country as members of the

Women's Air Force Service Pilots (WASPs), transporting planes, goods, and personnel. In the 1940s, many mothers would have been concerned if their daughters flew but this was not true of Mrs. Belliveau's mother, Anna Cleveland. "Mother wanted me to fly," Mrs. Belliveau explained. "She was a solo pilot herself. In fact, in 1912, she had become the first woman to pilot a Wright Bi-Plane." Family tradition included not only flying

but also patriotism. "I didn't think anything of it (joining the WASPs)," Mrs. Belliveau said, "I thought it was just one of the things you do." She did admit, however, that she was also attracted by the excitement and glamour of flying.

When she reported for training, Mrs. Belliveau discovered that glamour included working from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., with studying at night. She took part in intense physical training and studied such subjects as navigation, meteorology, and physics. The women also had to learn stunts, so that if their plane accidentally went into a roll or spin, they would know how to recover. Mrs. Belliveau shuddered slightly as she recalled flying upside down in an open cockpit plane held in only by a strap across her lap.

In the midst of the serious business of learning, there was still time for laughter. Mrs. Belliveau smiled as she remembered her instructor telling her that she would solo for the first time, "It ain't my plane," he said, "and I'm not your momma, so why not solo you."

After eight months of training, Mrs. Belliveau received her wings and was station-

ed at Napier Field in Alabama. From there she ferried personnel and documents around the country.

Mrs. Belliveau's eyes glowed as she spoke of the mental excitement of flying—the challenge of making a good takeoff, navigating across country, making a decent landing and arriving exactly on time. Of course, the challenge was increased when flying in bad weather or at night.

Night flying also gave her the thrill of beauty, she explained, as she watched the lights of the stars above her and the manmade lights below. A beautiful daytime sight occurred when she flew above the clouds and the sun cast the plane's shadow on the clouds below.

Other excitement included delivering mail to a secret air field in the swamp country of the South where she saw the first jet plane ever made.

Mrs. Belliveau and her fellow WASPs not only served their country in a time of crisis, but by their achievement in a male dominated field, paved the way for other women to soar, on the ground as well as in the air.

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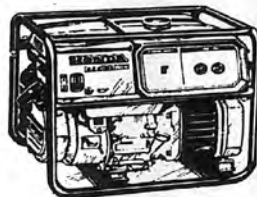

The Investor's Corner

WHAT TO DO NOW?

You survived. Maybe a little or a lot poorer, but you survived "black Monday" and "black and blue Monday" - the stock market crash.

Many of us got crunched by the roller coaster of the stock market. For others, it was and will be more indirect.

Those of us who got it directly lost money if we sold in the market panic, or portfolio value if we did not.

The indirect losers are those who will be indirectly affected: The value of your house or property probably fell; potential buyers dried up; your business may not sell as much in the near future; credit costs will probably rise (though in the short run interest rates have fallen). No one who has assets is going to escape some fallout from this crash. What we do not know, is how permanent is the damage for the indirect lose.

It is prudent to assume that the sharp decline in the stock market is a harbinger of a recession, or worse, to come. A defensive position should be taken. Some sort of a turnaround is inevitable. It may not come in 1987 (probably not), but it should start in 1988 or early 1989. Our excesses have to catch up with us.

So - what to do?

My first suggestion is to assume that all is not rosey. We should adopt a defensive posture. This means doing some things that we do not want to do. We should slow our spending and use that cash to get out of our very expensive debt. Put your Visas and Mastercards away and pay down the cards as fast as possible. This will be very hard to do with Christmas right around the corner-also a wise move because interest is losing its value as a tax deduction.

My second suggestion concerns those who still are in the market. At this point I would not get out entirely. At these price levels, the upside potential of the market is greater than any downside potential. It is going to go up and down, but the trend should be generally up, at least for the near term. The economic figures are better than anyone has any reason to expect at this stage of the economic cycle. This means shifting your portfolio to quality. Switch into public utilities which are non-nuclear and which pay high dividends. Go for the high dividend stocks. At the attractive market prices now, the yields have improved dramatically. At the beginning of a bull market and at the end of a bull market, the place to be is in quality stock, if you are in stocks at all. Of course you can buy a quality mutual fund that will do it for you-a no-load, of course.

Switch your bond portfolio to the short term, 1-2-3-4 years US Government bonds or good municipals. A portion of your portfolio should be in bonds. You can do this with a fund. Again, a no-load.

These have not been normal times. It turned abnormal for a short period. Will it repeat? Maybe. Reevaluate your situation and adjust to the new reality that is upon us.

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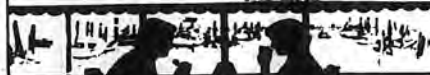

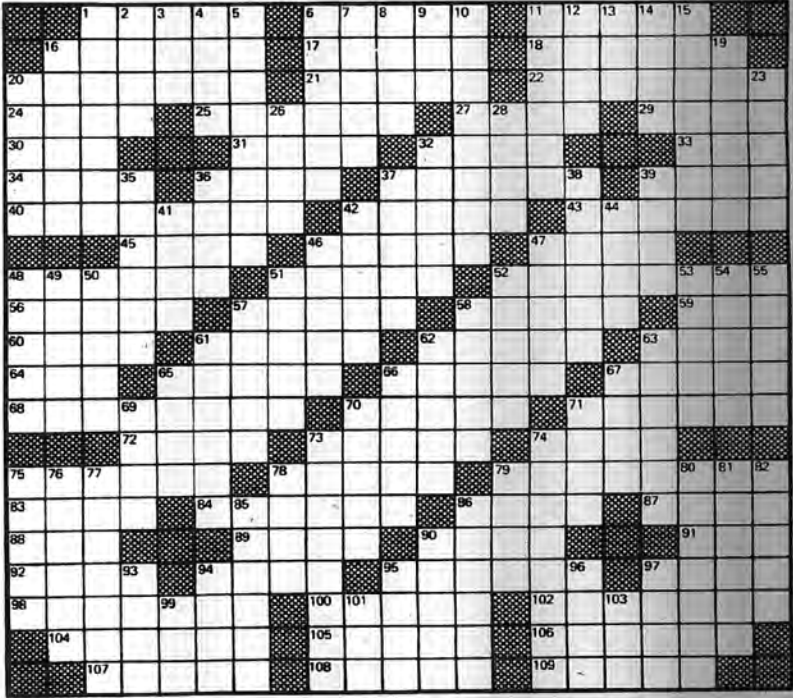

This deal occurred some years ago in a team-of-four match between England and France. The bidding was fairly normal at the first table where the British West opened third-hand with one spade and East raised him to four spades. Everyone passed and West scored 650 points. He lost two diamond tricks, period.

The bidding, as shown in the diagram, was far more spirited at the second table. Here the British South

became declarer at six clubs doubled! West led the king of diamonds, taken with the ace as East followed low and declarer contributed the jack! South then played the K-A of clubs and led the king of hearts.

Perhaps the French West should have ducked in order to learn more about declarer's distribution. But in the actual case, West took the king of hearts with the ace. Then, strongly influenced by South's unusual jack of diamonds play at trick one, West led the ace of spades instead of the queen of diamonds.

It did not take West long to learn he had made a serious mistake. South ruffed the ace of spades and cashed dummy's hearts, on which he discarded his remaining diamonds. So the outcome was that South made six clubs doubled for a score of 1,540 points! The British team gained 2,190 points on this one deal!

After giving declarer all due credit for his jack of diamonds play, the fact remains that West mishandled the defense. By assuming that South had a singleton diamond, West in effect assumed that East had six diamonds. It was infinitely more likely, on the bidding, that East had six spades rather than six diamonds, and West should therefore have played the queen of diamonds instead of the ace of spades.

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Shin Splints

Most runners will at some time during their training, complain of soreness or pain over the lower portion of the leg. This area is commonly referred to as the shin and the symptom complex as shin splints. It is commonly seen in athletes participating in track, cross country, tennis, basketball and occasionally football.

Shin splints usually begin with a soreness or dull aching pain along the lower half of the tibia. Most commonly this discomfort is experienced along the inner aspect of the leg. Less frequently the pain is localized along the front or lateral (outer) portion of the leg.

In one of the early stages of this injury the onset of pain begins after a long run. The pain may be replaced by a nagging soreness. With repetitive running the pain begins shortly after the running starts. Without proper rest or treatment, the symptoms become more intense. The pain increased and is constant before, during and after exercise.

Shin splints is an overuse syndrome often caused by increased training in the poorly conditioned athlete. It can also be a result of running on hard surfaces or the steep shoulder of a road. Many runners experience shin splints during the winter months when they run on banked indoor tracks. All of these mechanisms produce a significant traction or pull on the posterior tibial tendon. This repetitive action produces a tendinitis. Other causes include poor alignment problems of which excessive pronation (or flattening of the arch) is most prominent. Pronation is a significant cause of shin splints and occurs when the inner aspect of the foot contacts the ground more than the outer edge during the midstance phase of running.

TREATMENT

Treatment should be started after a good history is obtained. The athlete should be thoroughly questioned regarding changes in the daily exercise routine, mileage, shoes or running surface. The initial management

should include; rest, application of ice after exercise and wrapping or taping of the leg prior to running. Hot soaks prior to the initial warm-up may also be beneficial. As the pain of the shin splints gradually decreases, strength and flexibility exercises are started. Ankle lifts and heel cord stretching are emphasized. When the athlete resumes running, it should be on a soft flat surface, with proper shoes and reduced distances. Additional treatment may be necessary in patients with excessive pronation, collapsed arches or with poor running gait. Molded orthotic insoles help prevent over pronation. These devices are light, flexible and permit the athlete to compete without significant restriction. Simple arch supports easily fit into the running shoe and relieve the pull on the tendons.

Most athletes have partial or full recovery after conservative treatment. A small percentage of this group will develop a "compartment syndrome." This develops as a result of swelling in the muscles of the leg. While this is a normal process in all runners, the swelling may be great enough in some to compress the blood vessels and diminish oxygen supply. With less oxygen, the muscles produce pain which is cramping in nature. In these instances surgical release of the restrictive fascia provides excellent results. Releasing the fascia (the muscular envelope) allows more swelling by the muscles before the blood vessels are compressed.

If these symptoms fail to respond to proper treatment, other conditions which are similar to shin splints should be investigated. Of these, tibial or fibular stress fractures are common and should not be ruled out. Islanders Score Hat Trick for LI Economy

Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King announced recently that his office has calculated the positive financial impact the New York Islanders hockey team has on Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

"Using the standard accounting procedure of multiplying by a factor of 3, which reflects the amount of money directly related to the Islanders that is spent and respent on Long Island, we have determined," King stated, "that the business community has benefited as much as the hockey fans from Long Island's association with this outstanding team. The Islanders were directly responsible for pumping close to \$50 million into the local economy during their 1986-87 season and we fully anticipate their topping that figure over the '87-88 season." King stated.

He detailed the financial picture this way: "The 1986-87 ticket sales receipts totaled \$13,000,000. That amount, along with \$82,000 for parking and \$2,414,000 from the conces-

sions, adds up to \$16,226,000. This means Nassau County is the beneficiary of \$48,678,000 in direct sales tax revenues from the \$16,226,000. In addition, based on the multiplier of 3, the Long Island economy realized a total of \$48.7 million from the 1986-87 Islanders' season and Nassau County received an additional \$608,000 in sales tax revenues for total receipts of more than \$1 million.

"We can conservatively project," King explained, "based on those figures and the records from the 84-85 season and the 85-86 numbers, that the gross receipts from the 1987-88 Islander hockey season will reach at least \$16,017,750, with \$50.8 million being pumped into the Long Island economy. This will result in total sales tax revenues of \$12 million to Nassau County."

"Clearly," King said, "the Islanders, Nassau County and the business community make a great economic hat trick."

Nassau Sports Review

The shocker of the 1987 football season was delivered last Saturday by the Uniondale Knights who beat Hempstead, 13-12, to end the Tigers' 32-0-2 unbeaten streak. Hempstead's streak was the longest active one in New York State and the second longest in Nassau County history.

Coming into the game, Hempstead boasted the number one ranking in the state and consecutive wins over highly rated Farmingdale (27-7) and Massapequa (44-7). The three-time defending Rutgers Cup champions looked unbeatable, but Uniondale, after losing a fourth quarter lead, drove 65 yards in eight plays to score the winning touchdown on a 12 yard run by quarterback Joe Hall, with 2:20 left in the game.

Uniondale (4-2) took a giant step toward both the playoffs and the elite of Nassau football. For years, the Knights football program has been overshadowed by the school's outstanding track and basketball teams. A victory of this magnitude could change that.

Hempstead's loss throws the Rutgers Cup battle into a wide open competition. Sewanhaka (6-0), Bethpage (6-0) and Locust Valley (6-0) are now in a position to go undefeated and stake a claim. So is long-shot Valley Stream Central which hasn't been undefeated since 1947. Like Hempstead, Farmingdale and Massapequa have just one loss and the team which wins the Conference One playoffs with one loss will get a considerable amount of support.

What the Politicians are Saying...

STATE SENATOR MICHAEL J. TULLY, JR., (R-Roslyn Heights) highlights the Consumer Protection Legislation recently signed into law:

- **CARBONLESS CREDIT CARD TRANSACTION FORMS**—This law requires the issuance and use of credit card forms which are carbonless or do not readily identify the credit card holder by name or number after completion of the credit card transaction.
- **MOTOR VEHICLE REPAIR SHOP DISCLOSURE**—Motor vehicle repair shop invoices and estimates must now also clearly state whether any body parts supplied were manufactured as original equipment parts for the vehicle, were manufactured as nonoriginal replacement parts, or are used parts.
- **MOTOR VEHICLE REDEMPTION RIGHTS**—A holder of a motor vehicle installment contract who repossesses or accepts a voluntary surrender of the motor vehicle now has 72 hours to notify the vehicle buyer of information regarding the redemption of the vehicle.
- **BONDING REQUIREMENTS FOR HEALTH CLUBS**—Every health club, before it enters into a contract for services with any buyer of a health club membership, is required to file a bond with the Secretary of State for the purpose of guaranteeing refunds if the health club goes out of business.
- **TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR BOTTLED WATER SOLD IN THE STATE**—This measure requires the bacteriological and chemical testing of bottled water sold in New York State.

ASSEMBLYMAN DANIEL FRISA (R-Westbury) has announced his legislative agenda to deal with the state's current child care 'crisis':

"The state can involve the business community in sponsoring work-based, on-site day care centers for their employees' children by approving my legislation to provide a 10 percent tax credit for each day care position created. Without tax incentives the vast majority of businesses would never get involved. Without this involvement, universal day care services will never be accomplished because the cost of these services is too massive for the state to take on alone."

GOVERNOR MARIO M. CUOMO has announced the publication of a pamphlet explaining New York's laws concerning age discrimination and advising people how to use the law to protect their rights. The booklet, "Too Young, Too Old?" is available by sending a stamped self-addressed envelope (legal size) to: Public Information Office, NY State Division of Human Rights, 55 West 125 Street, NY, NY 10027.

REPRESENTATIVE ROBERT J. MRAZEK (D-Centerport) and Dr. Edward Martin, president of the Human Resources Center in Albertson have announced the award of a two year grant from the Social Security Administration to the Human Resources Center. The grant will be used to undertake a research and demonstration project—an innovative project which will attempt to coordinate public (Social Security) and private (insurance carriers) to meet the problem of helping to return injured workers back to productive careers and to reduce insurance costs.

Nassau Veterans Deserve a Nassau Health Care Center

On Veterans Day, our nation will pause to say thank you to our veterans and their families. As Americans, we are privileged to live in the greatest country in the world. We share cherished liberties and freedoms made possible through the sacrifices of our veterans and their families. Those sacrifices must not be forgotten.

I wish to bring to your attention a matter of urgent concern. Along with many of our veterans, I have viewed with increasing concern the necessity for our Nassau veterans to travel to Suffolk County (Northport) in order to receive the required medical care to which they are entitled, pursuant to their veterans' benefits. This trip has become increasingly difficult, particularly for our older and disabled veterans. I firmly believe that the veteran population in Nassau County justifies the existence of a health-related facility within our County to care for the needs of our veterans. I have, therefore, proposed the use of one of the "shell" floors of the Nassau County Medical Center as a veterans' medical facility. This veterans' care facility would be an adjunct to, and not a replacement for, the Northport veterans facility and would be reimbursed by the Federal government.

This proposal has been endorsed by our federal legislators, Congressmen Raymond McGrath and Norman Lent, and United States Senator Al D'Amato who brought the matter to the attention of the Veterans Administration. Unfortunately, in response, the Veterans Administration ruled:

"Recent needs assessment studies conducted by the District, which provides services to Nassau County veterans largely through the VA Medical Center in Northport, have not resulted in proposals to expand services beyond provided at the latter facility. Therefore, at the present time, the VA cannot justify the utilization of space at the Nassau County Medical Center."

I cannot accept this premise and have asked our area veterans to send in petitions supporting the plan. I am pleased to report that we have already received thousands of letters in support of the plan to place a veterans' medical facility in Nassau.

I urge you to write to me, Tom Gulotta, County Executive, 1 West Street, Mineola, New York 11501.

Together we will not rest until we have been successful in placing much needed medical care facilities in Nassau to serve our County's 200,000 deserving veterans and their dependents.

A Letter from Lulabelle...

... Here we go again with our "do you remembers"—are you old enough to remember "truant officers"? ... In the old days, in order to keep all the kids in school—and at a time when some families weren't at all convinced that education was really important—schools employed people to serve as truant officers to chase after kids who were not in school and who were referred to as truants. ... It was very different from today when the school nurse or attendance person calls the house to see why Johnny isn't in school. ... Oh, no—first of all, most families didn't have telephones. ... and if they didn't really care if their kids were in school, they wouldn't tell the truth. ... Now my grand mother was one of these truant officers. ... In the beginning of her employment, she walked, but soon she bought a Model T Ford, "Tin Lizzie" ... and she went scooting all over the little Long Island town trying to get all the kids to school. ... I remember when I was too young for school myself riding with her to houses where the lady of the house would come to the door to say her child was ill while we could see him helping his father in the back lot. ... And then there was a day when my Grandmother heard that several boys had cut school to go to a local theater. ... Since she was also a deputy sheriff, she went to the theater manager, showed her badge, and requested that he stop the movie and turn on the lights. ... And, there in the front row, were her several truants, saying, disgustedly, "There's no use to hide from her—she can find you any place!" ... She chased them winter and summer for all of the months school was in session, and had one of the best records in all of New York State. ... and, for this, she received the princely sum of four hundred dollars a year. ... Sometimes, even today, I'd like to see "truant officers" to lower the absenteeism we hear of so often by actually chasing those kids who, smart alecks (does that phrase still communicate??), are cutting classes and sabotaging their futures.

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Monument To Gold Star Parents

There have been monuments built before—monuments to the World War I and World War II veterans, to the Korean soldiers, to leaders, to generals and most recently to the Vietnam Veterans—all of those who have long been considered the victims of our never-ending battles for democracy.

Yet, one very special group of Americans who have suffered what psychologists deem the most ultimate pain of all—the loss of a child—has been unrecognized by those groups who are in the business of erecting monuments. Gold Star Parents, parents who have lost children in wars, will now, for the first time, in our history stand up and be represented and memorialized as Americans whose patriotic recognition is long overdue.

One year ago, a New York philanthropist, Vincent Polimeni, joined forces with the Vietnam Veterans of America, with the clear intention of honoring the Gold Star Parents via a memorial project. A site was selected on Veterans Memorial Highway in Holbrook,

Long Island and the memorial journey was on its way.

A group of Gold Star Parents (the organization was originally conceived in 1926 as the Gold Star Mothers) met and agreed that the fathers of our wars' victims should also be honored in the memorial. Hence, the tribute to both parents.

The bronze memorial currently being readied at the Modern Art Foundry in Long Island City where owner, Robert Spring is overseeing the final casting and patina work. From there, it's to their permanent home in front of MacArthur Plaza at 4250 Veterans Memorial Highway in Holbrook.

The Dedication Ceremony for the Monument will be on Sunday, Nov 22 at 2:00 p.m.

Reflecting on the Gold Star Parents monument, Vincent Polimeni, the person who gave impetus to the project, stated, "We want this monument to serve as a dedication to the memory and the hope that there will be a future of peace... without war."

Direct Line By ROBERT R. McMILLAN

The strength of our educational system is one of the elements which has contributed to making Long Island such a great place to live. At the same time, expenses for that system have gotten out of hand. From bloated central bureaucracies to poor purchasing procedures, our schools have succeeded primarily because of dedicated teachers—not because of efficiency. This is not to argue against our decentralized school system on Long Island. Decentralization does

keep the educational process close at hand. School board meetings represent one of our only remaining forms of "town meeting". The problem is that not enough of us are involved, and only the "squeaky wheel" gets immediate attention.

There is not a sufficient focus on how our schools are being run. It takes a proposed sex education course in elementary school to draw crowds at a school board meeting. On the other hand, the public pays very little attention to the business or labor aspects of running multi-million dollar school districts. Personnel costs represent the bulk of expenditures. However, a high proportion of a district's budget goes for transportation, supplies, heating and maintenance.

Why shouldn't there be more creativity in coordinating multi-district purchasing. One way to start is by taking a look at the central staffs of school districts. Many Long Island districts have actually increased the numbers in administration even in the face of declining classroom enrollment. Why shouldn't smaller districts even share business managers and some maintenance people?

More savings could also come in the purchasing of supplies. While some efforts have been made to provide for centralized purchasing at the State and local levels, not enough has been done. Pencils, scissors, books and crayons do not change from district to district. There is no reason why the already existing purchasing departments in Nassau and Suffolk could not be utilized to some extent by school districts. The result would be much greater buying power and further savings through the elimination of overlapping layers of purchasing agents.

Contracts for the maintenance of school buildings could also be negotiated across district lines. Lawn care, plumbing, heating oil and painting all lend themselves to lower prices if a contractor or supplier can count on greater volume. As for labor contracts, most of us leave it to the school board and never get involved. In fact, we probably know very little about how our teachers are paid. All we know is that salaries and taxes escalate each year—whether justified or not.

If school administrators are not constantly reminded of a responsibility for high quality education and fiscal responsibility, education will be the only focus. Neck Pain May Result From Arthritis

A common medical problem referred to a rheumatologist is chronic neck pain. Neck pain may affect many Americans some time in their life.

Frequently, neck pain results from arthritis of the spine, spasm of the neck muscles, inflammation of the joints in the neck, or pressure on the spinal nerves. This pain can occur at rest, or with movement, such as turning the head. In fact, anything that puts pressure on the spine may result in neck pain.

The discomfort of neck pain may be only an occasional dull ache, or a severe, sharp, debilitating pain. Most acute neck pain resolves by itself. However, if the pain is very severe, persists, or is associated with pain or numbness in the arms, you should consult your physician.

Proper treatment can only begin once the cause of the neck pain is known. A comprehensive examination, including a complete medical history, and a physical examination are usually required. X-rays, as well as blood tests,

may be needed to aid in the exact diagnosis.

Fortunately, most neck pain can be successfully treated without the use of surgery. Depending on the diagnosis, and if your symptoms do not improve, you may be referred to a rheumatologist (a specialist in arthritis and muscle disorders).

Your rheumatologist can establish an individualized medical program. This may initially involve rest, analgesic medication, and local heat. Special anti-inflammatory medications, specific exercises, and physical therapy may also be required if the pain is persistent. You should keep in mind that most neck pain will improve with proper medical management, and needless pain could be avoided with prompt medical attention.

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Gulotta Proposes Three Year Cut in County Budget

Nassau County Executive Thomas S. Gulotta today released a tentative 1988 budget plan which calls for a tax cut in each of the next three years in the general County property tax. Gulotta's three year tax cut/stabilization plan also includes new initiatives, begun this year, as well as funding of programs mandated both by the state and federal governments. At the same time, Gulotta indicated he is moving to revise County Charter Article III to permit a more extended period of review for future County Budget submissions.

"Through prudent fiscal management and the implementation of various cost-cutting efficiency procedures, we have been able to produce a three year plan which will result in a tax cut each year for homeowners in Nassau County through 1990, and stabilize taxes while funding many important new programs and initiatives to deal with the critical issues confronting our County," Gulotta said. "This budget should enable our County to face the next several years with a solid financial plan in place which will protect our residents and will be looked upon favorably by the financial community. It demonstrates the strength and integrity of our County as we face the important years ahead."

Under the Gulotta proposal, property taxes for most residential homeowners will decrease by approximately \$16.1 million during the next three years. The tax reduction program will translate into a \$38.00 reduction per household for the majority of County residents, plus an additional \$4.00 decrease in the Police Headquarters budget for a total savings of \$42.00.

"This is the first time in the County's history that a multi-year budget has been proposed. The proposal represents the future planning that is needed," Gulotta said.

"Fiscal stability is essential to the continued health and vitality of the business and residential communities. While general County and special property taxes account for only 20 percent of our tax burden (the balance being school, town, village and special district taxes) it is our responsibility to control or reduce that 20 percent. Recent dramatic stock market fluctuations, a drop in sales tax projections and the federal deficit, while not singularly

critical, are collectively signs for caution. We must protect our residents and the flow of quality services which they receive from economic fluctuations. The best way to achieve that objective is the implementation of the tax cut/stabilization plan. With its implementation Nassau County residents will be on a firm footing to deal with the critical issues in a responsible fashion."

According to Gulotta, the changes in the County Charter are required to extend the period of time permitted for review of the budget. "Under the current Charter, a full nine months of expenses and revenue figures are required before the budget can be released. This effectively precludes release of the budget before the latter part of October, at the earliest, since those figures are not available until that time. By lifting this "nine month" requirement, we will be able to release the budget at an earlier time and extend the period of review."

The County Executive noted that, under the tentative budget proposal, overall budget spending in 1988 is expected to be \$1,425 billion, an increase of 7.5 percent from 1987.

It is anticipated that the general fund will have a year-end cash surplus of \$80.1 million which will be applied over three years to provide for tax stabilization and the tax reduction. County Executive Gulotta's administrative cost reduction programs generated a \$10.6 million dollar savings County wide; higher than expected sales tax proceeds over the latter part of 1986 and 1987 account for most of the balance.

\$3.9 million is also being provided in the new budget to the three Towns and two Cities to help them formulate solid waste management programs and control local taxes. That is \$3.6 million higher than the 1987 allocation.

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WINTHROP-UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL UPDATE: Women Helping Women

“We’re convinced osteoporosis can be prevented, but we can’t go much further without your help.”

Unless enough women join us in this new clinical study, our work could be slowed and many women will suffer needlessly.

Perhaps one of them will be your sister. Or a close friend. Or you yourself. Because the hard fact is that one out of four Caucasian women who have passed menopause are stricken by this debilitating bone deterioration. *That's millions of women a year.* Think about it.

It explains why this new osteoporosis-prevention project is so important. And so urgent.

Winthrop-University Hospital has been designated to conduct this study by the National Institute of Health. Preliminary work is already underway. But an essential element in the program is recruiting the support of a large group of women with no sign yet of osteoporosis, and then tracking their reactions to several different preventative therapies. Without a sufficient number of participants, the study probably cannot proceed to a satisfactory conclusion. The

consequences could be crucial for the next generation of osteoporosis victims who might otherwise have avoided the disease.

Exactly what is involved for those who become part of this study?

It's quite simple. Once a volunteer passes a preliminary screening (see box), she is invited to Winthrop-University Hospital, located near the LIRR station in Mineola, for a complete physical checkup. She will also have her "bone density"

Who is eligible to join the panel?

To be considered for this important work, a woman must be in good health and have no history of arthritis, high blood pressure, alcoholism and certain other illnesses. She must also be past the onset of natural menopause (not hysterectomy-induced) by not fewer than six months nor more than three years. There are other criteria, of course, and each will be carefully and confidentially discussed by a medical professional when you call. She will be able to answer all your questions.

measured by state-of-the-art equipment. (Don't worry: Nothing gets stuck or poked into you. It doesn't hurt at all.)

Then you go home and follow the directions you'll be given. Different women will get different directions. (That's the whole idea of the study.) You'll be asked to return to the hospital only every few months so that we can keep track of the way things are going. It's very easy.

We need you. So do all your fellow-women throughout the country. Since women are the principal victims of osteoporosis, it falls to women to take the lead in discovering what can be done to help prevent it.

It would be easy to turn away and not get involved. But somebody has to. Somebody must.

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Soaring With the WASPs: A Veteran Remembers

As we observe Veterans Day next Wednesday, the emphasis will probably be on men, and anyone who thinks of World War II pilots will most likely picture a man. However, Ann Belliveau, of Great Neck, proves that this image is incomplete. Mrs. Belliveau, and approximately 1000 other women flew planes around the country as members of the

Women's Air Force Service Pilots (WASPs), transporting planes, goods, and personnel.

In the 1940s, many mothers would have been concerned if their daughters flew but this was not true of Mrs. Belliveau's mother, Anna Cleveland. "Mother wanted me to fly," Mrs. Belliveau explained. "She was a solo pilot herself. In fact, in 1912, she had become the first woman to pilot a Wright Bi-Plane."

Family tradition included not only flying

but also patriotism. "I didn't think anything of it (joining the WASPs)," Mrs. Belliveau said. "I thought it was just one of the things you do." She did admit, however, that she was also attracted by the excitement and glamour of flying.

When she reported for training, Mrs. Belliveau discovered that glamour included working from 6:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., with studying at night. She took part in intense physical training and studied such subjects as navigation, meteorology, and physics. The women also had to learn stunts, so that if their plane accidentally went into a roll or spin, they would know how to recover. Mrs. Belliveau shuddered slightly as she recalled flying upside down in an open cockpit plane held in only by a strap across her lap.

In the midst of the serious business of learning, there was still time for laughter. Mrs. Belliveau smiled as she remembered her instructor telling her that she would solo for the first time. "It ain't my plane," he said, "and I'm not your momma, so why not solo you."

After eight months of training, Mrs. Belliveau received her wings and was station-

ed at Napier Field in Alabama. From there she ferried personnel and documents around the country.

Mrs. Belliveau's eyes glowed as she spoke of the mental excitement of flying—the challenge of making a good takeoff, navigating across country, making a decent landing and arriving exactly on time. Of course, the challenge was increased when flying in bad weather or at night.

Night flying also gave her the thrill of beauty, she explained, as she watched the lights of the stars above her and the manmade lights below. A beautiful daytime sight occurred when she flew above the clouds and the sun cast the plane's shadow on the clouds below.

Other excitement included delivering mail to a secret air field in the swamp country of the South where she saw the first jet plane ever made.

Mrs. Belliveau and her fellow WASPs not only served their country in a time of crisis, but by their achievement in a male dominated field, paved the way for other women to soar, on the ground as well as in the air.

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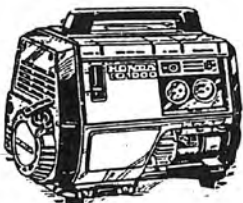

The Investor's Corner

WHAT TO DO NOW?

You survived. Maybe a little or a lot poorer, but you survived "black Monday" and "black and blue Monday" - the stock market crash.

Many of us got crunched by the roller coaster of the stock market. For others, it was and will be more indirect.

Those of us who got it directly lost money if we sold in the market panic, or portfolio value if we did not.

The indirect losers are those who will be indirectly affected: The value of your house or property probably fell; potential buyers dried up; your business may not sell as much in the near future; credit costs will probably rise (though in the short run interest rates have fallen). No one who has assets is going to escape some fallout from this crash. What we do not know, is how permanent is the damage for the indirect loser.

It is prudent to assume that the sharp decline in the stock market is a harbinger of a recession, or worse, to come. A defensive position should be taken. Some sort of a turnaround is inevitable. It may not come in 1987 (probably not), but it should start in 1988 or early 1989. Our excesses have to catch up with us.

So - what to do?

My first suggestion is to assume that all is not rosy. We should adopt a defensive posture. This means doing some things that we do not want to do. We should slow our spending and use that cash to get out of our very expensive debt. Put your Visas and Mastercards away and pay down the cards as fast as possible. This will be very hard to do with Christmas right around the corner - also a wise move because interest is losing its value as a tax deduction.

My second suggestion concerns those who still are in the market. At this point I would not get out entirely. At these price levels, the upside potential of the market is greater than any downside potential. It is going to go up and down, but the trend should be generally up, at least for the near term. The economic figures are better than anyone has any reason to expect at this stage of the economic cycle. This means shifting your portfolio to quality. Switch into public utilities which are non-nuclear and which pay high dividends. Go for the high dividend stocks. At the attractive market prices now, the yields have improved dramatically. At the beginning of a bull market and at the end of a bull market, the place to be is in quality stock, if you are in stocks at all. Of course you can buy a quality mutual fund that will do it for you - a no-load, of course.

Switch your bond portfolio to the short term, 1-2-3-4 years US Government bonds or good municipals. A portion of your portfolio should be in bonds. You can do this with a fund. Again, a no-load.

These have not been normal times. It turned abnormal for a short period. Will it repeat? Maybe. Reevaluate your situation and adjust to the new reality that is upon us.

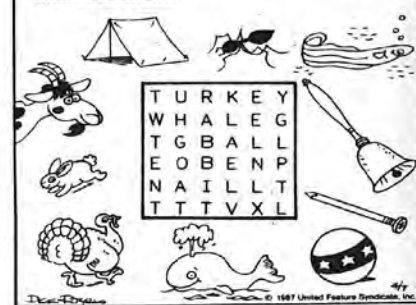

This deal occurred some years ago in a team-of-four match between England and France. The bidding was fairly normal at the first table where the British West opened third hand with one spade and East raised him to four spades. Everyone passed and West scored 650 points. He lost two diamond tricks, period.

The bidding, as shown in the diagram, was far more spirited at the second table. Here the British South

became declarer at six clubs doubled! West led the king of diamonds, taken with the ace as East followed low and declarer contributed the jack! South then played the K-A of clubs and led the king of hearts.

Perhaps the French West should have ducked in order to learn more about declarer's distribution. But in the actual case, West took the king of hearts with the ace. Then, strongly influenced by South's unusual jack of diamonds play at trick one, West led the ace of spades instead of the queen of diamonds.

It did not take West long to learn he had made a serious mistake. South ruffed the ace of spades and cashed dummy's hearts, on which he discarded his remaining diamonds. So the outcome was that South made six clubs doubled for a score of 1,540 points! The British team gained 2,190 points on this one deal!

After giving declarer all due credit for his jack of diamonds play, the fact remains that West mishandled the defense. By assuming that South had a singleton diamond, West in effect assumed that East had six diamonds. It was infinitely more likely, on the bidding, that East had six spades rather than six diamonds, and West should therefore have played the queen of diamonds instead of the ace of spades.

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Shin Splints

Most runners will at some time during their training, complain of soreness or pain over the lower portion of the leg. This area is commonly referred to as the shin and the symptom complex as shin splints. It is commonly seen in athletes participating in track, cross country, tennis, basketball and occasionally football.

Shin splints usually begin with a soreness or dull aching pain along the lower half of the tibia. Most commonly this discomfort is experienced along the inner aspect of the leg. Less frequently the pain is localized along the front or lateral (outer) portion of the leg.

In one of the early stages of this injury, the onset of pain begins after a long run. The pain may be replaced by a nagging soreness. With repetitive running the pain begins shortly after the running starts. Without proper rest or treatment, the symptoms become more intense. The pain increased and is constant before, during and after exercise.

Shin splints is an overuse syndrome often caused by increased training in the poorly conditioned athlete. It can also be a result of running on hard surfaces or the steep shoulder of a road. Many runners experience shin splints during the winter months when they run on banked indoor tracks. All of these mechanisms produce a significant traction or pull on the posterior tibial tendon. This repetitive action produces a tendinitis. Other causes include poor alignment problems of which excessive pronation (or flattening of the arch) is most prominent. Pronation is a significant cause of shin splints and occurs when the inner aspect of the foot contacts the ground more than the outer edge during the midstance phase of running.

TREATMENT

Treatment should be started after a good history is obtained. The athlete should be thoroughly questioned regarding changes in the daily exercise routine, mileage, shoes or running surface. The initial management

should include; rest, application of ice after exercise and wrapping or taping of the leg prior to running. Hot soaks prior to the initial warm-up may also be beneficial. As the pain of the shin splints gradually decreases, strength and flexibility exercises are started. Ankle lifts and heel cord stretching are emphasized. When the athlete resumes running, it should be on a soft flat surface, with proper shoes and reduced distances. Additional treatment may be necessary in patients with excessive pronation, collapsed arches or with poor running gait. Molded orthotic insoles help prevent over pronation. These devices are light, flexible and permit the athlete to compete without significant restriction. Simple arch supports easily fit into the running shoe and relieve the pull on the tendons.

Most athletes have partial or full recovery after conservative treatment. A small percentage of this group will develop a "compartment syndrome." This develops as a result of swelling in the muscles of the leg. While this is a normal process in all runners, the swelling may be great enough in some to compress the blood vessels and diminish oxygen supply. With less oxygen, the muscles produce pain which is cramping in nature. In these instances surgical release of the restrictive fascia provides excellent results. Releasing the fascia (the muscular envelope) allows more swelling by the muscles before the blood vessels are compressed.

If these symptoms fail to respond to proper treatment, other conditions which are similar to shin splints should be investigated. Of these, tibial or fibular stress fractures are common and should not be ruled out. Islanders Score Hat Trick for LI Economy

Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King announced recently that his office has calculated the positive financial impact the New York Islanders hockey team has on Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

"Using the standard accounting procedure of multiplying by a factor of 3, which reflects the amount of money directly related to the Islanders that is spent and respent on Long Island, we have determined," King stated, "that the business community has benefited as much as the hockey fans from Long Island's association with this outstanding team. The Islanders were directly responsible for pumping close to \$50 million into the local economy during their 1986-87 season and we fully anticipate their topping that figure over the '87-88 season," King stated.

He detailed the financial picture this way: "The 1986-87 ticket sales receipts totaled \$13,000,000. That amount, along with \$82,000 for parking and \$2,214,000 from the conces-

sions, adds up to \$16,226,000. This means Nassau County is the beneficiary of \$608,471 in direct sales tax revenues from the \$16,226,000. In addition, based on the multiplier of 3, the Long Island economy realized a total of \$48.7 million from the 1986-87 Islanders' season and Nassau County received an additional \$608,000 in sales tax revenues for total receipts of more than \$11 million.

"We can conservatively project," King explained, "based on those figures and the records from the 84-85 season and the 85-86 numbers, that the gross receipts from the 1987-88 Islander hockey season will reach at least \$16,917,750, with \$50.8 million being pumped into the Long Island economy. This will result in total sales tax revenues of \$1.2 million to Nassau County."

"Clearly," King said, "the Islanders, Nassau County and the business community make a great economic hat trick."

Nassau Sports Review

The shocker of the 1987 football season was delivered last Saturday by the Uniondale Knights who beat Hempstead, 13-12, to end the Tigers' 32-0-2 unbeaten streak. Hempstead's streak was the longest active one in New York State and the second longest in Nassau County history.

Coming into the game, Hempstead boasted the number one ranking in the state and consecutive wins over highly rated Farmingdale (27-7) and Massapequa (44-7). The three-time defending Rutgers Cup champions looked unbeatable, but Uniondale, after losing a fourth quarter lead, drove 65 yards in eight plays to score the winning touchdown on a 12 yard run by quarterback Joe Hall, with 2:20 left in the game.

Uniondale (4-2) took a giant step toward both the playoffs and the elite of Nassau football. For years, the Knights football program has been overshadowed by the school's outstanding track and basketball teams. A victory of this magnitude could change that.

Hempstead's loss throws the Rutgers Cup battle into a wide open competition. Sewanhaka (6-0), Bethpage (6-0) and Locust Valley (6-0) are now in a position to go undefeated and stake a claim. So is long-shot Valley Stream Central which hasn't been undefeated since 1947. Like Hempstead, Farmingdale and Massapequa have just one loss and the team which wins the Conference One playoffs with one loss will get a considerable amount of support.

No time was wasted as Nassau coaches conducted drills in ball handling, positioning for moves in offensive and defensive footwork, dribbling and guarding. Camp directors were Joe Woltering of Great Neck North, Paul Bosco of Massapequa and Buddy Bryan and Bob Kenney of Hicksville.

Three gyms were used with sessions ending in brisk, short play action games between the players divided into 12 teams. Many East Coast college coaches who were notified of the camp came to observe the players.

The camp attendance has been growing each year since its inception six years ago. Prospective varsity players are notified of the availability of the camp by their respective high school coaches and a nominal fee is charged to cover basic expenses. Coaches and referees donate their services and any profit returned by the camp is given back to the Association to help defray the cost of the annual County Championship Dinner, the All Star Dinner and awards.
