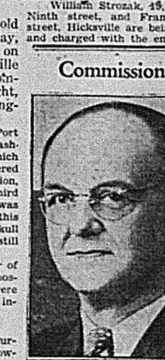
Legion Post Plans Anniversary Party

To Enforce Ordinance

Strict enforcement of Hicksville's parking ordinance after the first of March was promised today by Councilman John R. Brandt of Hicksville after a series of conferences with Captain Eugene Brien, an officer of the second precinct of the county police at Syosset.

Nearly a year ago a parking ordinance limiting parking on Broadway between Herzog place and Cherry Street was adopted by Oyster Bay town board at a recent meeting on the topic of parking. The ordinance set a time limit of an hour and a half for parking.

The ordinance, since the date of its adoption and approval by the town fathers, has not been enforced. Brandt in his announcement today gave an assurance that the law will be enforced and violators will receive a summons to appear in court.

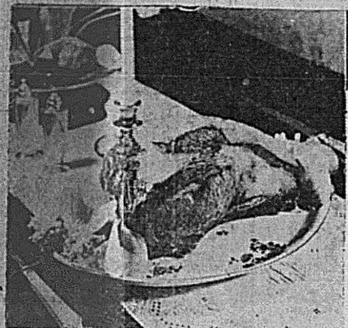

### For The Place Of Honor Roast Ribs Of Beef

By SIDNEY SNOW



#### ROAST RIBS OF BEEF

ROAST BEEF! Its popularity never wanes. Certainly nothing could be finer for the place of honor at any feast than a savory roast such as that which is pictured here, accompanied by beef curls and curly ends.

Select a two or three-rib standing roast. Wipe the meat with a damp cloth. Sprinkle with salt, allowing 1/2 teaspoon for each pound. Place the roast in an open pan fat side up. Add no water. Cook at a slow oven 300 degrees F. until done. It requires approximately 45 minutes to twenty minutes per pound for cooking a standing rib roast to the rare stage, twenty-two to twenty-five minutes per pound to the medium, and twenty-seven minutes per pound for the well-done stage. It requires approximately ten to fifteen minutes per pound more for cooking a rolled roast to the same degree of doneness.

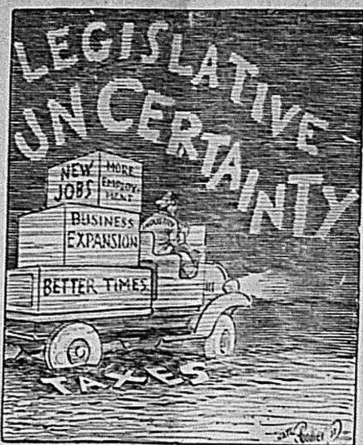

LIFT THE FOG!



The Empire State New York as a Winter Playground

Prepared for the News, by W. D. Mulholland, Superintendent of Camps and Trails, N. Y. State Conservation Department.

WEATHER FORECASTS of approaching snowstorms may be scanned with concern by aviators and those responsible for keeping highways clear and open to traffic, but there has come to desire for heavy falls of snow. These people are the winter sports enthusiasts and those who cater to their wants.

New York State as a winter playground offers an infinite variety of attractions—something for everybody—speed and thrill in ski-running and ski jumping, bob-sledding and tobogganing, and pastimes as gentle as photography, hiking, coasting, skating, or even good old-fashioned frolics in the snow.

The State Department of Conservation, in its state-wide plan for a system of four-seasonal facilities to meet the recreational needs of our people has not failed to provide in large measure for those who love to get their fun in the snow. One of the most famous and finest bob-sled runs in the world is the Mt. Van Hoevenberg "Down-Hill" track, operated by the state. "Bob-sledding" and exhilaration, and a prime favorite with those who like a bit of action packed into a few seconds.

Nothing indicates the state's foremost rank as a winter sport area more strikingly than its facilities for skiing. There are ski resorts and jumps which test the world's record-holders, as well as excellent runs for intermediate and novice skiers. At many points there have been developed fine marked trails and on all sides are to be found easier slopes for beginners. The system of ski trails was planned with regard to population distribution and accessibility so that they provide for all parts of the state.

Certain localities, because of exceptional advantages in the way of accessibility, climate, natural slopes and scenery, together with accommodations for sheltering people, have been largely developed. In the North Creek District, on Gore Mountain, there are nine ski trails, making a system of over fifty miles. In the Lake Placid resort, there are 250 miles of mountain ski trails; the Catalina resorts, Palisades Interstate Park, these and many more localities have been developed for skiing and their facilities are shown on guide maps issued by the Conservation Department.

New Yorkers and visitors outside our boundaries are enjoying the benefits of a planned system devised to provide recreation of all sorts for everybody. As a result of such planning the recreational resources are being developed to the advantage of all.

**Dish for This Week**

Cabbage, rich in vitamins A and C, makes a delicious winter salad green. This recipe suggested by the New York State College of Home Economics, uses whipped cream and horse-radish dressing.

- 1 cup of whipping cream
- 4 tablespoons of lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 teaspoon of sugar
- 1 teaspoon of scraped onion
- 3 tablespoons of ground horse-radish
- 3 cups of shredded green cabbage
- 2 raw carrots

Shred the cabbage fine with a long thin knife and slice thin the raw carrots. If desired, crisp them by covering with cold water, let them stand for one-half hour, then drain, wrap in a cloth and place on ice or in a cold place until ready to use. Whip the cream and add the seasonings to it. Just before serving, toss the vegetables together lightly with the seasoned whipped cream. This recipe will make six to eight servings.

For dinner the college suggests: creamed potatoes with parsley garnish broiled liver and bacon, squash, cabbage salad with whipped cream dressing, whole wheat bread and butter, maple nut cake, coffee or tea and milk at least for the children.

Instead of mixing with the highly seasoned salad dressing, salad vegetables for small children may be finely shredded, flavored with lemon juice and spread on whole wheat bread for sandwiches.

**McIntosh Reveals Plan**  
**Legion Legislative Program**

Strengthening of the national defense, advocated for fifteen years by the Legion and Auxiliary, is now being carried out and further increases needed for national security will receive active Legion and Auxiliary support.

Maintenance and full enforcement of provisions giving veterans preference in government employment will be urged by the Auxiliary. The average veteran, now in his middle forties, faces a difficult situation in finding employment and should be given every consideration by the government to be served in his youth.

Extension of government protection to all widows and children of deceased World War veterans on the same basis that is given to widows and children of deceased veterans of other wars is again being asked by the Legion and Auxiliary. At present only the widows and children of deceased World War veterans are allowed 20 per cent or more in war service are eligible for government aid, while those of all deceased veterans of other wars are eligible. The Legion and Auxiliary have been striving for a number of years to end this discrimination against World War dependents.
