World's Fair to 'Help Business and Trade'

Dobson Tells Hicksville Chamber Fair Will Bring 50,000,000 to Long Island

The opening of the World's Fair next year at Flushing Meadows will mean, among other things, 50,000,000 visitors on Long Island, increased business, increased population and increased development of roads and facilities.

Mr. Dobson, executive manager of the Long Island association, told members of the chamber of commerce, Kiwanis club, school faculty, board of education, and their wives and guests the benefits Long Island can expect from the World's fair next year.

He described Long Island's part in the fair and outlined plans to erect an exhibition booth for Long Island in the oceanfront area. He was introduced by Judge Charles Clark.

Among other things, he pointed out the fair will spend \$125,000,000 in the next 11 months, 25,000 people will be employed when the fair opens, and many will have exhibits or be represented at the fair, 40 out of the 48 states have signified their intention of being present.

"What has made Nassau county grow?" he asked. "I'll tell you: transportation facilities, plus recreation, plus residential facilities, plus industrial activities."

"It took a great deal of effort and work to induce the state park to provide money for parkways and arterial highways, but as a result Hicksville is 40 minutes closer to Manhattan than 10 years ago, Hicksville lies only an hour away from New York City, Hicksville must enjoy a great future with the rest of Long Island."

The Long Island association, he said, will hold a series of inquiries about Long Island annually. Many of them, he added, are about Long Island's state parks.

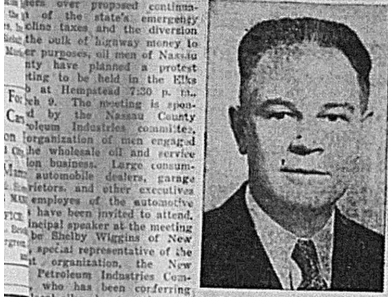

J. P. McEvoy Urges Parents to Help Children Marry

THE OLD but ever new question of whether parents should help their children marry before the children are financially able to support a home is the subject of a lively argument between two famous authors—J. P. McEvoy and Rose Wilder Lane—in the current issue of WOMAN'S DAY magazine.

...spoil our children — so we are told. We overfed them, overprotected them, overpraised them, we kicked them right out on their faces. We drop them from whatever limb we happen to be on, like a monkey dropping a stick that he's tired of. "So you want to get married, eh?" we say. "Well, go ahead, but don't expect any help from us." One can forgive the puzzled look on the youngster's face at this point. If ever he needed help he needs it now. In fact, he needs it now more than ever he needed it before.
