# DON'T BE AFRAID TO PUT IN OVERTIME ON EXERCISE

Women in business who spend the better part of eight hours a day at a desk need to be especially particular about their food and exercise to keep their figures good and their health up to par.

When a feeling of lassitude interferes with your efficiency, your appetite is only so-so and you have a dull headache just when you need to be at your best, the chances are that your food is not being digested and eliminated properly.

Fast people realize that intestinal putrefaction may be brought about by eating too little or too much or by bolting food. An effective means of overcoming this condition is to drink sour milk or acidophilus milk. A simpler and pleasanter way is to drink a glass of milk every eight hours. The juice of half a lemon has been added. Recent scientifically prepared diet call for sour milk, dried and fresh fruit, liberal amounts of vegetables, but no meat and little protein.

Here is a good exercise which is not only hip-slimming but also good for the abdominal muscles. Lie flat on the floor. Bend the right knee and kick vigorously up toward the ceiling. Outline a wide circle with the leg straight, bring leg slowly to the floor and repeat the exercise with the left leg. Do this six to eight times every day.

# A Brief Meditation

Suggested by the Rev. L. S. Luisa, pastor of Holy Trinity Episcopal church, Hicksville.

Read Titus 3:4-6. But when the kindness of God our Father toward us is revealed, not by works done in righteousness which we did ourselves, but according to his mercy he saved us.

WHAT IS the meaning of Christianity? A good summary of Old Testament religion is in Micah 6:8. A good summary of the New is in James 1:27. The passage quoted above is in the New Testament, but which reaches its full meaning in the Old Testament, but which reaches its full meaning in the New.

God is not indifferent to the world. He cares. Nor is He "beyond good and evil." The prophet who opened His "purer eyes than to behold iniquity" certainly did not think that iniquity means nothing to Him!

The whole point of the religion of the Bible is that (1) it is very real, not an abstraction, not a defect of vision, not a judgment; but (2) something can be done about evil, both in the world at large; and (3) God is already everywhere. He does so, because He is compassionate and merciful. He loves, and He does good—because, in short, He is God. And what we mean when we speak of Him as "the Father" of our Jesus Christ—the One Whom he described as Father, and likewise our Father, too.

**Looking Forward**

In his recent fireside chat President Roosevelt undertook to describe the attitude of the opposition to the New Deal on various questions. In doing so Mr. Roosevelt painted a false picture, attributing to those who oppose his attitude a record in accord with the record here—that relating to the issue of monopoly. He is just as vulnerable on his other points as he is on that, for where can the President find a record to sustain his contention that the organized opposition to his has called for repeal of legislation providing old-age pensions, unemployment insurance or regulation of security trading?

**Stone Hit Hard**  
But it is not necessary to go so far back to demonstrate that Republicans have been vigilant against monopolies. In the two years and five months of the present Administration 48 civil and criminal actions were instituted under the Federal anti-trust laws. In the Collidge Administration 25 not to mention the then Attorney-General Harlan F. Stone, now of the Supreme Court, striking hard. In the four years of the Hoover Administration 25 actions were instituted. More recently was it not Senators William E. Borah and Gerald P. Nye, two Republicans, who led the fight against the monopolistic features of the N. R. A. and what that legislation was doing to the little business man?

Contrast this record with that of Mr. Roosevelt in respect to monopolies. The N. R. A. was Mr. Roosevelt's favorite piece of legislation—it not only encouraged monopoly it actually relaxed the anti-trust laws. It encouraged industry to do the very things for which Mr. Roosevelt and his ardent Solicitor-General now are denouncing the N. R. A. The Supreme Court set aside this act. Mr. Roosevelt unloosed a tirade against that tribunal which culminated in his above attempt to pack the high Court.

**Roosevelt Aided Monopoly**  
An was it not Mr. Roosevelt who signed the Robinson-Patman Act? Was it not Mr. Roosevelt who failed to veto the Tydings-Miller price-fixing rider? For four years Mr. Roosevelt encouraged monopolies and monopolistic practices as no previous president of this country ever has.

The truth of the matter is that until the New Deal fell into the pit of its own economic fallacies eight months ago, neither the President nor anyone else in the New Deal in a position to restrict the most unscrupulous sympathy whatever for restricting monopoly.

All of which leads to the conclusion that Mr. Roosevelt is far from the most unscrupulous public attention from the failure of his New Deal and his economic misdeeds that he is in breaking up monopoly.
