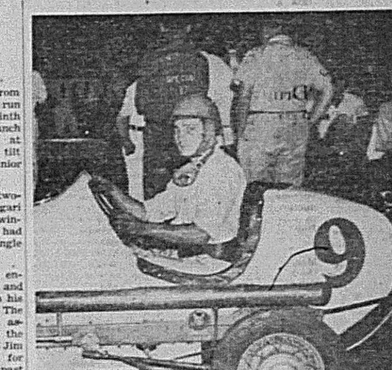

Low Cost Meats What are the low-cost cuts of meat that you can buy? "Dressed up" is a question which often puzzles cooks, both old and new. Less expensive roasts are abundant. When you pick a roast of lamb, a cured shank of pork or suet, these may be delicious when broiled and stuffed with a bread dressing, seasoned with celery, sage, onion, onion or apple.

To start a shoulder, place the dressing into the boneless shoulder, roll the shoulder compactly, sew or skewer it in place, and sprinkle the outside of the roast with salt, pepper and flour. Lay the stuffed shoulder, fat side up, on a rack in a roasting pan. Do not add water and do not cover. Cook at a low oven temperature (about 300 degrees Fahrenheit) from start to finish. Cook the meat until tender, probably from two to three hours.

The cheaper roasts of beef, or those from chuck, cross arm, clod and rump, are best cooked as pot roast. This is a low oven temperature (about 300 degrees Fahrenheit) from start to finish. Cook the meat until tender, probably from two to three hours.

Some low-cost beef steaks are cut from the chuck, pump, round, and brisket. These steaks will be less tender than those from the rib and loin, and should be cooked by braising. This is braising in a small amount of fat, then cooking slowly in a closely-covered pan with a small amount of liquid, either on top of the meat or in the pan.

Meat is good for stew, as beef or veal neck, plate, brisket, flank or shank, and lamb breast, shoulder, neck or flank. To make a stew, first brown the meat in fat, add enough water to cover it, add seasonings, cover and simmer the stew from one to one and one-half hours or until tender.

IN RECENT YEARS efforts have been made to develop a national educational program to reduce accidents in the school child group. When this program was first proposed, the estimated death rate in those 14 years was in excess of 40 per 100,000 population. The program in part has been successful, for the death rate in this age group have shown a 15 per cent decrease.

Information in regard to accidents to the school child group is not available for the country as a whole. However, the National Safety Council has collected this information from representative school groups for many years. For the last school year, there were 13,868 accidents with a total of \$25,000 in damages to the kindergarten to the twelfth grade, inclusive. In all grades, there were 13,868 accidents with a loss of 4,182 children. For every one grade the high of 1,482 accidents with 4,700 days lost was reported among boys and girls in the seventh grade.

A few years ago, a special study was made of accidents in a number of Texas schools. It was learned that a total of 2,250-000 days absence from school were reported for 170 days per year. News of Farms and Crops

The NEWS Farm Dept.

THE MILK SITUATION

1. September prices to farmers will be higher than the August price, but less than some expect. The average price at the 200-mile zone would not fall below \$1.80. In August it was \$1.56 a hundred pounds.

2. The blended price will reflect the situation in the New York market and the national high rate of production, less active demand, price rise in New York city, a larger proportion of milk to be manufactured (if better, at the depressed state of business).

3. Probably a little under 60 per cent of the total milk supply will be reported in class 1 of fluid milk class for September.

4. The September net price to farmers will probably be from ten to twenty cents lower than for September, 1932, but higher than for any September since 1930. The price of class 1 milk will be higher than a year ago, but cream and surplus bring 25 to 50 cents less.

5. Storage holdings of cream are large.

6. Prices for evaporated milk, butter and cheese are low. The returns for milk used to manufacture them reflect conditions that are nation wide in scope.

7. The present quotation for butter, even though pegged by government, buying is about eight cents a pound lower than the average price for September, 1932.

8. The present low prices for dairy products reflect the excessive storage stocks as well as other unfavorable conditions. Prices will not go lower unless conditions become worse.

9. The main reason for the low price of milk is the recent general deflation of prices.

Rain Hits Most Parts of State

Sections of New York state have had rain every day for a week or more, according to the weather bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture at Cornell.

The report for the week ending September 29 says temperature slightly below normal, but on several days, were well below normal.

"The rains were of benefit to pastures, meadows and plowing; they also helped greatly to replenish subsoil, springs and wells."

What seedling and the harvest of backwater were delayed, the report says. Some early sown wheat is up to a good stand, but much of the crop is yet to be sown. Silo-filling is well along, although delayed by muddy fields; much of the husking corn has been shocked.

School Child's Mental Growth Depends Upon Food in Diet

"I wish my boy could get along faster at school" is the cry of thousands of mothers every year. Do they know that the knowledge of food value goes a long way toward helping them achieve their wish? Unfortunately, it is not generally realized that what and how a child is trained to eat, and to like to eat, before the age of five may play an important part in his health throughout life.

For centuries it was believed that food consisted of a single universal principle, however varied the forms in which it occurred and that food was food, regardless. In 1906 Professor Hopkins, a noted food scientist of Cambridge University, experimenting in his laboratory with animals, showed that diet of pure protein, milk would furnish the missing material. Professor McCollum, Davis, Osborne and Mendel in this country verified Professor Hopkins' findings which led to many important discoveries regarding the kinds of food necessary in the prevention of deficiency diseases. Much experimental work has shown that specific combinations of food have resulted in a quickening of intellectual energy while on the other hand, an excess of energy building foods such as sweets, starches and fats, may result in sluggish mental processes.

Certain structural materials, notably milk with its large supply of calcium, is especially necessary during the period of active growth and also in later life due to the constant chemical changes in all of the cells and tissues which continue as long as the cells live and life lasts.

The more brain work one does, the more care must be taken to insure proper combinations of food. Professors A. Y. Hill and H. Benedict and Benedict have found that the gray matter of the

Deaths

By R. W. Leiby

Deaths that invaded many of the New York state in several days that dimmed streets and covered faces of stone reached the state from the south with recent strong winds.

Deaths of the month of the cotton worm, an insect which appears in numbers about five to five years to the South (delicious cost) stalks late season. The moths are very few for ten of a thousand. They bite mouth parts, unable them to puncture the ripening fruits, such as corn and grapes. Reports of insects have been received from all parts of the United States, and the insects that reached the northern and Canada will be killed after weather. The caterpillar often appears in Texas fields in early August of generation of moths in these months then fly to the south states to raise a new cotton, which may be fully defoliated unless that a calcium arsenate.

Deaths of moths in enormous numbers and other insects, like those of birds and water are not unusual. The sudden increase in large numbers of insects pests on field crops led to a migration to the south, aided by strong winds. At such times, the insects may fly a mile or more high.

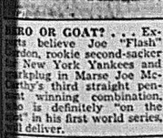

Dish for this Week

A meat dish that can be quickly prepared and left in the oven to bake while the rest of the meal is being made is banana meat loaf.

- Banana Meat Loaf
- 2 pounds of ground beef
- 4 slices of bacon
- 1 cup of celery finely diced
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup of cracker crumbs
- 2 bananas, finely diced
- 1 tablespoon of lemon juice
- 1/2 cup of apple sauce
- Cayenne pepper
- Salt and pepper

Mix the ground beef, celery and one cup of the cracker crumbs season them with salt and pepper and moisten with a slightly beaten egg. Pack half of the mixture into a greased loaf pan. Then cream or dice the bananas very fine, and add to them the lemon juice, apple, and one-half cup of cracker crumbs. Season them with salt, pepper and cayenne, and pack this on top of the meat in the loaf pan. Over this, pack the remaining half of meat. Lay strips of bacon across the top and bake the loaf in a moderate oven (300 to 350 degrees Fahrenheit) until it is done, or for about an hour.

For a dinner, the New York State College of Home-Economics suggests: banana meat loaf, creamed potatoes, sautéed green beans, combination vegetable salad, hot rolls and butter, cherry tarts, milk for the children and milk or coffee for the grown-ups.

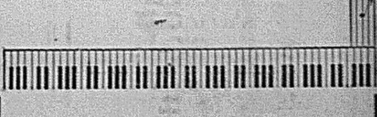
