Thorp Gives Democrats Election Data

Instruction in the duties and powers of persons connected with the operation of election polls on November 8 were given election inspectors and party leaders by John S. Thorp, chairman of the Nassau County Democratic committee, at Hicksville high school Monday night.

No G. O. P. Inspectors

Mr. Thorp pointed out the qualifications of a voter, the length of residence necessary in the state, county and election district and the mechanics of acting up and operating the voting machines.

He said that each polling place is entitled to two inspectors from each party showing the largest vote in the previous gubernatorial election and recalled the occasion, years ago, when there were no Republican inspectors.

He stressed the importance of every voter registering at the final registration day, tomorrow, Saturday (Oct. 22). He also said the Democratic party is well-started with young lawyers willing to assist in legal difficulties on election day, such as getting court orders for voters unregistered.

He is survived by his wife, Beatrice, a son, Donald, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William M. Gouse sr., of Hicksville, and four sisters.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Archie Mowen of Barclay street, Hicksville.

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Town Budget Low for 1939

Town Board Holds Public Hearing On Tentative Budget With 4-Cent Rate at Oyster Bay on November 1; Highway Tax Rate Cut Three Cents

The Oyster Bay town board will hold a public hearing Tuesday, November 1, on the tentative town budget for 1939. The township will pay a rate of 4 cents per \$100 on the general town levy with a reduced highway tax of 17 cents. This year the people of Oyster Bay enjoyed the distinction of not having a general town tax.

The tax rate of 4 cents is one of the lowest in the town's history. A study of the carefully prepared budget (given in detail on page 6) shows few increases in appropriations for governmental operation. Notable increases are for the town beaches and incinerator, two items on which town fathers hope to more than meet the expenditure with revenue received from these units.

The 17-cent highway tax on unincorporated areas is 2 cents lower than the levy for 1937 and 1938.

Saving on Telephones

The Jones Institute item has been transferred over to the county. Last year the town paid \$4,816.91 for this department. In several departments small increases are noted because the telephone expense (last year \$3,000 under town buildings) has now been split among the departments. The town has also included a \$300 item for publicity to promote the township as a summer and winter resort.

The gross budget will be \$216,461.58, almost \$6,000 higher than the gross of \$210,500.66 for 1938. The next budget to be raised by taxation is \$157,017.34.

Fire Tax Up 5 Cents

The assessed district tax levies, few changes are noted. However, the Hicksville fire tax will jump from 77 cents to 82 cents next year, principally because voters approved a measure to raise \$10,000 for a new fire truck.

An Idea Gets Support

Each year hundreds of our young people are seriously injured by the use of fireworks and other devices used in the celebration of Fourth of July. I believe the fire departments of Nassau county would be making a great contribution to society if they sponsored a law prohibiting the sale and use of all such devices in Nassau county except by experts. There would be fire prevention work here accomplished something very much worth while. From a letter by Dr. Elwood A. Curtis to the Hicksville fire department.

According to the latest available information, Hicksville firemen have not taken any action on the above suggestion made by the president of the Chamber of Commerce.

However, the paragraph has evoked considerable comment and thought in the community and may really lead to something "very much worth while."

This week we questioned the Rev. Aimer Harwood, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that the idea is sound, but may be difficult to carry out. In other words, he can hardly see the worth of the community giving up their fireworks without a struggle. He does admit that fireworks have become more dangerous in the passage of years than he was a youngster and that children of today have within their (or their parents') financial means an opportunity of purchasing for a few cents a handful of noise that can cause considerable damage.

He suggests that the Chamber of Commerce together with the citizens of Hicksville and nearby communities create a local fund and organize a formal observance of Fourth of July. He believes an evening program devoted to colorful fireworks displays set off by experts in that line would attract hundreds from miles around and take the minds of children off their own private displays. Also parents who supplying their youngsters with funds for the purchase of noisemakers could afford to turn that money over to the general committee fund.

Walter H. Dunbar, Hicksville chiropractor, was questioned on Dr. Curtis' letter. Mr. Dunbar is of the opinion that it would be almost impossible to enforce a complete ban on fireworks in the township, pointing to the bootlegging of fireworks into New York City from outside districts. He agrees, however, with the opinion of the Rev. Harwood.

More views on this project will be given next week.

Around Our House

For a New Winter Coat. WISELY and you'll come home with a coat that not only will go best with the wardrobe and budget, but a coat that also be warm and give service. Here are five suggestions from the New York State College of Home Economics:

Before shopping, decide on the type of coat material, the color and how long the coat must be, and which of the current styles is most becoming and easy to last for several seasons.

At the store, look carefully at the material. Find the coat that satisfies the specifications at home. Poor quality wool means poor quality cloth. The sheen of the wool quality are uneven, and may be given by a matted finish. Such fabrics feel harsh, lifeless, and shabby and will not stand much wear. Get a good "wool" or "wool" content.

Examine the weave closely from both sides. Long-wearing weaves are firm and close, with but as many yards in one section as in the other. The weaves are even in size, so the coats on them uniformly. The cloth has a soft springy feel, and the "give" in either direction is not excessive.

For warmth, make sure that the interfacing is really wool, not cheap cotton. Cotton is not as warm as wool, and holds its shape, so that the coat is apt to look bulky. If the coat is lined at the lower edge, ask the dealer to pin a piece and let you see the interfacing.

Pure-silk linings make the best lining material, but they are costly. A good rayon lining, finely woven and of good weight, is satisfactory service and less. Rayon tends to wrinkle and fray, however, so make sure there are generous seam allowances. Weighted silk linings nearly show wear at the end of the season. Colored rayon linings that are proof against the sun and perspiration stains, are desirable.

Melt butter in skillet. Fry pepper and onion for three minutes. Add meat and mix well. Fry four slices and add a few minutes then mix with eggs, well beaten.

Butter casserole and put in 1 cup corn and then add above mixture. Cover with sliced tomatoes. Put in remaining corn and mixture. Cover with bread crumbs and bake 45 minutes in 375 degree oven. Serves 4.

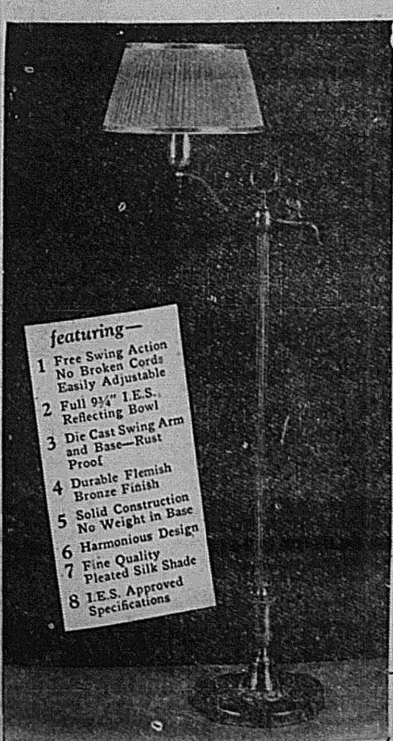

The NEWS Farm Dept.

ANY CROPS SEVERELY DAMAGED BY STORMS

Features averaged about 3 below normal during September with rainfall averaging 1.6 inches above normal and nearly 7 inches for the State. New York Farm Prices Improve During September

The New York index of farm prices for September 1938, at 94 represents an increase of 11 points from the August index, although it is 11 points below the index for September 1937, and about even with the index for the same month in 1934 and 1935. There was a general relative decline in crop items, except apples, and minor variable changes in livestock items.

Winter Wheat Seeded Late This Fall

Although a few farmers got their wheat seeded during early September, before the rainy weather started, by far the largest number were unable to get the wheat seeded until late September or early October, after the rainy weather had stopped. Much of the wheat was sown late and slowly on account of the cold weather during the last of September and the first few days of October.

Pneumonia

PNEUMONIA is a preventable disease. It occurs in all months of the year, with its greatest frequency during the cold months. It attacks all ages, but a high proportion of the cases and deaths are in the very young and the very old. Deaths are more frequent among males than among females.

Pneumonia

Pneumonia is an infectious disease, a "catching disease" and is usually fatal to one out of each five who contract it. In the past five years, this disease has killed 1,650 persons in Nassau county, an average of 218 each year. During the summer months of this year, 121 cases have been reported with 22 deaths.

Pneumonia

In simple terms, pneumonia is an inflammation of the lungs. It may be caused by any one of a number of germs which gain entrance to the lungs and find conditions suitable for growth. There are two main classifications: Lobar pneumonia and bronchopneumonia. In lobar pneumonia, one or more lobes of one or both lungs may be affected. Bronchopneumonia attacks small or large areas in either lung.

Pneumonia

Lobar pneumonia is in itself an acute disease, marked by sudden onset with chills, pain, fever, cough and blood-tinged sputum. Bronchopneumonia occurs most frequently as a complication of some acute infectious disease, such as a "cold," influenza, measles, whooping cough, or similar disease.

Pneumonia

In recent years, a serum has been developed which is very effective when used early. In controlling the ravages of pneumonia, it is necessary for a laboratory to first examine the sputum to determine the "type" of germs. With this information specific serum may then be used. Serum for the treatment of pneumonia is supplied by the State Health Department and is distributed through the County Health Department office in the Bar Building, Mineola, or may be secured from each of the four substations.

Good health is an important safeguard against pneumonia, as is also the avoidance of persons who are ill with an infectious disease, especially a cold.
