This February, PTA celebrates its 90th anniversary. And in light of the traditions of the nation's largest child advocacy association, the Hickville Council of PTAs has chosen Mrs. Patricia Rooney as its Founders Day Distinguished Guest. The Council's 34th annual dinner will be held at the Woodbury Country Club on February 26.

Pat Rooney has accomplished much for the children of Hickville in the ten years she has been an active PTA member. She held various committee positions at the Woodland Avenue PTA and served as its President from 1982-84. Pat has worked hard on the hot lunch and State-funded milk programs at Woodland, as well as the school's holiday carnival and sixth grade class trip. She was instrumental in initiating the pre-school program there.

Pat has also been active with the Junior and Senior High School PTSA. She served as Health & Safety Chair and Secretary of the Hickville Council of PTAs and is presently the Council's Treasurer.

During the time Pat was Health & Safety Chair, she aided in securing the Fingerprinting and Operation Safe Child programs for the district. She was also involved in the pre-school amblyopia screening and providing free hearing tests for elementary-level students.

In early spring 1986, Pat spearheaded a committee to lower the mileage eligibility for school bus passes. This effort arose from a controversy in the community the previous fall over the method of measuring mileage distance. The Board of Education placed a transportation referen-

dum on the election ballot in May, but it was defeated 965 to 898, only 67 votes. Pat still strongly believes in a new transportation policy.

Pat has also served on several school board committees including budget, policy, gifted and talented, long-range planning, all-day kindergarten and the Secondary Study Committee. She has spent time away from education as a girls' soccer and softball coach with local clubs and she now devotes many hours as a 6th grade CCD teacher at Our Lady of Mercy Church.

Pat and her husband, Mike, have lived in Hickville for 15 years and have four children: Michael, Jenna, Brian and Kristen. PTA is proud to honor Pat as our Distinguished Guest, for she has truly devoted herself to the service of children on all levels and in various capacities.

Editor's Notebook

Nassau-Suffolk's water supply is a subject that is drawing more and more attention in the press. This is somewhat ironic since we are an island surrounded by water on all sides. But, of course, the concern is not just any water, but potable water.

Right now, most experts assure us that there is adequate drinking water available in this area. However, it appears that more is being lost, mainly through sewerage, than is being replaced by nature. This trend, if it continues, could jeopardize our underground aquifers.

What can be done to solve this problem? One way is to set caps on water pumping (a course the state has already embarked on) or establish building moratoriums.

However, we would hope these measures would be considered as mere stop-gaps since they can hardly contribute to the economy of Long Island.

We would anticipate that our elected leaders could work to find long term solutions to the problem, perhaps a reservoir system, with water piped in from the Catskills or elsewhere, or possibly supplementary desalination plants.

Wouldn't these projects be ultra expensive? We're certain they would be. But building moratoriums are also expensive. Land which cannot be developed loses most of its assessment value. Widespread construction stoppages could affect almost every business on the Island, directly or indirectly.

At the present time all three town governments are moving forward in dealing with another serious problem, solid waste disposal, through development of economical, safe, dry burn facilities. Wouldn't it be great if our leaders could also find suitable ways to preserve the quality and quantity of our drinking water?

Paintings by Doris Pryor are on exhibit in the show cases at the Hicksville Public Library for the month of February.

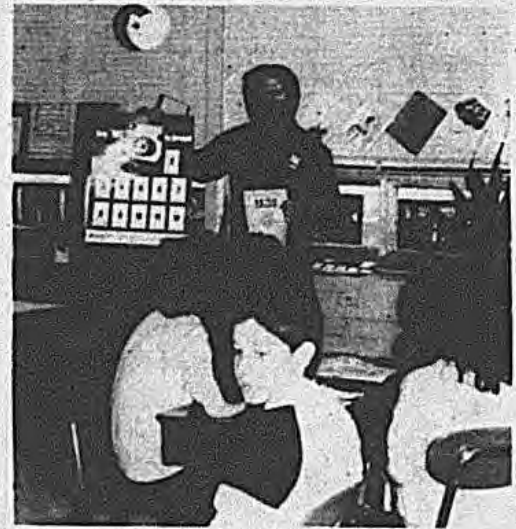
From childhood Doris Pryor knew she wanted to be in art.

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The new 22 cent Love stamp is now available at your post office.

"As with previous Love stamps the 1987 issue is classified as a "special" stamp. Stamps in that category are produced in larger quantities than commemoratives and are available for longer periods of time," said Roger Nienaber, General Manager/Postmaster. "In recognition of the universal nature of the theme, a new stamp will continue to be issued annually in the years ahead," Mr. Nienaber added. "There is a large demand for the stamps, which frequently are used for wedding invitations, Valentine's, greeting cards and personal correspondence."

The heart has been regarded as the very core of human emotion since ancient times. In fact, words like "cordial," "courage," originate from "cor," the Latin word for heart. The earliest visual conception of the heart, though far from a true representation of an actual human organ, endures even today as the most recognizable symbol of love. The new stamp's design is a reflection of the fact that the popular image of the heart appears frequently as a design component in folk art.

THE NEW Love stamp, available now at your post office, is a multi-colored heart. The hues and "quilted" appearance of the heart are reminiscent of Pennsylvania Dutch folk idioms. Its pointed base is green, with orange, yellow and two shades of blue overlapping in various shapes that suggest the petals of flowers. The 1987 Love stamp is the sixth stamp on that subject, the first having been issued in 1973. The stamp was unveiled during the gala New Year's Eve celebration at the Old Post Office in Washington, D.C.

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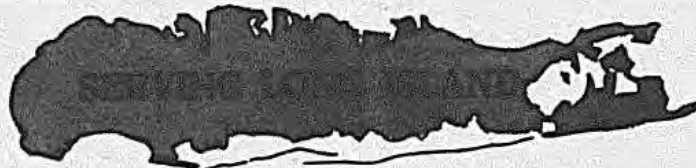
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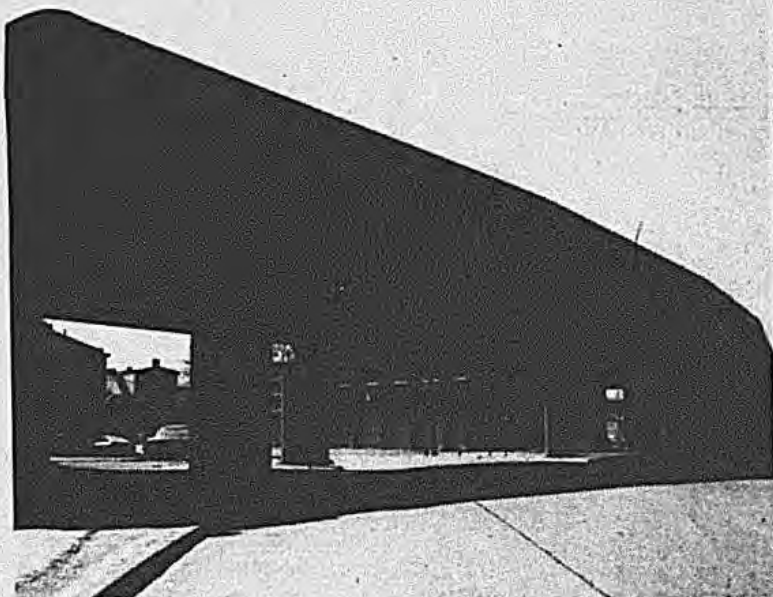
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Hicksville - Then And Now



The Hicksville Fire Headquarters was the hub of firefighting activities in 1954 when this photo was taken of the station at 20 E. Marie St. Built in the depression years by many out-of-work city firemen, the building first sounded its siren in 1932. It had replaced the original 1902 structure that was moved across the street and is now Peppercorn's Restaurant. In 1954, Hicksville Fire Dept. boasted five companies comprising 150 vamps, six pieces of apparatus that included a fire engine, ladder truck, four pumps and a floodlight truck. Sparked by an expanding population, civic minded volunteers lined up for duty but had to be put on a long waiting list. (Courtesy of Historical Archives, Gregory Museum)



In current photo, taken in 1984, the familiar structure is in the shadow of the overhead Long Island Railroad tracks (raised in 1962-63). The sturdy headquarters has hardly changed over the years but the department has grown to 235 Vamps. Its equipment now consists of two ladder companies, five engine companies, one rescue squad, a rescue & floodlight company and a hazardous materials team. On the second floor there are meeting rooms, a library, a hazardous team office and company meeting room. There are two other Fire stations in Hicksville, and a fourth one is planned. 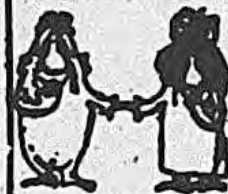

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Joseph Barry K Of C Free Throw Competition

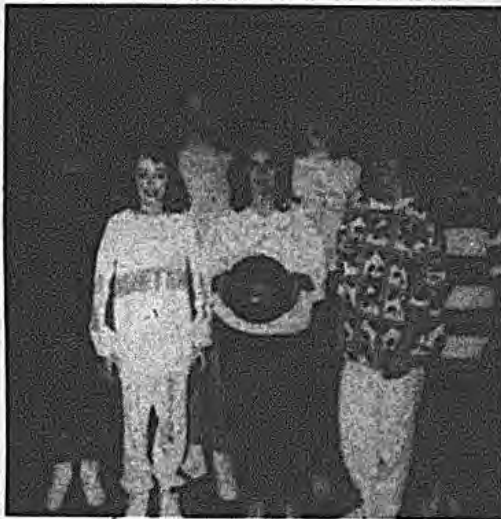
