Hicksville Board Sets Budget Re-Vote Figure

At the public hearing on June 3, no new actions were taken by the Hicksville School Board on the proposed 1987-88 school budget. The Board trustees voted unanimously to accept the proposed budget at \$42,259,330, a \$1.6 million or 3.9% increase over the current budget. This figure brings an estimated tax rate increase of \$1.51 per \$100 assessed valuation.

The district budget revote will take place on Wednesday, June 17, from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. at local election polling places.

Board President William Bennett called the proposed budget "affordable, with a sound educational program." He said that the district "must maintain a high standard" and that with this budget "all services will continue."

Since the budget vote on May 6, the Board deleted \$105,000 in transportation costs. These costs would have provided bus privileges for next year's 9th grade students at the 1 1/4 mile distance, even though the district will begin a 9-12 senior high school in the fall with all students housed in that building. This item is the only change in the budget figure.

Mr. Bennett commented that Superintendent Catherine Fenton submitted a lean budget this year, one which cut expenditures by 20% across the board. He noted that only one-fifth of the budget is under district control, and that many costs are mandated by State education guidelines or are out of district control, such as health care, social security and liability insurance. Other areas which tend to rise are salaries, contracts and services.

One resident asked if the district has looked into "self insured" status. (Mr. Bennett had previously mentioned that the district's insurance costs slightly exceed the \$700,000 mark.)

Assistant Superintendent for Business William Hall stated that the district is looking into self-insured status and that Hicksville recently upgraded its insurance coverage. Mr. Hall noted that the New York State School Boards Association has been aiding districts who wish to become self insured and that the district has entered into a "cooperative" with surrounding areas.

The Hicksville District has become self-insured in some areas—workmen's compensation, long-term disability claims and the \$100,000 deductible. Mr. Hall cautioned that being under the N.Y.S. umbrella saves money in the area of health insurance because, due to involvement with upstate rural districts, state-wide assignments of costs benefit us by lower premiums.

Resident Rosemary Barrow asked how a homebound resident may register to vote. District Clerk, Jane Wilder said that applications may be picked up at her office or one can use the mail-in registration by contacting the office of the County Commissioner of Elections.

Trustee Thomas Nagle queried about the lack of interest in the budget issue on the part of residents. He noted that the district had set up a hot line phone for budget questions and that no significant calls were registered. The district had also offered to send speakers to local community meetings to present the budget and that only two organizations responded. He called on the people who voted "no" on the budget to tell the Board why they are dissatisfied. Mr. Nagle said that the district has overcome many operational problems in the last few years. It has also sought to control overtime and sick time, watch purchases and hold down costs. He challenged the voters by saying they are "not voting on dollars, you're voting on results." He continued that "no one has said they are dissatisfied with the educational process." To this, one gentleman in the audience questioned Hicksville's Nassau County ranking in the number of high school graduates who pursue a college education.

Also in answer to Mr. Nagle, one resident pointed out that 60% of real property taxes are school taxes. She felt that many residents vent their frustration with inflated costs by voting "no" at the school elections. She felt their anger is genuine and that they want the Board of Education to "hold the line" on the school budget.

The next meeting of the Board will be on Election Day, Wednesday, June 17, at 8:30 p.m. in the Senior High School Cafeteria.

James K. Wandelt of Hicksville was among the 2,834 graduates who received diplomas April 17 at Brigham Young University's 112th Commencement exercises in Provo, Utah. The graduates represented all 50 states and 43 foreign countries.

Of the 2,834 April graduates, 1,742 (61.5 percent) were men and 1,092 (38.5 percent) were women. There were 162 doctoral degrees awarded, including 136 Juris Doctor degrees, 451 master's degrees, 2,185 bachelor's degrees and 36 two-year associate degrees.

BYU is owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (the Mormons) and is the largest church-related university in the United States. It has an enrollment of more than 26,000 students representing all 50 states, the District of Columbia and 87 other countries.

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Do You Remember?

We were before television. Before penicillin, the Pill, polio shots, antibiotics and Frisbees. Before frozen food, nylon, dactron, Xerox and Kinsey. We were before radar, fluorescent lights, credit cards and ballpoint pens. For us, time-sharing meant togetherness - not computers; a chip meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware and software wasn't even a word. In those days, bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagons.

We were before Batman, Rudolph the red-nosed reindeer, Snoopy, Vodka (in the United States), and the white wine craze. Disposable diapers, jeeps, and the Jetterson nickel. Before Scotch Tape, M&M's, and the automatic shift and Lincoln Continentals.

When we were in college, pizzas, Cheerios, frozen orange juice, instant coffee and McDonald's were unheard of. We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent.

We were before FM radio, tape recorders, electric typewriters, word processors, Muzak, electronic music and disco dancing. We were before pantyhose and drip-dry clothes. Before ice-makers and dishwashers, clothes dryers, freezers, and electric blankets. Before men

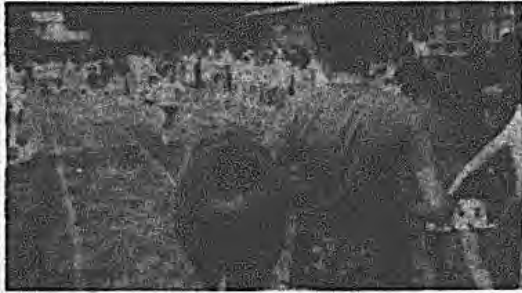
Fork Lane Field Day

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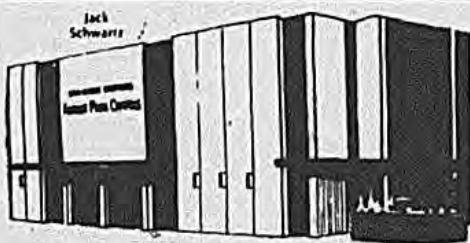
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Express Nips Blast, 5-4

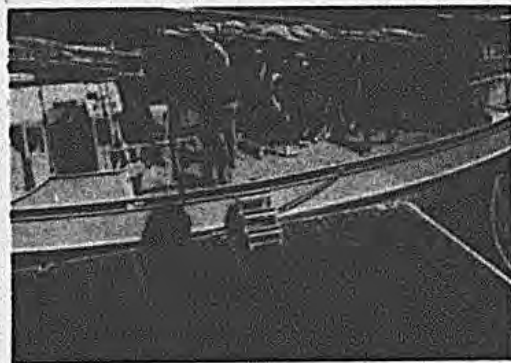
Graduates of the course earned credits toward an associate degree through the Community College of the Air Force.

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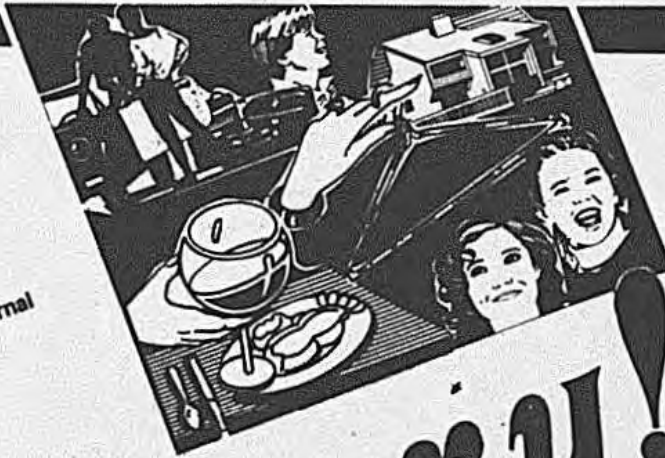

Q. We are a group of young business women who have lunch together once or twice a month. Since we are coming from many directions, we generally meet at the restaurant. Is it proper for the first person who arrives to be seated, or should she wait for the others?

A. Usually the first arrival waits for the second. They ask to be seated, telling the waiter that others are coming. It would not be practical for everyone to wait in the vestibule until the whole party arrives!

Q. Tipping has always bothered me. I know there are many facets to it but why do I have to tip at all?

J.C. A. The answer to this is obvious if you think about it. If you want any control at all over what type of service you are going to get you should be able to give more or less according to how you have been treated.

Many people may not know it but waiters generally get a very low wage - scale, some below minimum wage because tips can be expected to balance the scale and they do depend on between a 15 percent and 20 percent tip to make the job worthwhile.

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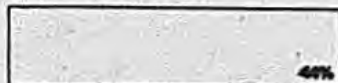

Strawberry fields forever

"Strawberry fields forever," sang the Beatles — only it isn't true.

Los Angeles' South Bay area, swept with cool ocean breezes, is ideal for the growing of prime strawberries, but one by one most of the fields that once carpeted the area have given way to what land developers call "the highest and best use."

Not so many years ago, a strawberry farm and its roadside stand could be found within a short drive of most suburban Los Angeles neighborhoods, but today only a few remain.

Strawberries are a spring crop, but, depending on the weather, they can start appearing in some quantity in late winter. The harvest ordinarily starts in Southern Florida and Mexico in January. Then, at about two-week intervals, the season sweeps northward.

Fortunately, the decline of the highway strawberry stand has been offset by greater attention to produce in today's supermarkets, where you can find strawberries year-round — for a price. Best selection and lowest cost peak with the season in May and June.

How to buy berries: The U.S. Department of Agriculture advises the shopper to look for strawberries that are bright red and well-formed, fully ripe but not soft, with the hulls (or green caps) still on. Beware of moldy spots. These will spread rapidly through the basket. And we have the federal government's word for it that small strawberries taste better than big ones.

How to store berries: Strawberries are highly perishable, so buy no more than you plan to eat right away. Moisture is a particular enemy of a fruit so prone to rot — but the dry air of the refrigerator causes them to dehydrate. If you must keep them for a day or two, store them in a loosely closed paper bag in the refrigerator. Plastic bags may promote mold.

Nature has been bountiful with strawberries: They're high in food value and fiber (the seeds, you know), low in calories (only about 100 calories per box, not counting sugar and cream), and they taste wonderful. As Dr. Samuel Johnson once said, "Doubtless God could have created a better berry, but doubtless God never did."

For those berries that escape being eaten as is, we suggest some recipes, beginning with an American classic:

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

Hull and cut up 2 or 3 baskets of strawberries. Add sugar to taste and allow to stand about an hour so that some juice will be rendered.

Whip $\frac{1}{2}$ pint cream, adding sugar and vanilla to taste. Reserve, covered, in refrigerator.

While you can make shortcake with any kind of sponge or pound cake, the authentic article is prepared with biscuits. These cream biscuits, from the works of the late James Beard, are particularly good and no more difficult to make than a recipe from a box of prepared mix. You will notice that

this recipe does not call for shortening.

JAMES BEARD'S CREAM BISCUITS

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ to 1 cup whipping cream
4 tablespoons butter, melted in a small pie plate

Preheat oven to 450 F.

Mix together dry ingredients. Stir in cream to make light dough, mixing as little as possible to make uniform mixture.

Food processor method: With steel blade, pulse dry ingredients a few times. With motor running, quickly pour in cream. Pulse a few times until dough just holds together.

Knead dough very briefly on floured board. Then pat or roll out to a $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch thickness. Cut into rounds with biscuit cutter — or use small glass about 2 to 3 inches in diameter.

Dip both sides of biscuits into melted butter and arrange on baking sheet with about 2 inches between them. Bake 12 to 15 minutes, until light brown.

To assemble strawberry shortcake: For each serving, split a warm biscuit. Some people butter it — let your conscience be your guide. Put some sliced berries and juice on bottom half, cover with top half. Add more berries and juice and whipped cream to taste. Serve immediately.

Many European pastry traditions also have strawberry cakes. Here's one from Vienna:

ERDBEER-CREMETORTE STRAWBERRY LAYER CAKE

1 best quality sponge cake
1 cup sliced strawberries, pureed in blender or food processor
2 tablespoons sugar (or to taste)
2 cups whipping cream, whipped very stiff
Kirsch or other liqueur (optional)

Mix sugar into pureed berries and allow to stand at least 15 minutes. Drain well in sieve. Fold drained berries into whipped cream.

If we should ever be asked to pick our very favorite food for a quick meal, we'd probably have to choose ... pasta! Fresh or dried, green or white (and sometimes red), flat, curly, round, square or oblong — its variety is infinite, and its usefulness unquestioned. Not only is it quick to cook, it can be wonderful fun to cook as most pasta sauces can only be improved by the inspiration of the moment.

Don't let the myriad of pasta shapes and sizes throw you. Just try to keep in mind that many are virtually interchangeable as long as you stick to a type similar to that called for in a recipe.

Robust sauces are complemented well by sturdy pasta shapes. The Diablo Clam Sauce is not for the faint-of heart. Its intense and lusty flavor will cause lovers of hot and spicy food literally to weep with joy! You can tame its fire by cutting down on the chili powder and cayenne pepper if absolutely necessary. Rigatoni (a large tubular pasta) is a perfect partner to this sauce — or choose any of the larger varieties such as ziti or large shells.

Accompanied by a salad, a glass of wine and, perhaps, some sliced, sugared strawberries for dessert, you have, indeed, one of the perfect meals.

SPRING VEGETABLE PASTA

- 16 slender asparagus
- 1 medium yellow crookneck squash
- 1 medium zucchini squash
- 1 red bell pepper
- 6 ounces prosciutto, sliced about 1/4-inch thick
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 cup thawed frozen peas
- 12 ounces thin strand "angel hair" pasta such as thin spaghetti, capellini or fedelini

- 1 1/4 cups cream (heavy cream or whipping cream)
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan
- 1 cup thinly sliced scallions, including green tops
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil or 1 tablespoon dried
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Begin heating large pot of water for pasta.

Cut tips off asparagus about 2 inches down stem and slice stalks crosswise into 1/4-inch pieces. Cut lengthwise strips about 1/4-inch thick from 2 squashes and discard core containing seeds or save for another use. Roughly chop squash. Remove core, seeds and ribs from

pepper and slice into thin strips about 1 1/4 inches long. Slice prosciutto into strips about 1/2-inch wide.

Heat butter and oil in large skillet. Add asparagus tips and stems and cook, stirring frequently, over medium-high heat for 2 minutes. Add squash and continue to cook for 1 minute. Add red pepper strips and prosciutto and cook 1 minute more. Stir in peas.

Add salt to pasta cooking water (usually about 1 tablespoon for 4 quarts water). Add pasta to rapidly boiling water and cook for 4 to 5 minutes for *al dente*.

Meanwhile, add cream to pan with vegetables and simmer for 2 minutes.

Drain pasta, return to cooking pot and combine with vegetables and cream. Sprinkle on cheese, scallions and basil and toss together using 2 large forks until pasta is well-coated with sauce. Taste for seasoning and add generous grinding of black pepper and salt to taste. (As both prosciutto and Parmesan can be quite salty, additional salt may not be needed. Serve immediately on warm plates.

Yield: 4 servings.
Preparation and cooking time: 25 minutes.

RIGATONI WITH DIAULO CLAM SAUCE

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 4 cloves garlic
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 2 cups crushed plum tomatoes
- 2 teaspoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper or to taste
- 10 ounces chopped fresh clams with juices or 10 ounces canned baby clams

- with their liquid
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- Salt to taste
- 12 ounces rigatoni or other large, sturdy pasta
- 1/4 cup ricotta cheese

Begin heating large pot of water for pasta.

Heat oil and butter in large, non-reactive skillet. Peel and chop garlic and cook over medium heat with chili powder, stirring constantly for 1 minute. Add tomatoes, brown sugar, black pepper, paprika and cayenne. Bring to boil, turn heat to low and simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes. Add clams and lemon juice and cook for another 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, salt pasta cooking water. Add rigatoni to rapidly boiling water and cook for about 8 minutes for *al dente*.

Taste sauce and adjust seasonings, if necessary.

Drain pasta and put onto a rimmed platter or pasta bowl or on individual plates. Spoon sauce over pasta. Top with dollops of ricotta cheese and toss together at table.

Yield: 4 servings.

Why is fiber so important? There is evidence that a diet sufficient in fiber may lower your body's blood cholesterol levels and reduce your risk of developing heart disease and colon cancer. High-fiber foods keep your digestive tract running smoothly, and can even help you lose weight. They take longer to chew, provide bulk to help you feel full, and many are low in calories.

Soluble fiber is found in vegetables such as carrots, cauliflower, corn, green peas, sweet potatoes and zucchini, in dried beans and peas, citrus fruits and prunes, barley, oats, and oat bran.

Good sources of insoluble fiber are whole-grain products, wheat bran, beans, popcorn, nuts and seeds, and fresh fruits and vegetables (especially with their skins intact).

Most Americans consume only

about 11 grams of fiber a day, but the National Cancer Institute has recommended between 20 and 25 daily grams of fiber. Fortunately, it's easy to get the fiber you need. Eating a diet that includes a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, legumes and whole grain products will ensure that you reap the benefits of the various types of dietary fiber. You'll also be getting the vitamins and minerals essential for a healthy body.

Following are several fiber- and mineral-rich microwave recipes:

CHICKEN AND VEGGIES SUPREME

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 cups chopped fresh broccoli
- 2 cups fresh cauliflower florets (cut larger ones in half)
- 2 medium zucchini squash, sliced in 1/4-inch rounds
- 2 medium carrots, diced
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 cups chopped, cooked, skinned chicken
- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 1 large tomato, cut in thin wedges
- 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Preparation Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 11 1/2 to 13 1/2 minutes

Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

In 3-quart glass casserole combine butter and onion. Cover and microwave 1 1/4 to 2 1/4 minutes, stirring after 1 minute, until onion

is just tender. Add garlic, broccoli, cauliflower, zucchini and carrots. Stir to combine, then sprinkle with water.

Cover and microwave 3 minutes. Stir, cover, and microwave 4 to 5 minutes longer, or until vegetables are just tender.

Add all remaining ingredients except cheese, stirring to combine. Sprinkle shredded cheese evenly over top. Microwave, uncovered, 3 minutes longer. Cover and let stand 3 minutes before serving. Serve with brown rice.

Makes 4 to 6 servings.

SWEET POTATOES A L'ORANGE

- 4 medium sweet potatoes
- 1 orange, peeled and cut into chunks
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup fresh orange juice

Preparation Time: 5 minutes
Cooking Time: 21 to 22 minutes (plus 7 minutes standing time)

Oven Setting: MEDIUM-HIGH (70 percent power); HIGH (100 percent power)

Scrub sweet potatoes and pat dry. Pierce with fork in several places and arrange in circle on rack in oven. Microwave on MEDIUM-HIGH about 15 minutes (4 minutes per potato), turning and rotating after 8 minutes, until potatoes feel soft but still slightly

firm in center. Cover and let stand 4 minutes.

Peel and slice sweet potatoes. Arrange in 1 1/2-quart glass casserole with orange chunks. Sprinkle with brown sugar and dot with butter. Pour orange juice over all.

Cover and microwave on HIGH setting 4 minutes. Stir gently and microwave 1 to 2 minutes longer, or until heated through. Let stand, covered, 3 minutes before serving.

Serves 6.

STEWED BREAKFAST PRUNES

- 1 cup prunes
- 3 thin slices lemon
- 1/4-inch stick cinnamon

Preparation Time: 2 to 3 minutes

Cooking Time: 4 to 5 minutes (plus 3 minutes standing time)

Oven Setting: HIGH (100 percent power)

Place prunes, lemon slices and cinnamon in small bowl or microwave-safe casserole. Add water to cover.

Cover and microwave 4 to 5 minutes, until prunes are plump and tender. Let stand, covered, 3 minutes. Remove lemon and cinnamon before serving. Serve warm or chilled.

Makes 2 servings.

Slice cake into 3 thin layers. If you like, sprinkle each layer with a little liqueur as you reassemble cake. Spread each layer with some of strawberry cream, and then cover cake with it. Additional berries may be used for garnish. The cake will probably disintegrate after a while, so serve as soon as possible. With leftovers, make a virtue of necessity by spooning collapsing cake into a bowl like a kind of trifle.

Jacques Maximin, one of the leading French chefs of the new generation, holds forth at Le Chantier in the Hotel Negresco, Nice. This delightful recipe comes from his book "Couleurs, Parfums et Saveurs de Ma Cuisine," which has not yet appeared in English. He advises use of the delicious *fraises de bois* or wild strawberries, which occasionally appear in U.S. markets, but regular berries are good too.

This recipe is not practical without a stand mixer.

JACQUES MAXIMIN'S STRAWBERRY MOUSSE

½ package (1½ teaspoons) gelatin
1½ cups strawberry puree (about 2 cups of cut up berries)
1 cup (1 carton) whipping cream, chilled
3 egg whites
Pinch each salt, cream of tartar
½ cup sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla

Sprinkle gelatin into ¼ cup water in cup measure. Allow to soften.

Puree and chill berries.

Whip cream to soft peaks. Set aside in refrigerator.

The next step involves preparation of an Italian meringue, otherwise known as boiled frosting: In bowl of a stand mixer beat egg whites with salt and cream of tartar until soft peaks form. Allow to wait while proceeding with sugar syrup.

In heavy pan, dissolve sugar over heat in 3 to 4 tablespoons of water. Bring to boil, swirling pan to facilitate dissolving. Cook over brisk heat to soft ball stage (236 to 238 F); experienced cooks will recognize it by the way bubbles in boiling sugar remain briefly on top of syrup before they burst.

Turn mixer on high. Pour hot syrup into meringue in thin but steady stream. While mixture is still hot, add softened gelatin and continue to beat at moderate speed until meringue cools, about 10 to 15 minutes.

When mixer bowl is no longer warm to touch, remove from mixture. Mix vanilla into strawberry puree and then pour over meringue along with whipped cream. With a rubber spatula, fold all together thoroughly but lightly. This

makes about 8 cups of mousse. It can be poured into serving glasses — it's very pretty in tall wine glasses — or into a serving bowl. Chill for several hours, well covered.

Variation: Maximin says that the same recipe works well with any "red fruit" — presumably including raspberries but not watermelons.

Most strawberry dishes call for the classic accompaniment of cream. Here are two recipes from Italy that depart from custom:

STRAWBERRIES WITH CHIANTI

2 baskets strawberries, hulled and sliced
½ cup chianti or other strong red wine (or more to taste)
Squeezes of lemon
Sugar to taste

Pour the wine over the berries with the other ingredients. Allow to macerate at least an hour. Serve with some of the juices poured over.

STRAWBERRIES WITH VINEGAR

2 baskets strawberries, hulled and sliced
2 teaspoons red wine vinegar
Sugar to taste

Place berries in serving bowl, sprinkle vinegar and sugar over them. Allow to stand for about an hour, stirring from time to time. The addition of vinegar sounds odd, but in fact it helps to accent the strawberry flavor.

Variation: In Spain strawberries are sometimes served with the heavy sweet wine of Malaga, which can sometimes be found in liquor shops. As an approximation, you could try sweet sherry, Marsala or port.

Many people enjoy the combination of chocolate and strawberries. The Viennese cake above adapts to this taste by the simple expedient of substituting a chocolate spongecake layer for a plain one. Here's a strawberry-chocolate confection.

CHOCOLATE-DIPPED STRAWBERRIES

1 pint fresh strawberries
1½ ounces semisweet chocolate
1½ ounces milk chocolate
2 teaspoons vegetable oil

Wash berries, leaving hulls on if desired. Dry well by patting with paper towels. In double boiler combine chocolates and oil and stir well over barely simmering water until chocolate has just melted. Remove chocolate from heat, leaving top part of double boiler in place over water.

Hold strawberry by stem, if still on. If it has been removed, insert fork or skewer into stem end. Dip berry in warm chocolate, covering about two-thirds of fruit but leaving stem end uncovered. Allow excess chocolate to drain back into pan. Place strawberries, stem end down, on aluminum foil to harden.

Variation: Arrange chocolate-covered strawberries over a layer of sweetened, vanilla-flavored whipped cream in baked pie shell.

HERBED GARBANZO BEANS

2 cups dried garbanzo beans
¼ teaspoon salt
Lukewarm water
1 cup tomato puree
2 tablespoons vegetable oil, butter or margarine
1 medium onion, sliced
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 tablespoons unbleached white flour
½ teaspoon each dried basil, marjoram, and oregano leaves
¼ teaspoon pepper

Wash and rinse beans, and place in deep, heavy pot. Add salt and lukewarm water to cover and let soak overnight.

In morning, drain off water, adding fresh water to cover. Bring to rapid boil over high heat, skim off foam, bring to a second boil and skim until liquid is clear. Add tomato puree, vegetable oil or butter, onion and garlic.

Cover, reduce heat, and simmer about 2 hours, or until beans are tender. Drain off liquid, reserving about 2 cups. In small saucepan

combine reserved liquid and flour, stirring well to blend. Add seasonings. Stir and cook over low heat to thicken slightly, then add to beans. Heat through and serve immediately.

Serves 6.

LEMONY LENTIL SALAD

3 cups raw lentils
Water
1 large onion, stuck with 3 cloves
2 large cloves garlic, peeled
1 large celery stalk, cut in 2 pieces
2 bay leaves
½ cup chopped green onion
½ cup olive oil
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 clove garlic, minced
¼ teaspoon dried thyme leaves, crumbled
¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper
1 small head romaine lettuce
2 large tomatoes, cut in wedges
¼ cup chopped fresh parsley

Place lentils in large heavy saucepan; add water to cover, plus 3 inches. Bring to full, rolling boil, then reduce heat to low and add

onion, garlic, celery and bay leaves. Cover and simmer about 30 minutes, or until lentils are tender but still hold their shape.

Drain lentils and remove and discard onion, garlic, celery and bay leaves. Turn lentils into a bowl and toss with chopped green onion.

In small jar combine olive oil, lemon juice, minced garlic, thyme, salt and pepper. Shake well to blend. Pour over hot lentils and toss. Let lentils cool, then cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours, to blend flavors.

Wash lettuce leaves and pat dry. Arrange over bottom of flat serving dish. Drain lentils of ex-

cess dressing and spoon into center of dish, garnishing with tomato wedges and parsley. Serve immediately.

Serves 6.

MEXICAN REFRIED BEANS

2 cups dried pinto beans
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
1 small onion, minced
2 large cloves garlic, minced
¼ cup shredded cheddar cheese

Pick through beans, discarding small rocks or damaged beans. Rinse well and place in heavy pot with water to cover. Bring to boil with high heat; let boil 1 minute, then remove from heat and let stand, covered, 24 hours. Drain and discard soak water.

Return drained beans to pot. Cover with fresh water and bring to boil. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 2 to 2½ hours, or until beans are tender and soft. Drain and reserve liquid.

Heat oil in a large, heavy frying pan over medium heat. Add onion and garlic; saute until tender. Add beans, ¼ cup at a time, mashing with back of wooden spoon. Add small amounts of bean liquid, as necessary, to thin slightly.

Reduce heat to low and simmer, stirring frequently, until mixture becomes a thick paste. Serve piping hot, sprinkled with cheddar cheese.

Serves 6 to 8.

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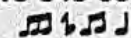
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Here's How

Q: I have two old metal lawn chairs that need to be repainted. I have stripped the old paint off, but I am unsure as to what procedure to take and what materials to use to paint them again.

Please let me know how to paint these chairs and get them ready for the summer season. The chairs are about 30 years old but they are in good condition. — G.V.

A: Wipe the surfaces clean with mineral spirits to remove all oil and grease. Dirty surfaces should be washed with detergent solution, rinsed, and allowed to dry thoroughly. Be sure that any surfaces that might have rust are wire brushed to remove all loose rust.

Since you have already removed the previous coating (peeling paint and any deteriorated surfaces must be removed by scraping before painting) you can proceed with the application of primer and paint. I recommend that you use a paint specifically manufactured for metal surfaces. Rust-Oleum is one product line. Follow manufacturer's directions carefully. Most brands will recommend a metal primer, which is applied and allowed to dry thoroughly before application of the finish coat or coats.

You will find a choice of colors on the market to choose from

With proper surface preparation and proper application of finish coats, your chairs should be good for many summer seasons to come.

Q: Is there a product you can recommend to "paint" concrete garage floors? Further comments about surface preparation also would be helpful. — F.C.S.

A: As with any painting project, the first step is to prepare the surface. This generally consists of brushing away dirt and any loose material and removing oil or grease by solvent wiping.

Metal objects attached to these surfaces should be freed of rust and then be primed with an anti-corrosive metal primer. Cracks and holes should be patched or caulked. Excess florescence — the white powder that sometimes appears on concrete, must be brushed away. For any surface that is to be walked on such as floors, patios, walks or masonry near swimming pools, you have a choice of rubber-based, alkyd-based or latex floor enamels. Check with your local paint dealer for recommended products.

Q: Can you provide information

about dry rot on walls and windows that you printed last fall. It is urgent as we are having our house appraised. I would like to correct the problem beforehand. — J.M.

A: Dry rot is usually caused by moisture in the wood which has not been allowed to dry thoroughly, therefore allowing a fungus to grow and decay the wood structure. If dry rot is extensive your only solution is to replace the boards affected. If the area is not too badly damaged you might treat it with "Deep Treat" a product made by Penta, which is used to prevent dry rot and also termites.

However, it is essential that you correct the moisture problem to prevent further damage.

The following treatment is a temporary method for preventing the spreading of dry rot until permanent repairs can be made: Begin by sanding all paint from the rotted area. Then soak the area with resorcinol-glue, allowing the glue to soak in thoroughly. Once it has set, the glue will form a hard, waterproof substance and hold the rot in check. Remember, this is not recommended as a permanent repair, but only as a handy stopgap measure.

Q: I recently purchased an area rug made of 100 percent wool. Does it need to be mothproofed? If so, what procedure should be used? — D.W.

A: Damage caused by carpet beetles and clothes moths is both aggravating and expensive.

While the use of mothballs may deter fabric pests, the only real protection once you are threatened with infestation is professional treatment. Pest control operators may apply a residual chemical to carpeting in closets and throughout the house, especially in areas where the carpeting meets baseboards and furniture. The residual chemicals, while lethal to fabric pests, are harmless to humans.

However, in your case you may not need any additional treatment. Much of today's carpeting is permanently mothproofed at the carpet mills and is not susceptible to either beetles or moths unless food has been spilled. Check the label or call the retailer where you purchased the carpet to find out if the carpeting has been treated.

If not, extra care should be taken during regular vacuuming. Make certain to vacuum along the edges and under furniture. Remove all food stains promptly. If the rug or carpet is not permanently mothproofed, never roll or store it without first having it cleaned and treated. Besides pest control operators, professional rug cleaners can also treat carpets in the home to prevent damage.

Teens: Last year when Deanna Young, a 13-year-old from California, turned her parents in to the police for cocaine possession, the issue was fraught with controversy. But many teenagers would do exactly the same thing if their parents were using drugs, according to the results of an informal *Seventeen* magazine poll.

Almost half of the teens responding said they could see themselves having their parents arrested for drugs, the poll found. And, an overwhelming 83 percent supported Young's actions. "If adults are just as bad and they can turn us in, shouldn't we be able to turn them in, too?" one teenager remarked.

However, not all teens are eager to see their parents behind bars for drug possession. Twenty-seven percent of the respondents could never report their parents' drug use to the authorities.

"Deanna has some nerve — to turn in her parents after all they've done for her," another teen said.

But what if the situation were reversed? Do teens think parents have the right to turn in their children for drugs? Poll results indicate that 30 percent felt parents should definitely inform the police if they discovered their children were taking drugs. And more than 40 percent said parents should involve the authorities if drugs were a "serious problem."

A number of teens, however, said parents should not view a child's drug problem as a criminal offense, the survey revealed. One-fourth of the 1,100 teenagers who responded to the poll thought parents should consider the matter a family affair.

The best exercise for osteoporosis

Q: I have osteoporosis, very painful, and need exercises for my back. I am 82. Can you help or direct me? — L.H.

A: There is not a specific program of exercise for people with osteoporosis, according to the American Rheumatism Association. "As bone density has decreased, a fall or too much strain during exercise could cause a serious bone break." There is still controversy within the medical profession on the best way to deal with osteoporosis.

The best exercise and one with the least amount of hazard to it, is walking. A brisk walk around your neighborhood three to four times a week should benefit the long bone, which can actually increase bone density. The walk is beneficial, too, for your cardiovascular system. And, if you walk each time with a friend you'll have added a special time for visiting and sharing the experience. So for the best and safest results, the ARA advises you to take a walk regularly.

Q: Can you tell me where to find Bliss Native Herbs? My father used these tablets for a severe

case of rheumatism and it helped him. I, myself, am now feeling problems and would like to obtain this remedy. I am taking aspirin all of the time and it doesn't seem to alleviate the condition. — F.I.

Q. I wish teachers wouldn't show favoritism with certain students as much as they do. Even though many parents don't know better, teachers certainly should. The same children always seem to be the team captains, message carriers, and smile receivers.

I thought all this went out since I was in school (when I often suffered through being left out), but our two children tell me it still goes on.

In their preparation for teaching, isn't the importance of being fair stressed? It certainly should be.

A. It probably is, but apparently human frailties sometimes get in the way. They can be related to being partial to certain characteristics (brightness, for example) or the desire to save time (by giving tasks to the most capable).

A fine educational film called "Cipher in the Snow" emphasizes the danger of ignoring some youngsters. Many teachers have seen it, and more probably should.

However, including team captains on your favoritism list might not be justified. Teachers and coaches may tell you that other factors are frequently involved, like a student's athletic abilities and popularity among other students.

Q. You obviously don't restrict yourself to the United States because I read your column in Barrie, Ontario, Canada — and glad to have it.

A recent letter to you commented on a so-called "negative" child who, according to the writer, is

"good" for only a few hours every other month.

I had a similar type of child, and decided early in her development not to try to mold her into my idea of what a child should be (seen and not heard).

Since both children, mine and that writer's, needed to be active to be happy, I encouraged a personal involvement in decisions regarding choice of clothing, planning meals, and other activities in line with her capabilities.

A strong effort to compliment the positive things a child does can make an enormous difference for the whole family.

My daughter is now 24 and successful in her chosen field. We had some difficult times, but I made sure she knew I loved her and would support her decisions when they were well thought out.

Somehow, common sense tells me to cut down on the sugar intake, for the health of both children and adults.

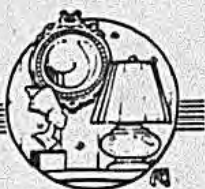
What do you think?

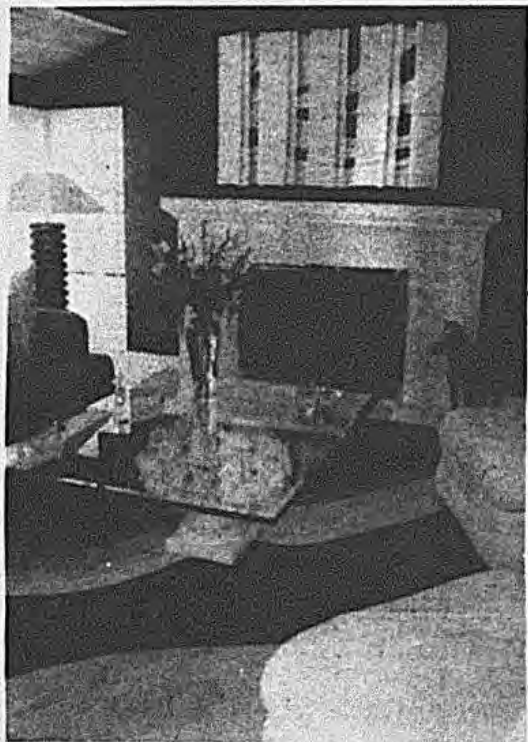

It goes like this: If parental decisions related to controlling artificial coloring or flavoring, sugar, or anything else seem to lead to better behavior and result in no significant side effects, why not go in that direction? The results may be worthwhile enough to warrant limiting the intake of such items.

Carpet-sculpting creates art underfoot

Q: We have just finished redecorating our living room and, though we like all the elements individually, it somehow lacks pizzazz as a whole.

A: We've used paint and solid-colored fabrics. The only pattern in the room is in our artwork. Do you think we need more pattern? — W.H.

A: Artwork or even architecture itself can often provide sufficient pattern to give a space interest. In your situation, your artwork or architecture may be too simple or subtle to give you the excitement you feel is missing.

Sometimes the solution is as simple as adding some boldly designed pillows on the sofa. It is also possible that you have merely selected the wrong piece of artwork as the focal point. Substituting another in your collection may solve the problem.

You can also introduce pattern in your flooring. A good carpet can be the starting point for an entire decorating scheme or it can make its appearance later and tie everything together.

New sculpting techniques make it possible to provide pattern even in conventional wall-to-wall carpeting. You can view your floor as a giant canvas and custom design your carpet to incorporate the colors of the room and set a theme or repeat patterns found in artwork.

Carpet sculpting is also able to achieve interesting effects by combining different kinds of carpeting. Mixing carpets of varying

texture, density, loop style and length of pile, sculpting often produces a look remarkably similar to a hand-loomed rug or tapestry. It might be an appealing way to add the pizzazz you need.

Q: My teenage son wants to get rid of his bed and use a futon instead. What is a futon precisely

and is it an acceptable substitute for a regular bed, healthwise? — P.O.

A: The futon is the traditional bed the Japanese have used for centuries. It is a firm pad that typically is laid on the floor, though sometimes it is used on a slatted-wood base.

The great appeal of the futon is that it can be rolled up during the day, freeing space for other uses. It can also be a great solution for extra guests and sleeping spaces with low ceilings like lofts or attics. Since it is a firm mattress that sits directly on the floor, it is more healthful for the back than many conventional American beds, whose mattresses are too soft.

Now that futons are becoming more popular, you may find a company that makes them in your community. Or you can make one yourself. You will need several layers of flock wadding and upholsterers twine to quilt-tie the encased futon. Detailed how-to instructions can be found in Terence Conran's new book "Home Furnishings" from Little, Brown and Co.

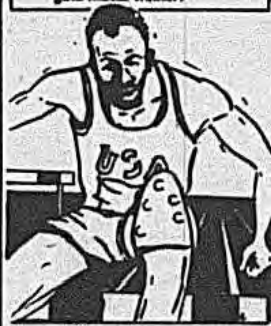

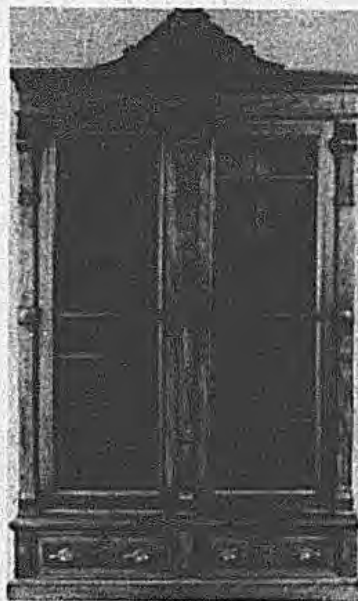

Bookcases a popular item with collectors

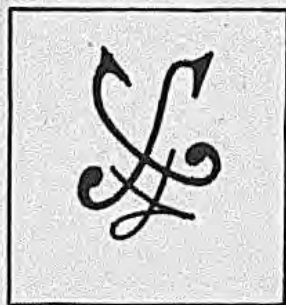
Q: This bookcase is solid walnut with walnut veneer trim. It has five shelves and two drawers below.

Bunnies can be trained to be very good pets

Q: Do rabbits make good pets? Can they be house-trained like dogs or cats?

We are seriously thinking about getting a rabbit for a pet. Our friends have one that they really adore.

Any information that you can give us regarding rabbits will be greatly appreciated.

A: Raising a rabbit as a pet can be a very enjoyable experience. However, rabbits are not like dogs and cats. Generally, their dispositions are quite different. This is important to remember in training them.

It must be remembered that rabbits in the natural state are the hunted and dogs in the natural state are the hunters. Therefore, rabbits tend to be much more timid than dogs and should be treated as such. They do not respond to harsh scolding as a dog usually does, but tend to learn faster by being rewarded for things done correctly.

Rabbits can be house-trained successfully. Training should begin soon after you first take your rabbit home. The rabbit should be restrained in a fairly small area with a litter pan. Rabbits generally like litter boxes. They like the feel of the sand, and many, due to their natural curiosity, use the litter box without any real encouragement.

If your rabbit messes up the

floor, gently place her in the litter box and place the droppings alongside her. Every time that your rabbit successfully uses her box, reward her with a treat such as piece of carrot or lettuce. Never punish your rabbit while she is in the litter box.

Many rabbits enjoy sitting in the litter box. Generally, this should be allowed. The goal is to make using the litter box an enjoyable experience. Most rabbits learn to use their litter boxes within a short period of time.

Many people not familiar with rabbits do not know how to properly pick them up. If the rabbit is not allowed to keep her ears along her back she will lose her equilibrium and kick to regain her balance. Therefore, the rabbit's ears should be slid along the back while the loose skin over the shoulder is grasped. The other hand should be placed under the rabbit's hind legs to support her. As you lift your rabbit by her nape, support her rear end with your free hand. Rabbits not held correctly often experience fractures of the lower back.

With a lot of patience and a healthy sense of humor, rabbits can be trained to be very enjoyable and loyal pets.

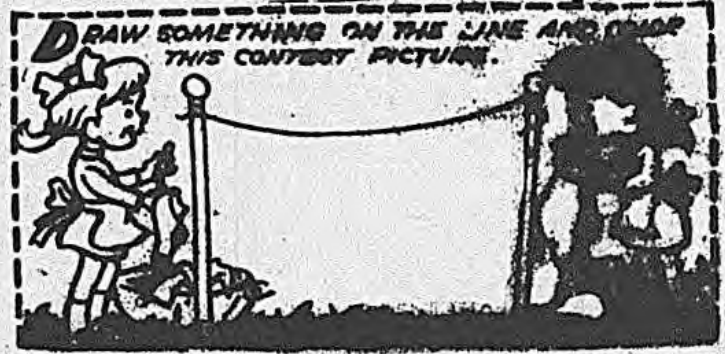
