Chimney Given By Smith As Reason She Escaped

A strong northeast wind that started in a chimney at the old Smith homestead and followed Road in Farmingdale completely destroyed the old structure early Monday morning. 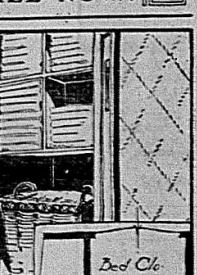

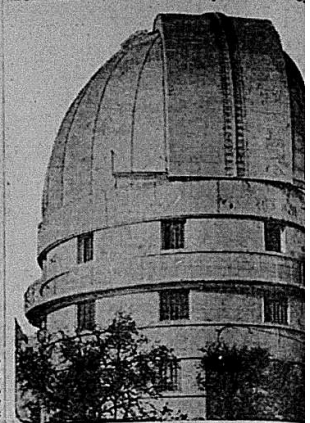

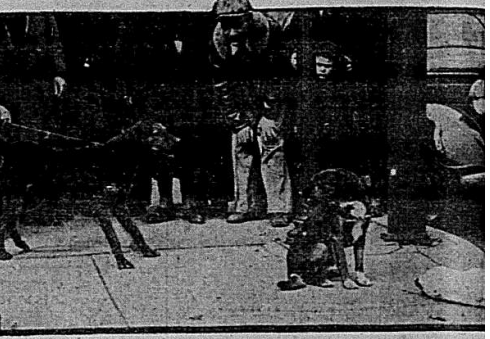

Plan To Open Meadow Brook Hospital Soon

May 1 Is Date Set By Hubbell-Has Contagion Ward

The Meadow Brook Hospital, the first private hospital in Nassau County and the only institution with a ward for the treatment of contagious diseases, will open on or about May 1, George L. Hubbell, chairman of the Board of Managers, announced on Saturday.

The only chance for delay in the opening of the hospital, Mr. Hubbell said, was that beds and surgical equipment could not be obtained in time. The hospital was voted five years ago and it was planned to spend \$1,000,000 on its construction. The depression cut into the expected sale of bonds, however, and it was impossible to complete the building.

The opening in May will not include all facilities. Out of a planned total of 200 beds, only the contagious ward will be ready, plus a few maternity and miscellaneous beds.

On the exterior the hospital, situated in Hempstead Avenue in Longdale, appears completed; the grounds have been landscaped by the Temporary Emergency Relief Administration. The power house has been in operation since fall, keeping heat in the building last winter.

While there are four private hospitals in the county, none is equipped as to be licensed to handle contagious cases.

Curtail Relief Expenses Here

Board of Supervisors Must Cut Down \$50,000 It Hears

Relief activities in Nassau County must be curtailed \$50,000 this month to keep within the State P. E. R. A. allotment for this work. The Board of Supervisors was told at its meeting in Mineola on Monday.

Notice of the April allotment of \$75,600 was received by the board from State headquarters. The allotment for last month was \$728,000, which was \$40,000 under the total needed, according to Nassau welfare authorities.

To meet the cut, work relief holidays were resorted to last week, just before the month closed.

To meet the reduction, fund funds will not be provided this month in the home's relief budgets. Relief officials reported that despite the cut in funds, applications for relief are increasing in the county. A report on the April program was made to the Board in executive session by James G. Buckman, comptroller of the Relief Bureau.

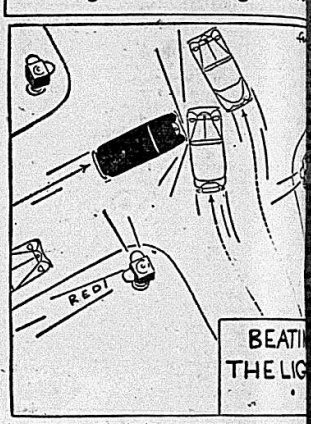
Easter Sunrise Service Planned
