## Hicksville Bus Service Cuts Put On Hold

Hicksville residents who rely on buses as their main mode of transportation got a reprieve from proposed service adjustments that the Metropolitan Suburban Bus Authority (MSBA) said it needs to close a projected budget deficit.

In February the MSBA announced a public hearing on proposed service adjustments. Eleven bus routes servicing Hicksville would be affected. The service adjustments were aimed at closing the gap on a projected budget deficit of up to \$1.4 million. Originally the changes in service were to go into effect by the end of March, but negotiations in Albany have postponed the cuts, said Jo Robertson, a MSBA spokesperson.

"Ridiculous," is what John Hubbs, a Hicksville resident, said of the proposed cut of the N74 line, which runs from the Hicksville Railroad Station to Wantagh, up Jerusalem Ave. He uses the bus to get to and from the supermarket and other stores. He is retired and doesn't have a car. If the N74 is cut he will be forced to ride the N73, which runs a similar route, but at different intervals. "If there is only one bus, you have to wait an extra hour,"

said Hubbs. Now he can catch a bus every half hour; eliminating one would be a big inconvenience, he said.

Mary Glennok, an East Meadow resident rides the N50, another weekday bus that the MSBA has proposed to eliminate. However, there is no other bus that runs a similar route. Before the N50 was established, Glennok walked approximately two and a half miles to get the connecting bus at the Hicksville train station. If the N50 is cut, she will be forced to either walk or ride a bicycle. She said that the N50 is always crowded in the morning and evenings and doesn't know why it would be eliminated.

The schedule adjustments were made by examining patterns of ridership and applying numbers to a formula that the MSBA uses to determine if a route can sustain the cost of itself, according to Robertson.

The MSBA is hoping that the state legislature will be able to come up with additional monies from the State Transportation Operating Assistance Funds. It is very likely that any changes in service

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## Better Circulation Planned For Library

An easily accessible reference section and an expanded periodical room are two of the improvements planned to make the Hicksville Public Library more user friendly.

Seeking to improve library services by changing the layout and use of the library facilities, the Hicksville Public Library board of trustees and library director Celeste Watman have planned renovations to better coordinate the flow of the library.

"Some of the space is not used as efficiently as it could be," said Watman. She and architect Todd Harvey, of Beatty, Harvey, and Associates, explained ideas that the library has discussed, and asked for input from the community before any plans are finalized. Library patrons were encouraged to attend an open meeting held on Tuesday, March 2 to voice their opinions.

The proposed project will only include using the existing space of the library more efficiently, said Watman. There are no plans to expand the building. Some ideas that were discussed included consol-

idating the media services (including the CD, tape, record, and video collections), expanding the periodical section, centralizing the reference staff, organizing the reading areas better and moving the children's room upstairs.

"Plans drawn up are going to reflect the needs of the people who are going to use it [library]," said Harvey. He said that he has spoken with the library staff and the next step is to hear from library patrons. Although the meeting was sparsely attended, those present did provide input.

An area of importance that was discussed was the orientation of the library when it is first entered. The way that it is now, patrons are drawn to the left. The right side of the library is closed off by the circulation desk and small entrance into the Elery Bean wing. "My first impression was that there was poor circulation to the right of the library entrance," said Harvey. The layout is not defined, so patrons immediately have to ask where sections are if they are not familiar with them. That problem could be alleviated by

# Parents And Teachers Join Forces

Woodland School PTA kicked off the school's 40th anniversary celebration with a volleyball tournament that will eventually lead to new playground equipment for the children.

The volleyball tournament is just one of several events planned to raise money to replace the playground equipment; other events include a cookbook, a dinner-dance, selling boosters, and a fund raiser by the children.

In a reversal of the often heard plea from teachers that they need the parents to become involved, the Woodland parents got the teachers to play in a round-robin tournament that pitted two teams of teachers and six teams of parents against each other. "We wanted to get the parents and teachers involved in this together," said Diane Oliva, co-chairperson of the Woodland School Playground Fund Raising Committee.

The tournament took place at the middle school on Saturday, March 6. A big crowd of parents, grandparents, and children watched the all-day tournament. In addition to the entrance fee, there was a 50-50 raffle that raised funds to go to the playground fund.

The committee has already looked at several playground equipment brochures, but will not be making a final choice for a while. "It is a long-term project," said Sue Lauro, the other co-chairperson of the committee. They expect to purchase and have the new equipment by 1995. The existing playground equipment dates back only 10 years, but because it was made of wood, it deteriorated quickly. The committee would also like to purchase padding to place underneath the kindergarten playground equipment. It is currently over blackout.

The parents at Woodland School have taken on this project as an anniversary gift to the school. All the sister schools, those opened in 1952, have held some kind of special event to mark their 40th anniversary. The Woodland School parents, alumni and friends have been very generous in their support of the committee, said Oliva. And their continued support is essential.

The Woodland committee is also preparing a cookbook that it will sell to raise money for the new playground. Donna Lambert and Carolyn Gee are chairing the cookbook committee. They have been asking parents, teachers and community members to send them their favorite homecooking recipes that can be included

in the cookbook.

The idea for a cookbook came up at one of the committee meetings; it is a standard fund raiser, said Gee. In addition to selling the cookbooks, the committee will ask local food merchants to sponsor the book. All recipes will have the author's name with it and a self-titled name for each dish.

In addition to recipes, the cookbook will feature a section on lunchbox ideas and also a section on useful cooking information, such as what ingredients can be substituted for each other. # School Funding Grabs Attention

Hicksville, like most other Long Island school districts, faces a large reduction in state aid. Assemblyman Fred Parola spoke out about those cuts and other state issues that affect Hicksville residents at the March meeting of the Hicksville Community Council.

Billed as the New York State Representatives Forum, bad weather and other engagements were responsible for the absence of Senator Ralph Marino, Senator Michael Tully, Senator Kemp Hannon, and Assemblyman David Sidikman. Tully sent a representative in his place.

Parola spoke briefly and then fielded questions from the audience. His and many residents' concerns focused on the state aid funding cuts for Long Island schools. "His [Governor Mario Cuomo's] calculated reduction to Long Island schools would devastate area homeowners, who already must contend with excessive tax rates. 'This cannot stand,' said Parola, speaking on the governor's proposed budget. Hicksville would receive a reduction of \$531,947 or a 9.6 percent reduction in aid from the state. Parola predicted that after the legislature works on the budget that Hicksville will have some of the proposed cut in aid, restored.

"The good news is that we are not as bad as we have been, the bad news is that... we are still in horrendous shape," said Parola speaking about the state budget and projected deficit of \$3.3 billion dollars. Parola attacked the governor's budget as severely affecting the suburbs and the services such as libraries, mental health, and education; while not doing enough to curb welfare costs.

"Beyond the harsh reductions in school aid for Long Island, state spending for welfare would rise 8 percent, or \$1.8 billion, and Medicaid spending would increase 12 percent under the governor's budget," said Parola. "This failure to curb welfare spending, supports my belief that we need full accountability for social services spending which is breaking the backs of New York's taxpayers and drying up funds for other programs," he said.

School board member Carole Wolf ques-

tioned the assemblyman on his position on the Commissioner of Education's school consolidation proposal. Parola said that he does not feel that there is a great need for consolidation, especially in Nassau County schools. He said that the savings would not be significant enough to take away a community's own district. He also said that he favors an income tax/property tax based funding for public schools.

The next meeting of the Hicksville Community Council will be Thursday, April 1.

## Library Always Kept Up With Times

Established during an earlier period of Hicksville's residential growth, during the 1920s, the Hicksville Public Library's first collection of books was a gift from the fund-raising efforts of the Hicksville Choral Society and was housed in a room of the Nicholas Street School. The library struggled on small revenues during the Great Depression and the years of World War II.

The post-war years transformed Hicksville, economically and socially, from a largely rural region of potato and truck farms, to a village with a downtown shopping center, and a sprawling residential area with suburban needs. As the population soared from 7,000 to 45,000 people in the space of five years, library book circulation grew steadily.

With a successful public referendum

of 1950, the library acquired the Duerk family residence on Second St. and Jerusalem Ave., where the library is located today. Since that time the school district expanded services and the library kept pace with the community by expanding both services and the building itself.

In 1955 the first building expansion took place, increasing the book collection and adding seating. In 1964 another building expansion increased reference, periodical, and study areas. In 1980 an elevator was installed. The Elery Bean wing was constructed in 1985 to add much needed stack space, at the same time the local history room was added. In 1992 the dedication of the Peter DeNinno Computer/Study Room was held, marking another expansion of the library structure.

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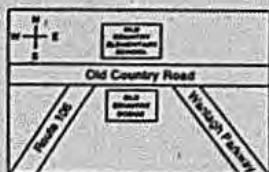
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## Trinity Visits Goudreau Museum

## Second Half School Taxes Now Payable

Town of Oyster Bay residents are reminded that second half 1993 school taxes are due April 1, 1993, and payable without penalty through May, 10, 1993.

By law, a taxpayer has 40 days from the date the tax is due, during which payment may be made without penalty. After the 40 day grace period, a one percent penalty is added for each month the tax remains unpaid, retroactive to the due date of April 1, 1993.

Residents can pay their taxes in person at the Tax Office, Oyster Bay Town Hall West, 54 Audrey Ave. in Oyster Bay, and at Town Hall South, 977 Hicksville Rd. Massapequa. Taxes can also be mailed to the Office of the Receiver of Taxes, 54 Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay, New York 11791. The Town Clerk's Annex at Newbridge Rd. and Duffy Avenue in Hicksville will also be open to accept tax payments, by check only, from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. on May 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 10. Payments made by mail must be postmarked no later than May 10, 1993 to avoid penalties.

When paying in person at the Tax Office, taxpayers are reminded to bring the entire tax bill with their payment. Payments being made by mail should include the second half stub, indicating which payment is being made.

The Office of the Receiver of Taxes cautions residents not to write on, fold, staple, or otherwise deface the tax stubs as this can cause the computer system to re-

ject payment.

In addition, residents should be aware that claims for either Senior Citizens' Exemptions or Veterans' Exemptions must be filed no later than May 1, at the Nassau County Department of Assessment Office in Mineola. Brochures on either exemption can be obtained by calling 535-2377 for Senior exemptions and 535-2333 for Veteran Exemptions. Residents may also request the brochures from the Office of the Tax Receiver, 922-5800 ext. 2270.

# Exciting Retreat For East Street

On Feb. 3-5, over 40 fifth-grade students in Mr. Tomaini's and Dr. Leo Kanawada's classes at East Street School participated in the seventh annual three-day resident program at Caumsett State Park in Lloyd Harbor. # Everybody's Irish On St. Patty's Day

Next Wednesday, March 17, is St. Patrick's Day. The date marks the death of St. Patrick in about the year 461. Folklore surrounding St. Patrick, who was a priest then a bishop, says that he delivered a sermon from a hilltop that drove the snakes out of Ireland.

## Safety Tips Stressed By Fire Officials

Hicksville fire officials wish to bring to the attention of local residents two items which contributed to serious damage in recent months.

A recurring problem is the use of wood insulated oil burner enclosures in the Lev-it style oil burners. A recent fire in an oil burner spread rapidly due to the fact the metal cover or enclosure was replaced by a wooden cover. The fire burned through the wooden cover and destroyed the entire kitchen. If wood has to be used, all combustible surfaces should be covered with

fire rated material including all joints and seams.

Many homes in the area have coordinated the attached garage into living space, but the outside garage door was left in place. Recently, firefighters were attempting to enter a dwelling via the garage door only to find a wall behind the door. Time was lost gaining access to the fire area. This practice may also be in violation of town building codes. Any injuries resulting from this type of situation could result in

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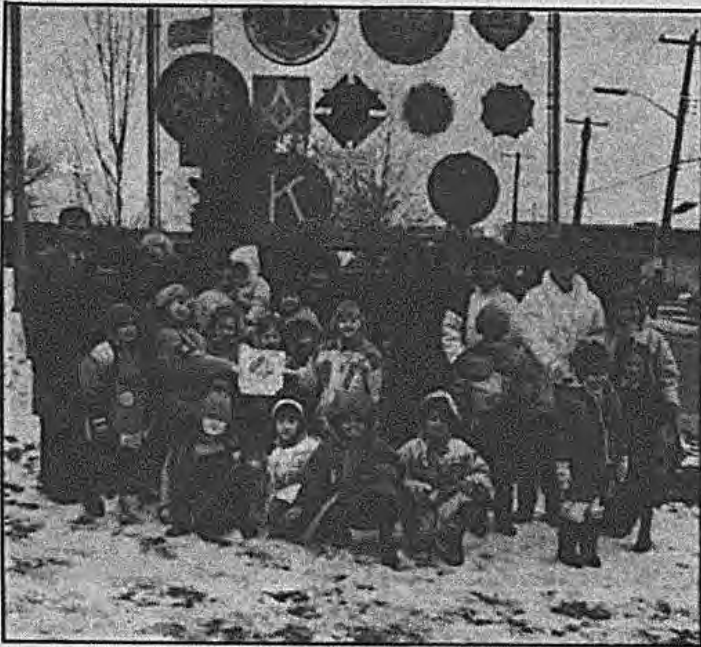

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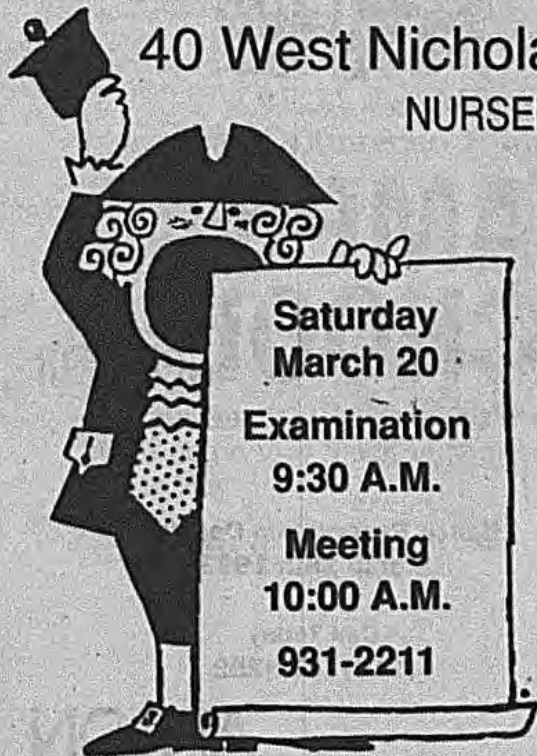

We wish to congratulate all these students and wish them well as they complete their final year at St. Ignatius School.

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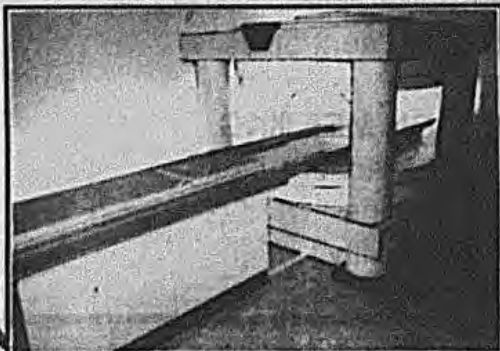
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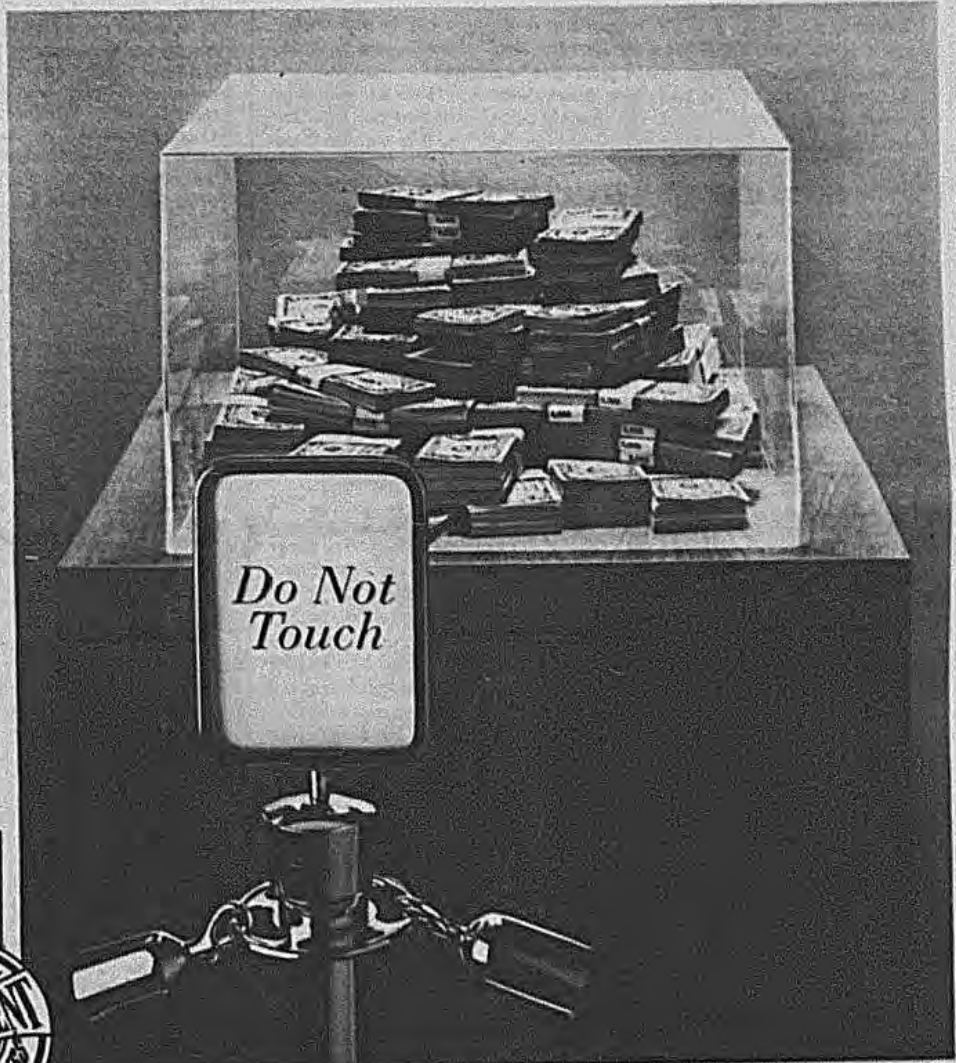

## Bone Up On Boating Skills Now

With spring rapidly approaching, and the busy Long Island boating season not far behind, adults and teenagers alike should make it their business to learn or brush up on their boating skills by taking one of the many courses now available.

Anyone who owns a boat, or even spends a lot of time on a friend's or relative's boat, should know the basics of navigation and vessel operation. It will make the waters safer for all boaters, swimmers and sailboarders.

Long Island waters are far too crowded in the summertime; there is no room for ignorant boaters.

A boat is a lot like a car. If it is operated properly, it can be an exciting and wonderful experience. But if the operator does not know what he is doing, or is under the influence of alcohol, it can be deadly.

But, unlike a car, in New York State, boaters over age 18 do not need a license to operate a vessel, nor do they have to demonstrate that they know the rules of the water. All they have to do is buy the boat, put it in the water and sail away.

The Department of Motor Vehicles would not issue a driver's license to someone who did not know to stop at a red light or that the oncoming traffic has the right of way when he is making a left turn. Why shouldn't a motorboat operator know that a sailboat has the right of way or that the red buoys are on the right when returning to port?

Boaters should have the common sense to want to take a certification class and refresh their skills now and then. Failing that, government might have to get involved and a course or licensing requirement might become law.

The name of the game is safety, and taking a course to learn how to navigate and operate a vessel is a small price to pay for the protection of the boaters, their passengers and those with whom they share the water.

To continue with our talk about volunteering, let me tell you about a few things that some of my friends do — some of which I couldn't possibly do since I don't have the skills needed... One is a braille volunteer... She brailles whole books in the privacy of her home which are then sent to the Library of Congress where they can be reproduced mechanically and sent to blind people all over the country. She particularly likes doing children's books... And then there is Recording for the Blind where the volunteers record whole books on tape, usually for blind students from pre-kindergarten and even in some cases through medical school... This is a volunteer job which is done in a studio with another person so there's a social component included if you like to work with people... How about being a lay minister of the Eucharist and taking communion to hospital or home bound patients... What a holy job that is!!!... And then, if you want to work in a hospital, there are so many jobs, some as simple as distributing newspapers or magazines, others like working in the gift shop or lunch room, and many involving patient care if that's what you would like to do... One wonderful volunteer activity that I only recently learned about since one of my dear friends is the full-time caretaker for her Alzheimer's patient husband — and so tied down that she is often "stir crazy" is the helpers who come in for a few hours one day a week — two together — one to take the patient out for a ride or a walk or an ice cream soda while the other relieves the caretaker by taking her to lunch or to a shop... My friend says that this service is keeping her sane... Or perhaps you could drive people to the doctor or the dentist or to a therapist... or maybe you could be a teacher's aide and assist in the classroom with a child who needs just a little more attention... You can see that I have only scratched the surface, but there's a volunteer job for everyone... Don't you dare say that you're bored — get moving... I have never met a volunteer who didn't say he got much more from volunteering than he gave... Let it be you!!

As informed at the last Board of Education meeting and confirmed by the follow-up article in the last issue of this newspaper, James Black discussed at the last meeting his desire to move back certain areas of the Lee Avenue attendance zone that is now scheduled to go to Old Country Road School.

He was ready to make a motion to change attendance areas already voted on by the board but did not go forward since he only had the support of Richard Pfander. Dave Staton, however, also expressed his desire to "play" with the redistricting maps to address his concerns for his Old Country Road area. All this "fine-tuning" of the already voted upon attendance areas will now be put off until the April Board of Education meeting.

I think the community should have a list submitted from Black, Staton, and Pfander listing all their friends, neighbors, and families whose children could be affected by the school closing. This way, come April, we will know exactly who will be moved, and who will be lucky enough to be able to stay in their own school.

### Choice Is 'Tyrannical'

James Black's contention that if Donna Martillo, and Carole Wolf and Arlene Rudin (who did not vote with him on any school closing or redistricting scenarios) believe that redistricting lines can be drawn better they will support his motion is ludicrous. If they do not agree with Black he will have us believe that they do not mean what they say or are "just making noise." The whole redistricting plan adopted by the school board is unfair and potentially dangerous. For Black to try to intimidate people into fixing the lines only of his choice is tyrannical. What is next? Will Dave Staton try to change the lines that affect the children leaving Old Country Road? Will the board allow the fifth-graders to remain in their school to graduate with their entire class? While I am not suggesting these proposals do not have some merit, I am asking who will protect the East Street children? Can our fifth-graders remain in our building? Can our children remain in our neighborhood eliminating the need for additional buses?

Although we have been assured all our children will receive buses to cross Old Country Rd. and Broadway, is Black aware that even with new schoolbuses that may be equipped with seatbelts, Hicksville's policy does not require wearing them? The point is if a school is going

to close and thereby cause redistricting it needs to be done completely and fairly and in such a manner that it will not need "fixing." It is blatant political and personal agendas when this board tells us we should let this happen for the good of the community when none of their children or neighbors are affected.

As for the accusations of "race-baiting" I believe Black is the only one guilty of vicious comments. He has accused us of being racist and hatemongers. I would like once and for all to make a few points regarding the petition that I support. First of all, regarding Black's claims that every ethnic, racial, and religious group got together to send statements in support of the board, you should know that there is also a very broad base of people supporting the petition. Second, the light Black has attempted to portray us in could not be further from the truth. While it is true that one of our objections to this redistricting is the minority imbalance which the board refused to alleviate (even after listing it as a criteria) our reasons for this are not what Black would have you believe.

We feel first and foremost that Hicksville has a very integrated town and we need to have all our children together from the time they are in kindergarten. Young children do not have prejudice. If our children of all races and religions are schoolmates from a young age perhaps we would not have the problems we are now having in our high school. We can no longer deny that we have racially motivated problems in our high school and the students are being hurt — both physically and psychologically by it. How better to promote racial harmony than to balance the minority population in our elementary schools? Perhaps if this is done we will not need a "task force" when these children reach high school as they will all only see each other as fellow students.

I would just like to add (at the risk of being accused of not speaking for myself, which I do) that Staton knows full well why Doretha Bennardo requested a stay from the commissioner. Staton cleverly tries to hide his deception of the people of Hicksville by stating that "the only stipulation to the Solomon Schechter lease, is that the district appeal the commissioner's decision." Does this mean if the board is unhappy with the commissioner's decision they will appeal? Staton has continually, at board meetings and in letters to this newspaper, told us that the petitioner — for this very reason — is expending money from the taxpayers and our children's education. Has this somehow changed now that he sees himself in a similar situation?

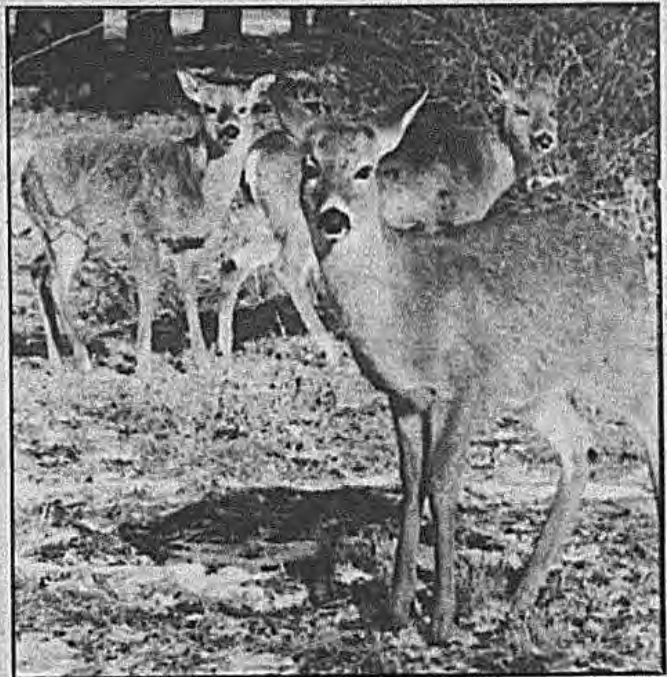

If there is a worm in Fleishman's apple it is 18-year old Gracie's attitude toward him and his career. When she was a little girl, Gracie had been his most loyal admirer. She would accompany her father to political meetings, listening intently as he spoke and applauding loudly when he finished. But something happened when Gracie was 13 and her relationship to her father was never the same again.

As *Saving Grace* opens, Gracie is introduced to the political reporter who goes by the single name of Barnaby. Barnaby, once frankly a fan of Fleishman's, is now in the process of writing an expose of him and his colleague and best friend, Michael Kavin. Although her father warns Gracie that Barnaby's only interest in her is because she is his, Fleishman's, daughter, Gracie is attracted to the reporter and continues to see him.

As Barnaby's investigation into his business deals continues, things begin to go wrong for Fleishman. Friends avoid him, business associates become too busy to return his calls and even his children act as if there were something dishonest about his activities. When Lily appears to doubt him, Fleishman feels as if he has been deserted by everyone.

Once Barnaby's story breaks, Fleishman, still convinced of his own rectitude, hires an attorney to represent him. Soon the district attorney, once another old friend, has him indicted and Fleishman must stand trial.

The conversion that comes about during the trial, the change in Gracie's life, and the ultimate resolution make for gripping reading and a thoroughly satisfying psychological conclusion. Highly recommended.

## Did You Ever Wonder...

People might think that old telephone books never die. There are so many uses for them. Children can sit on the old yellow pages so they can reach the table. They can be used to prop up the corner of someone's bed. Macho men rip them in half to show how strong they are and impress their girlfriends. But what about those phone books for which nobody has found a use?

According to NYNEX, Nassau County residents recycle them. About 100 tons of telephone directories were collected from residences and businesses in the county.

One hundred tons translates into approximately 53,000 copies of the yellow pages.

The directories were collected in about 15 municipalities and brought to American Ref-Fuel, where they were prepared to be shipped to Marcal Paper in Elmwood Park, New Jersey, and Brownville Specialty Paper in Brownville, New York.

Marcal uses the directories to make household paper products made from 100 percent recycled paper. Brownville Specialty Paper uses directories and other waste paper to manufacture products such as poster board and press board.

"The amount of directories collected this year in Nassau County more than quadrupled last year's efforts," said John D. Balaguer, director of environmental issues for NYNEX Information

Resources, publisher of the Yellow Pages.

"In addition, American Ref-Fuel made the Nassau program possible by providing a site where towns could bring the old directories they collected. The ability for towns to bring their directories to one location was critical to the success of the program," he added.

In Suffolk County, a directory recycling program collected 145 tons of old telephone books.

NYNEX is a corporate partner in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Green Lights Program, a voluntary program to reduce demand for electricity and prevent air pollution.

The company's goal is to have directories incorporated into local recycling programs. "In anticipation of diverting more directories from landfills, we will continue to identify and develop new markets for out-of-state directories," Balaguer said.

So there you have it. Old telephone books never die. When they're not being used to shore up the end of the couch or so Junior can reach the dining room table, they turn into paper towels and napkins and poster board.

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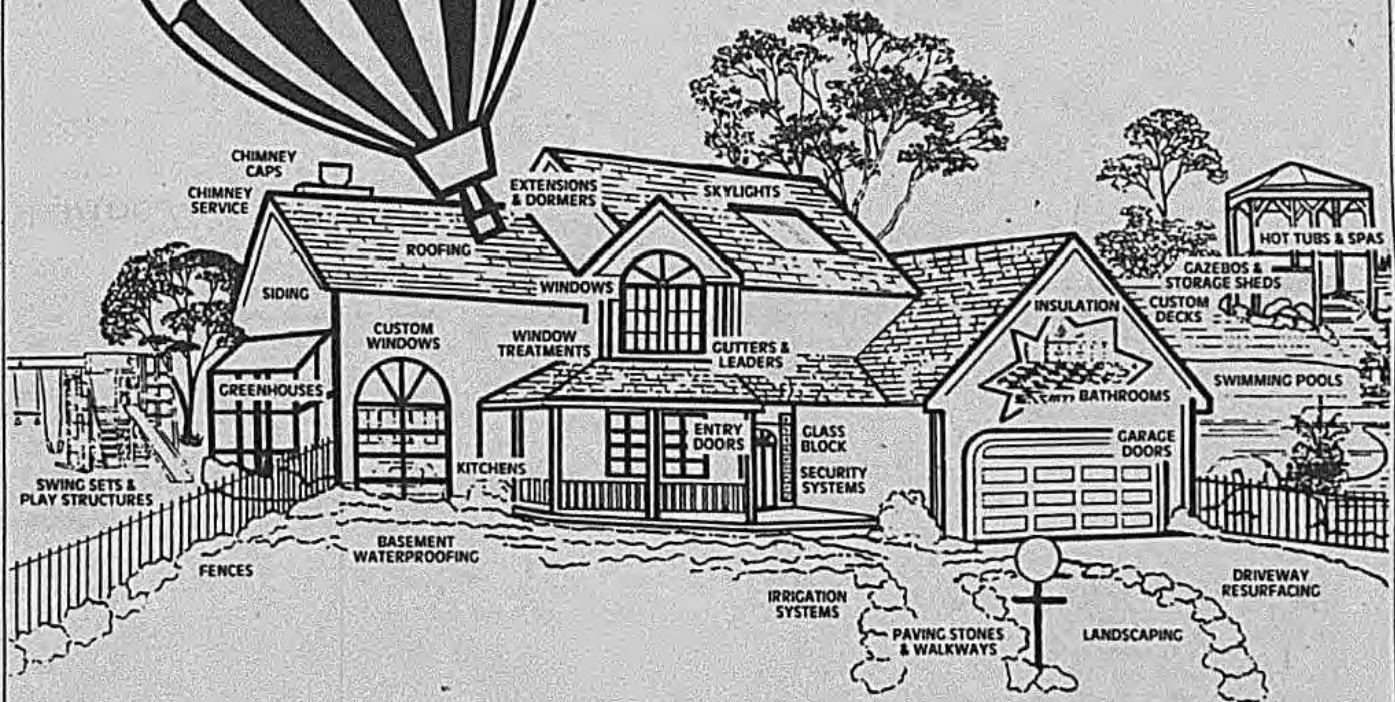

wouldn't happen until the state budget is announced. "We are making every effort not to implement service cuts," said Robertson.

George Cordts would end up arriving at work later and catching a later bus during the evening. Michael Grunhurst could take a train instead of the bus, but would have to walk four blocks to get to his home from the train station. The bus drops him off practically in front of his house.

At the MSBA hearing, held at the Nassau County Executive Building in Mineola, approximately 70 people addressed the board, including riders, MSBA employees, and politicians, urging the MSBA to come up with alternatives to cutting service. Nassau County Executive Thomas

Gulotta commented that the MSBA received \$24.8 million in subsidies from the county, an amount that far exceeds amounts allocated to any county department. He called for the MSBA to reduce administrative costs that are as much as 20 to 30 percent of the total MSBA budget.

Weekday service that would be affected by cuts includes the N50 to Bellmore, the N74 to Wantagh, and the N80 to Sunrise Mall. The N73 to Wantagh, N80, N81, and N48 to Hempstead will all be eliminated on Saturdays and the N22 to Jamaica will have reduced service on Saturdays. Sunday service affected includes the N20 to Glen Cove (eliminated), N22 to Jamaica (reduced), and the N49 to Hempstead (eliminated).

making the opening larger between the main part of the library and the Elery Bean wing.

Funding for any renovations that are approved will come from the capital improvement budget, according to library board president Marc Herbst. Depending on the scope of the project, it could be phased in over several years. Since the project is only in the initial stages, blueprints haven't even been drawn up. At the next public meeting, tentatively scheduled for April, the public will have another chance to talk about the plans and discuss their ideas, then the architect and the library board will draw up plans, which will be presented to the public.

The placement of the reading areas is also under consideration. Currently they are placed sporadically around the library. Harvey proposed that they extend down

the center of the library, from one end to the other, with the reference section somewhere in between. This would give the library a more wide open feeling and also would make reference more accessible and provide for better supervision of patrons by library staff.

Moving the children's room to the first floor was also discussed. Advantages of having it located upstairs would be easier access for children and parents with strollers, and the possibility of consolidating the circulation services into one for both the adult and children sections. However, the library and consultants want to get more input from parents with young children.

The library plans on having at least two more open meetings before plans are finalized. Watman urges all residents to either attend the future meetings or to write her with ideas.

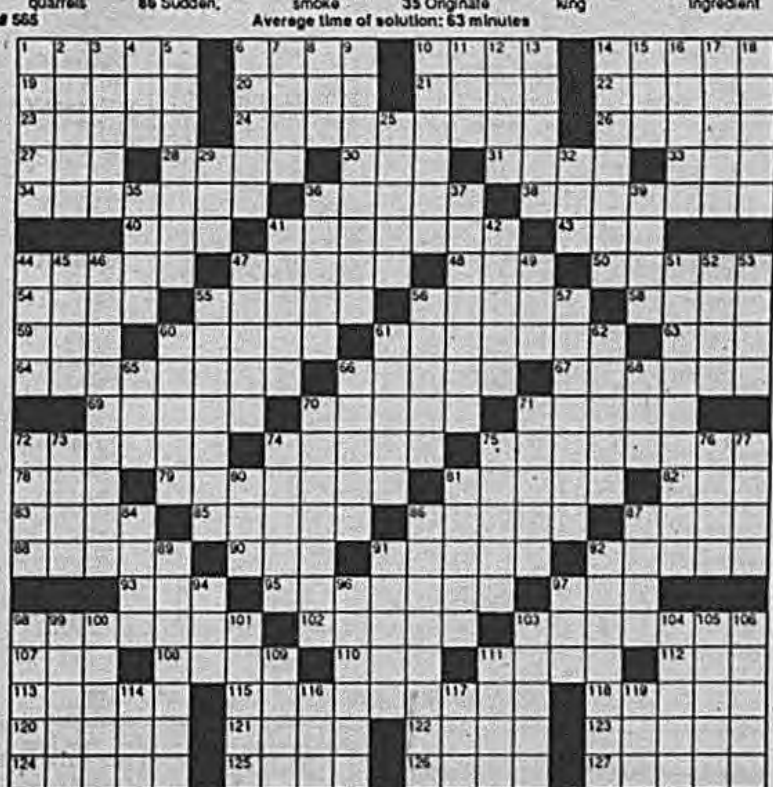

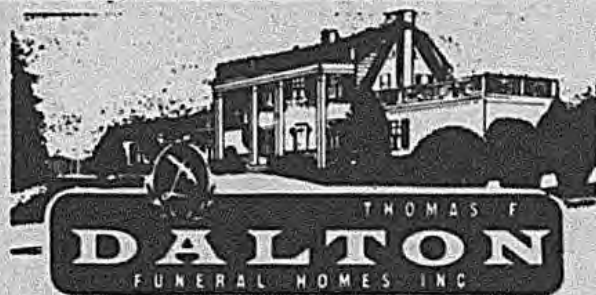

## Breaking Records At Michigan

Freshmen Wendy Marshall, of the University of Michigan women's gymnastics team, has been named the women's Gymnast of the Month for February by the Big Ten Conference.

During the month of February, Marshall was the vaulting champion in each of Michigan's five competitions, posting scores of 9.75, 9.80, 9.85 (twice) and a 9.90. Marshall's mark of 9.80 early in the month tied the Michigan record on vault, set in 1992. She then broke the record twice, once with her score of 9.85, coming against Oklahoma University and Centenary College in Norman, OK, and then again with a 9.90 at the University of

Denver.

Marshall also made her debut as an all-around performer during the month of February, scoring a 38.75 against Utah State and BYU, at Utah State. During that meet, she set season personal bests on the uneven parallel bars (9.75) and balance beam (9.60).

Marshall helped the Wolverines to an 11-1-0-1 Big Ten record during the month of February, defeating three nationally ranked teams, No. 12 BYU, No. 15 Utah, and No. 19 Oklahoma (twice), in the process. The Wolverines are 15-1 overall and 2-1 in the Big Ten Conference.

With Marshall leading the way on

vault, the Wolverines set a new school vaulting record with a team score of 48.80, coming against Central Michigan University in Michigan's only home match of the month. The score passes the old mark of 47.70 set earlier this season against Illinois; in fact, every one of Michigan's team vault scores, during the month surpassed 47.70. Marshall's vaulting also helped the Wolverines set a new school record 193.45 team score; also coming against Central Michigan.

Marshall's season highs this year include: 9.90 - vault, 9.75 - bars, 9.60 - beam, 9.75 - floor, and 38.75 all-around.
