Taking Action Against Graffiti Vandals

Tired of seeing their neighborhood being vandalized by graffiti, Hicksville Southwest Civic Association members have decided to take the paint into their own hands.

Armed with gray paint, rollers, drop cloths and brushes, several members of the civic painted over graffiti that marked the handball court at the Abe Levitt Park on Stewart Avenue Wednesday afternoon. They were cleaning graffiti that was done the night before.

The civic has taken it upon themselves to act as quickly as possible to remove graffiti from the Abe Levitt Park, an area that the civic has put paperwork in to Oyster Bay to adopt as part of the Adopt-A-Spot program. "We want to send out the message that we are watching the spot," said Ray Manzo, president of Hicksville Southwest Civic Association.

The park has been the target of vandals numerous times over the years, and is hit with graffiti virtually every weekend, according to area residents. Two of the hardest hit spots are the handball courts and the shed that is used by the Hicksville Baseball Association for concessions and storage. Over the winter both areas were covered

with graffiti. The Town of Oyster Bay sent a crew to paint over the graffiti on April 16, in order to have the park looking good for the HBA Opening Day Parade on April 17. The night after the parade the handball court was hit again, so the civic group sent people to cover the graffiti. Less than 24 hours later, more graffiti was spotted on the wall. It too was covered by the civic.

"We have decided to take the initiative," said Manzo. "If we see it, we are going to cover it." The civic, founded just about a year ago, has made great strides in improving its neighborhood. In addition to action on graffiti, the civic has planned to have a Neighborhood Watch Program set up, and have held various meetings with area residents to make beneficial changes around the Dutch Lane area.

Oyster Bay Councilman Leonard Symons, sponsor of an in-depth anti-graffiti program, praised the civic for doing its part in the fight against graffiti. "To get that kind of active assistance is a blessing," said Symons. His multi-level plan tries to attack the graffiti program on all levels, including the government level and community level, encouraging schools,

Celebrating 30 Years Of Life In Hicksville

Holy Family Parish, founded in 1951, has had a long and proud history. Sister Maureen Archdeacon has shared in that proud history for 30 of those 42 years.

Celebrating 50 years as a sister in the Sparkhill Community, a Dominican Sisterhood, Sister Maureen was assigned to Holy Family Parish in 1959. She spent a few years teaching for the Parish School of Religion. In 1961, she was transferred to Queen of Heaven Parish in Brooklyn, but was back at Holy Family Parish and School by 1965.

"I like to be home in Hicksville, at Holy Family," said Sister Maureen. When she was originally assigned to Holy Family, in 1959, the school had not yet been opened. She saw the convent where she presently lives being built, and the first day of grammar school at Holy Family. Although she has had the chance to travel to Florida, California, and all over New York State, Sister Maureen prefers to be in Hicksville. After she was assigned to Holy Family the second time, the commu-

nity rules changed allowing nuns to decide where they wanted to work and live. Sister Maureen chose Holy Family.

Originally a grade school teacher, she also has taught science to the seventh and eighth grade. She has seen whole families go through Holy Family. Some of her students are now teachers, and she has taught three generations in some families. She has followed her student's progress, especially those who have attended Holy Trinity High School, often receiving reports that her students were top rated in science classes.

After her stint as a science teacher, Sister Maureen helped with the pre-K program at Holy Family. "A happy time in my life," she fondly remembers. Now an assistant in the computer lab at Holy Family, Sister Maureen adores working with the students and likes computers. "I love them," she said speaking about the children.

As much as she is liked by the students and parents at Holy Family, she is just as loved by her companions at Holy Family Convent. "She is very well liked by all

PTA To Hold Candidates Forum

The Hicksville Council of PTAs is sponsoring a School Board Candidates Forum at 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 5 in cafeteria A of the high school.

Three seats are up for election on Hicksville's School Board this year. Each seat is a three-year term, beginning July 1, 1993 and expiring on June 30, 1996.

Richard Pfaender and Gary R. Lewis have filed petitions for the seat currently held by Pfaender. Nancy Callari and Mary E. Carton are vying for the seat now held by Arlene Rudin. Rudin has not filed petitions for re-election. Carole R. Wolf and Raymond Manzo are seeking election to the seat currently held by Wolf.

Representatives from Nassau District PTA, who do not reside in Hicksville, will serve as moderator and timekeeper for the forum. The candidates will be given time to make opening statements. Members of the audience may ask questions of the candidates on index cards which will be distributed throughout the meeting. At the end of the program, each candidate will give a closing statement.

Hicksville's PTAs do not endorse any candidate, which would be a violation of their non-partisan policy. They believe school board members should represent the interests of the community at large, have a broad background of experience and knowledge or the willingness to learn quickly, and make the welfare of children and community the basis for all decisions. Among other things, the PTAs also believe a school board member

should be able to communicate effectively with professional staff, community groups and others.

The Hicksville Council of PTAs encourages all Hicksville residents to become better informed by attending the Candidates Forum.

On May 5, which is also the date for voter registration from 3 to 8 p.m. at local polling sites. In order to participate in the annual budget vote and election of trustees on Wednesday, May 19, residents must be registered voters.

Now that the weather is warm, it's more fun to play outside; you can even play after dinner if mom or dad says so. Groups of kids in every neighborhood have their favorite games to play, and they even make up some of their own. So get away from the television, grab some friends and have a good time.

Here are some games you can play. (Some of them might be familiar and others were played by people in the newsroom when they were kids):

TV Tag: Someone is "it" and runs around trying to tag the rest of the players. When it gets too close, each player sits down and shouts out the name of a television show. If the player is tagged before that, he is it. (There can be variations of this game, using actors' names, movies, anything like that.)

Alphabet Ball: Using a medium sized ball, each player bounces it to a chant that might go like this: "A my name is Alice and my husband's name is Al and we

come from Alabama and we sell apples." For each word that begins with A, the player must bounce the ball under her leg. It continues using the letter B and on through the alphabet. As each player misses, it goes to the next player.

Change Trees: This is a variation of tag. One person is it, and stands in the middle of the yard. The players stand touching trees in the playing area. The person who is it yells, "Change trees!" and tries to tag the players as they run to another tree. (Players cannot run to the next tree; they must go across or skip at least one tree.) If a player is caught, he is it and play resumes.

Coin Bounce: Two players stand facing each other on cracks in the sidewalk, with one crack running in between. They place a coin on the center crack. They take turns bouncing a ball on the coin, trying to flip it over. Each flip is a point, and the one with the most points wins.

Giant Steps: One person stands at one end of the playing area and the other play-

ers stand facing her at the other end. Each player asks if he or she can take one or more giant steps. If the player forgets to say "May I!" he can be denied. The object is to get to the other end of the playing area first.

Of course, don't forget about traditional activities like jump rope, hopscotch and hide and seek.

Here's another game that can be played indoors on a rainy day. It's called Coffeepot (no one seems to know why). Together the players choose about five items that they all become familiar with. One player hides the items in one room while the others are in another room hiding their eyes. Once the items are hidden, the players return to the room and try to find the items. The key to the game is not letting the other players know you've located an item — just making a mental note of it. When you find all the items, you shout out, "Coffeepot!" Then you show where all of the items are and you win. Then it's your turn to hide the items.

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome - A Common Cause Of Hand Discomfort

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome (CTS) results from entrapment of the nerves which go from the wrists into the hands. The wrist contains many structures in close proximity, all of which pass through a very narrow area, not unlike a tunnel. When crowding of this tunnel occurs, the structures become compressed, and damage to the nerves occurs.

The median nerve is most commonly involved. This nerve begins in the neck, runs through the arm, and into the hand. It supplies movement and feeling for the thumb, the index finger, and part of the middle finger.

Burning, tingling, and numbness of the fingers, often at night or early morning, are the usual symptoms of CTS. This discomfort may initially be relieved by shaking or exercising the hand. Some patients also find that the numbness radiates up the arm. If left untreated for long periods of time, weakness and loss of muscle mass in the hand can occur.

Inflammation or swelling of the structures within the wrist often produce this syndrome. The more common causes include: arthritis, tendonitis, thyroid disease, injury to the wrist, and even fluid retention associated with pregnancy. Due to the frequent association of carpal tunnel syndrome with arthritis and inflammation, people with this disorder are often treated by rheumatologists.

Once the diagnosis has been established, the initial treatment is often conservative. Included in the treatment is the use of anti-inflammatory medications and splinting of the wrist at night. If these measures should fail, an injection of medication into the area is often helpful. In the non-responsive forms of the disorder, surgery may be a consideration.

For tickets call 681-7779. Tickets are \$9 at the door and \$8 in advance for adults, \$6 for senior and children under 12.

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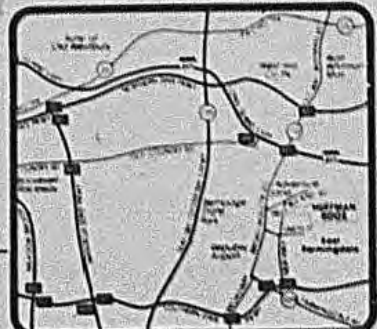
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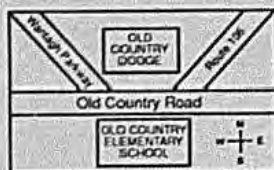

surrounding area at affordable rates set on a sliding scale.

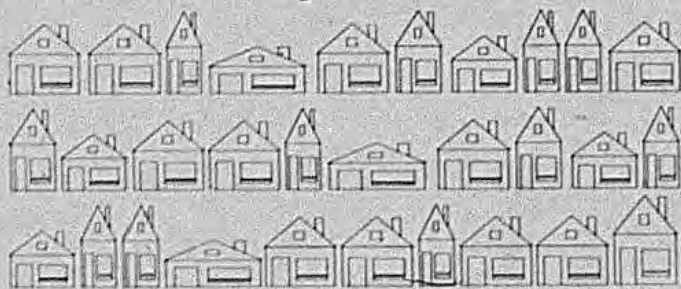

Look For A Common Thread

Hundreds of Long Islanders were among those who traveled to the nation's capital last weekend to rally for gay rights. Demonstrators are seeking the right not to be discriminated against in housing, employment and other issues; they support ending the ban on gays in the military, and they want more funding for AIDS care and education.

Not everyone may agree that the ban on gays in the military should be lifted. But the gay rights demonstrators' focus on AIDS care and education should be supported by all people, for AIDS does not spare any ethnic, religious or cultural group; it knows not whether the victim is homo- or heterosexual, nor does it spare anyone on the basis of age, gender or economic class.

Those points aside, there is more going on here than just gays' and lesbians' sexual orientation; there's a lesson of tolerance and acceptance to be learned.

America was founded on the principles of equality, liberty and justice for all. This country is a melting pot of cultures, ideas and beliefs, and were it not for the ability of Americans to accept differences, this country would not be what it is today. The war in Bosnia is a perfect example of one culture's intolerance for another's beliefs.

The early 1990s have been a difficult time for tolerance and acceptance. The two Rodney King trials and the clashes between blacks and Jews in Brooklyn seem to have set back the progress that this country has made. Last Sunday's 60 Minutes broadcast portrayed a disturbing trend that apparently is growing on college campuses. There are black and white fraternities, housing and even separate benches on campus where blacks and whites gather between classes.

This kind of segregation does not bode well for the future. Members of all groups should be able to practice their beliefs or embrace their heritage. But they must also remember that regardless of skin color, religion or sexual orientation, people are all human beings and they are all Americans — and that is the common thread.

Army: College Money Available

The U.S. Army is increasing to \$30,000 the maximum amount for college available to qualified applicants who enlist for the new Army College Fund.

This substantial boost from the previous maximum of \$25,200 for a four-year enlistment was initiated, with Congressional approval, to restore the fund's buying power to its fiscal year 1985 origination level. College money is a potent enlistment incentive for the Army in attracting higher quality recruits. Last fiscal year, 100 percent of new Army recruits were high school graduates, while 78 percent scored in the top half of the entrance aptitude test. In fiscal year 1992, in the metropolitan area, 453 new recruits qualified for the ACF program; this amounted to about \$10 million worth of college money.

The \$30,000 amount, like its \$25,200 predecessor, is a special incentive that is created by combining money from the Montgomery GI Bill (\$13,200), which requires a \$1,200 contribution from the soldier (\$100 a month for one year), and the remaining \$15,600 provided by the ACF. Similar increases have been made for a three-year enlistment that provides \$25,200 for college tuition, or a two-year enlistment that provides \$20,000.

To qualify for the Montgomery GI Bill and the new ACF, an applicant must have a high school diploma, achieve a score of at least 50 on the entrance aptitude test, enlist in a designated critical job skill, have no prior military service and meet the other enlistment eligibility requirements. Army recruiters are now accepting applications for this option, so stop by your local recruiting station or call 1-800-USA-ARMY.

Jennifer Rowe's appealing sleuth, TV researcher and writer Verity Birdwood, is back on the scene in *Makeover Murders* and she's not enjoying herself, although her readers will. Birdy, as she is called, has been assigned to write a feature article about a luxurious spa, Deepdene, owned by glamorous Margot Bell. The last thing Birdy wants is a makeover, but her producer thinks that's just what she should get in order to do a thorough job of research.

When reports of the possible presence of a serial killer in Deepdene surface, Birdy's sleuthing instincts are aroused and when the gorgeous Margot is found stabbed to death, Birdy is in her grisly element.

Suspects abound, from the spa's hair stylist who was also Margot's silent partner, her male secretary and the on-staff masseur, too the guests who have come to be made over. As a flood ravages the countryside, Birdy finds Deepdene cut off from the rest of the world and locked in with a killer.

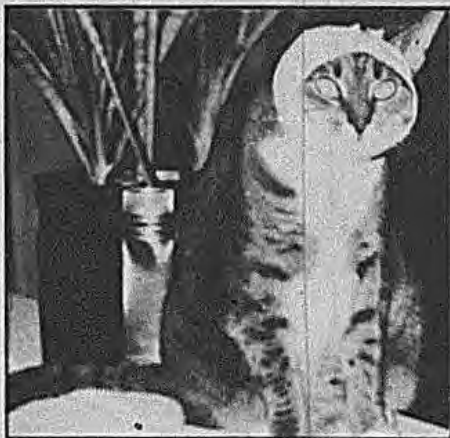

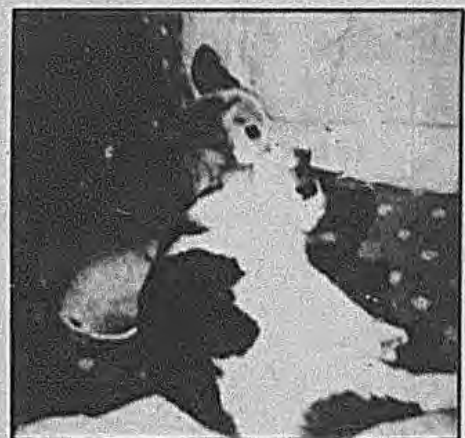


A Patient Pet

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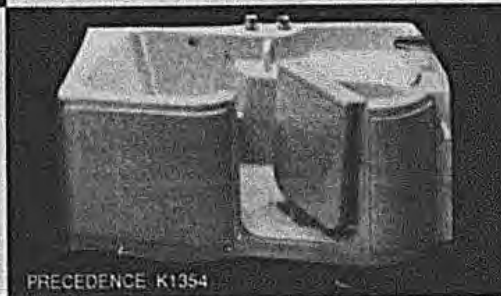

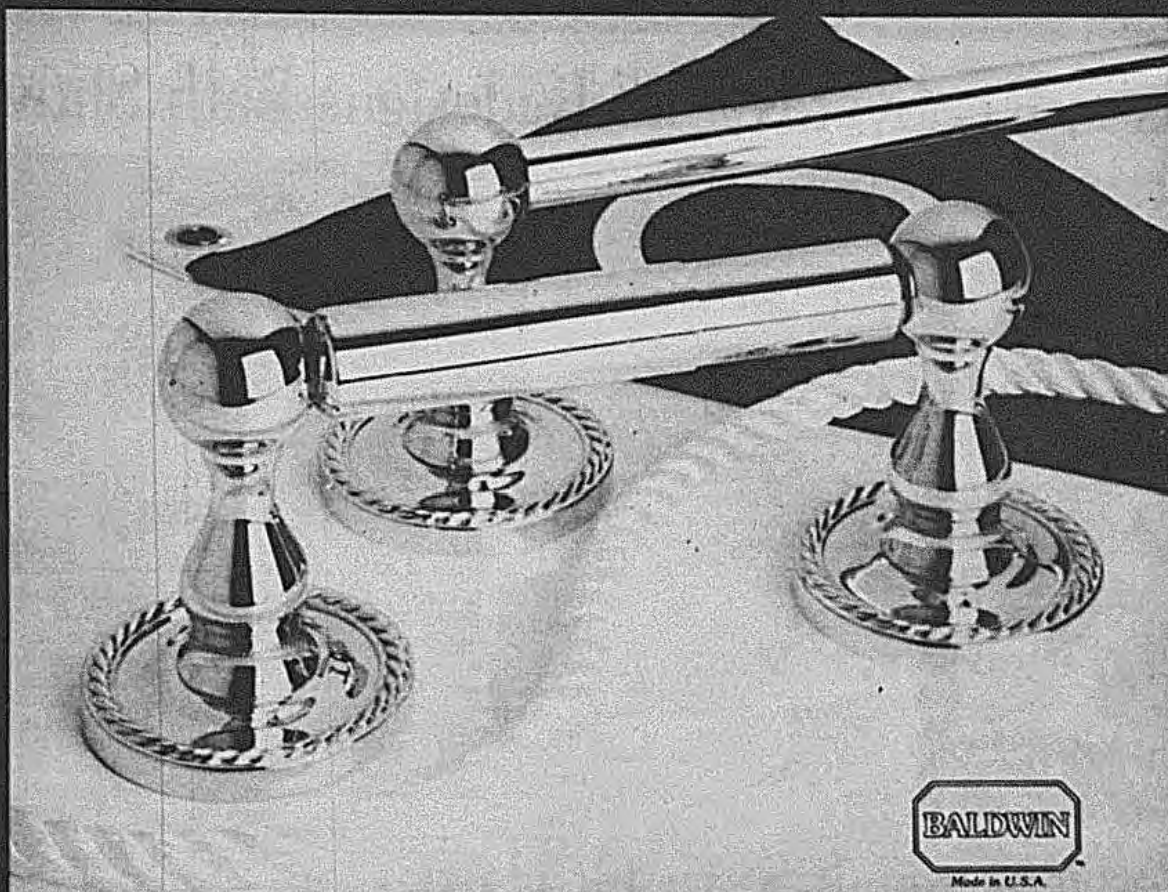

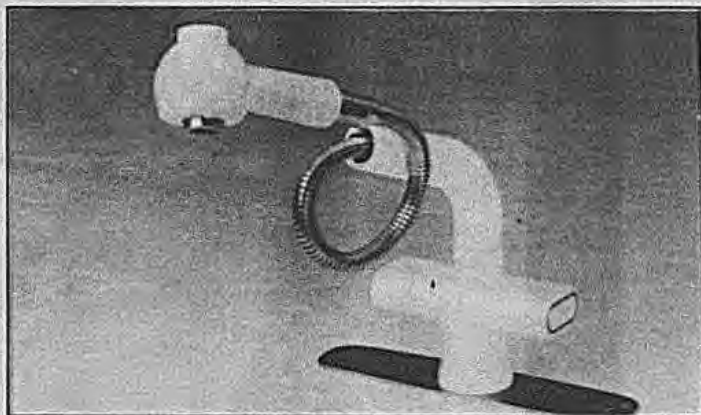

The American Center will actually pay, under certain circumstances, for employment training for job candidates. They help people trying to enter or re-enter the workforce, and who have exhausted other avenues of employment opportunities. The poor economy has caused more skilled people than ever before to seek the services of the American Center, said Gordon. The program is also being used by more job candidates in the younger 55-60 age category, due to the economy.

The program is funded by a grant from

the Federal Government, which allows payment for up to a 12 week training period (on the job training) at normal salary rates. The job applicants are usually screened and their skills are assessed by the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) to make sure that they are desirable candidates for the prospective employers.

SCSEP placements are mostly clerical. Their participants are skilled in word processing, data entry, typing, reception, filing, collating, maintenance, retail, bookkeeping, customer service, food service and more.

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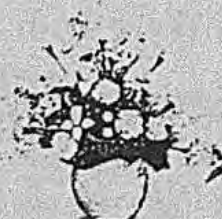


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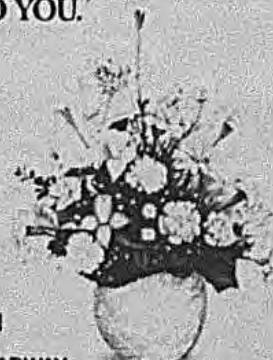

businesses, and civic associations to coordinate their efforts.

Symons stressed the importance of cooperation between all community groups. "First of all we have to break the cycle of graffiti... and recognize that there is no quick fix and no simple or single answer," he said. Noting that the graffiti problem has been thoroughly analyzed, he stressed that it is time to act. Civic associations are part of his overall plan. By becoming watchdogs in their respective communities, civics can alert the police and town of new graffiti, organize cleanup groups, and encourage the support of businesses that work in the area to keep the community attractive. Noting Southwest Civic's "very posi-

tive contribution," Symons encourages similar involvement by other civics.

The Adopt-A-Highway/Adopt-A-Spot program allows volunteers and community members to make a two-year commitment to assist in monitoring and periodically cleaning a chosen area within their community. 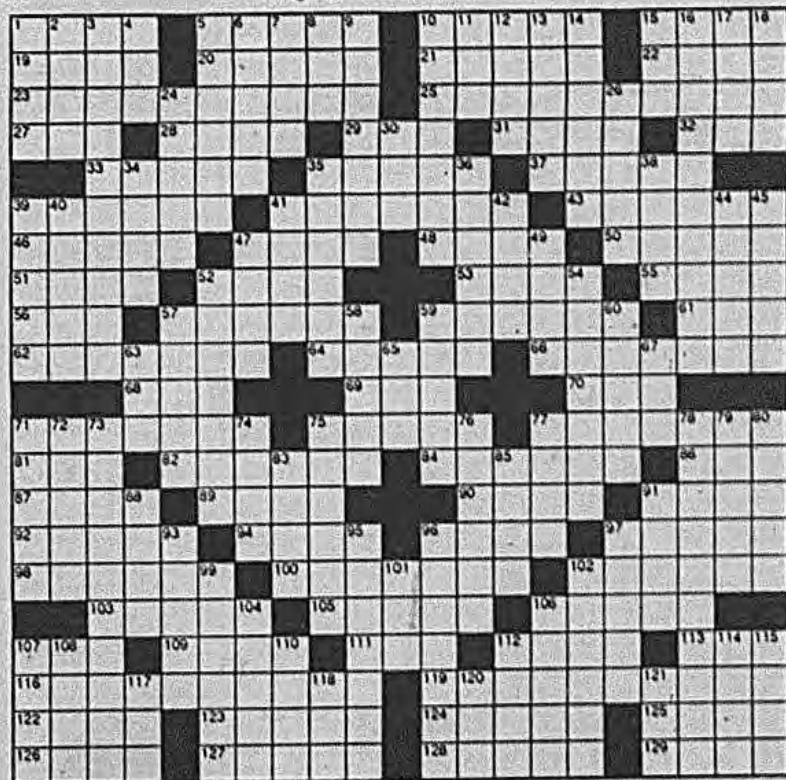
